Unionization

We are so excited to announce that this year the AECEO became a unionized As an organization committed to advocating for decent work for ECEs, we are proud to also formalize our decent conditions our into Collective Agreement. We had an incredible experience negotiating our first collective agreement, it was collaborative and caring, a learning and collectively created something we are all truly proud of.

Advocacy and Community Based Work

The AECEO lifted the voices and needs of ECEs across the province through advocacy and community based work. This took shape through many community based actions, our podcast 'Circle Time' with special guests and topics curated for ECEs, as well as campaigns to support the early childhood education workforce. In May we shared a Parent MPP training and toolkit. The AECEO stood with Theresa Armstrong re: Bill 191, Childcare and Early Years

Workforce Strategy Advisory Committee Act, 2024, demonstrating solidarity as well as a deep commitment to the sector. We engaged in multiple eactions, for example the "Tell Trudeau & Ford: Support Educators and \$10 a day child care for families - not privatization" action. The hosted sessions for educators as well as operators on the CWELCC funding formula. We also hosted the "10\$ a day and decent pay" rally at Queens Park educators joined by across province. We were joined by elected MP's Chrystia Freeland and Jagmeet Singh and many members of wonderful community for the International Women's Day March where childcare was a widely talked about leading campaign issue federal election.


Special Thank You to Alana:

The AECEO Decent Work Project.

It is with gratitude to our funders, the Atkinson Foundation and Waltons Trust, that we are pleased to announce that the Decent Work project has continued through another year. Together with you, the Early Learning and Child Care (ELCC) community, we have continued to advocate for the respect, recognition, working conditions, and professional pay that early years professionals deserve. have been grateful for the opportunities to listen, collaborate, and work together for positive change. Thank you to all who consulted on the creation of community research questionnaire, What is it like to be an ECE & Child Care worker?, and to the 600+ of you who took the time to share your experiences, opinions, and expectations about the ELCC sector. Your responses are incredibly valuable, and we will continue to amplify them in our future policy requests, campaign messaging, and advocacy work.

Many exciting initiatives took place this year. The Decent Work Common Table, and AECEO CARE Collectives continue to be spaces designed for the ELCC workforce, partners, and allies to come together for ongoing connection and collaboration.





These spaces allow us to gain a broader understanding of each other's perspectives through story sharing, make connections between working conditions, lived experience, and policy, ask questions, share experiences, and deepen relationships as we "care out loud".

We began the AECEO Community Visits, starting out in Waterloo Region. Being together in joyful and meaningful ways is key to building our power as a community and creating the hopeful worlds ECEs deserve. Thank you to all who continue to join us.

Four different initiatives were launched this year. Our new seasonal policy newsletters bring the work of the AECEO and the hottest news in ELCC policy right to your email inbox. We also launched our podcast, Circle Time with the AECEO to discuss all things ECE culture: the good, the bad, and the sticky. Our new RedBubble shop creates fun ELCC-related designs to spread the word about our community. Finally, our Student Blog was launched as a space to publicly host the projects completed by placement and internship students.

All of these new opportunities connect

the every day practice of ELCC professionals to policy and their communities.

Over the summer, we shared the 2024 Summer Bucket List. We took time to recognize the advocacy ECEs do in their everyday activities, and found summer-friendly ways to engage with our representatives. We hosted an e-action to support educators and \$10 a day child care for families - not privatization. Hundreds of people signed the action hoping to ensure that the early learning and child care workforce had decent work and pay and that the nonprofit and public child care sectors were stable, thriving and expanding. We shared a new policy brief, the Ontario Child Care Funding Formula, and a new program profile highlighting the Windsor-Essex RECE Mentorship Program.

In the fall, the Ontario Funding Formula was reviewed, and we hosted information sessions for and with operators, educators, and the Home Child Care Association of Ontario, to better understand its impact. We brought ECE voices directly to decision makers by hosting a panel discussion with ECEs and the then Minister of Children, Families, & Social Development Jenna Sudds, and collaborated with Child Care Now to organize Ontario's 10 Days of Action for \$10-a-Day Child Nationally, the AECEO hosted virtual workshops Voices for Change: Your \$10aDay Child Care Stories. We created multiple invitations to become involved, to ensure that many access points were provided including a social media





campaign, phone zap, colouring and information pages, an online petition, a rally, and a virtual wrap up/debrief.

Shortly after that, the province called a snap election, and we shared voting information, supported local activities through the CARE Collectives, and hosted a professional learning space to discuss how our values are seen in policy and systems.

None of this work could be possible if we did not come together as a community and share our values and stories with one another. Our combined dedication and passion cannot be ignored. We are so strong when we stand up together, raise each other up, and stay united in what we deserve: professional pay, decent work, respect, and recognition!














Guiding Committee on Truth and Reconciliation.

Over the past seven years, the AECEO has committed to reconciliation with First Métis, and Nation, Inuit communities through its Guiding Committee on Truth and Reconciliation, formed in 2018. This collaborative effort included the development of a comprehensive framework rooted Indigenous principles aimed at. transforming early childhood education (ECE) practices and policies across Ontario in response to the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's Calls to Action.


Sector insight, and relevant, collaborative, Peer-Reviewed Articles.




