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## Biography

Savanah Bosch is a rural-rooted, evidence-driven school leader who knows how to turn limited resources into real outcomes — and she wants to bring that discipline to Alberta’s future.

Currently, Savanah serves as Vice Principal at Four Winds Public School in Morinville with a Bachelor of Secondary Education (English Literature) from the University of Alberta, and is beginning graduate studies in Counselling. She previously worked in Alberta Infrastructure’s Business Process & Development Unit, preparing briefing materials and speeches for senior ministry officials.

In education, she spent six years as a behaviour specialist leading evidence-based interventions to reduce school violence and strengthen mental health. She is known in her division for strong communication and advocacy, which has resulted in sustained community partnerships serving students across Sturgeon County and surrounding areas.

Savanah is recognized for fiscally responsible problem solving and turning complex issues into sustainable, evidence-based solutions. She comes from a rural Alberta farming family with more than 100 years of roots in Morinville. She is a mother of three and lives in St. Albert with her husband, Marco, and their two dogs. Outside of work, she is a musician and active community volunteer.

# Letter Of Interest

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To Whom it May Concern,

My name is Savanah Bosch, and I am writing to express my interest in serving on the Alberta Party Board. Alberta is at an inflection point. Many of us can feel it — in our communities, in our schools, and around our kitchen tables. Albertans are tired of being pitted against each other while important decisions are rushed behind the scenes. We need credible leaders who can bring this province back to pragmatic, Alberta-first decision-making: away from imported far-right sensationalism, and toward evidence-based solutions that protect workers, families, and real opportunity.

I grew up in rural Sturgeon County north of Edmonton, and my family has farmed here on both sides for more than a century. My childhood was centred around community involvement: 4-H, Gymkhana, and many hours of volunteering. I come from a conservative household where honest hard work was celebrated — and so was being a responsible member of the community. I remember delivering flyers and canvassing with my uncle when he ran for PC MLA in the late 90s, hearing again and again about the importance of ensuring a future that was affordable and attainable for Albertans. I watched a generation believe that public life could be noble — that government existed to steward the future.

Somewhere along the way, that vision was lost, and Albertans no longer feel heard.

I have never belonged to any political party until now. However, listening to Peter Guthrie speak recently about what it meant to grow up PC — wanting to belong to a party that was open, honest, and responsible — pulled something forward in me. It reminded me of the Alberta I know: confident, neighbourly, and future-focused. And that is when I realized the only place left in Alberta that reflects that spirit is the Alberta Party.

Today, as a Vice Principal and ATA member, I see firsthand how many Albertans — both public and private sector — have become exhausted by division, drama, and political theatre. Albertans are tired of culture-war distractions. They want results and responsible use of public dollars. They want a government that rebuilds trust.

My professional work has always been focused on that same goal: real change that improves outcomes. Six years ago, I moved from classroom teaching into a behaviour specialist position during a time when our school was overwhelmed by post-COVID complexity, limited budgets, and rapid growth. I knew we couldn't solve those challenges inside the four walls of the school — so I built outward. I brought community partners in, invited experts to co-design programming, and created evidence-based systems that made our limited resources stretch further.

Through that work, I developed direct, sustained partnerships with the local PCN clinic, public health mental health nurses, CASA, and the Jessica Martel Foundation. These were not theoretical relationships — they became embedded supports that still operate in our school today. Jessica Martel now runs a funded trauma-informed program inside our CTF classes, serving Grade 8 and 9 students weekly with trained professionals. The results were strong enough that CASA later approached our division to pilot the CASA Classrooms Program — now in its third year, expanded to serve students beyond Sturgeon Public Schools.

Following this work, I moved into a teacher consultant role at our district office, supporting schools across the system. The next year, I transitioned into school-based administration as a Vice Principal, where I am now in my second year.

As an educational leader, I understand that governance is not campaigning — it is stewardship. Stewardship means aligning priorities with evidence, weighing risk, setting direction, and holding systems accountable for outcomes. It means staying focused on what actually improves life for the people who live here.

My professional track record aligns with three core Alberta Party priorities: strengthening public education as a pillar of Alberta's future, expanding evidence-based mental health access for students and families, and improving public-sector effectiveness without driving up cost. These are not abstract ideas to me — these are areas where I have delivered measurable outcomes. If elected to the Board, I will bring that same evidence-first, partnership-driven, fiscally responsible problem solving to Alberta Party governance and policy direction.

I believe Alberta is ready to rebuild a strong, reasonable centre — one that honours the workers who grow our food, fuel our economy, and teach our children. A centre that protects Albertans' interests. That grows value here. That governs with discipline — not distraction — and is strong enough to welcome all Albertans back into the conversation, because **this province works best when we build it together.**

**I want to help build it.**
