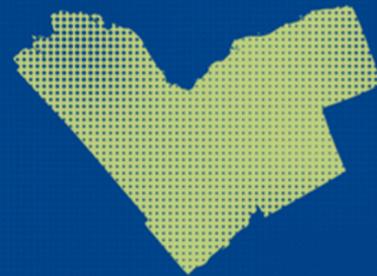

Background

- Every municipality in Ontario is required to have a 10-Year Housing and Homelessness Plan (10-Year Plan)
- 10-Year Plans guide efforts to address local housing and homelessness needs
- Plans must be 10 years in length, updated every 5-years, and include:
 - Housing Needs Assessment
 - Objectives
 - Targets
 - Measures
 - How progress will be measured



Housing & Homelessness Leadership Table

Table de direction sur le logement et l'itinérance



It is responsible for:

- Designing and refreshing the plan
- Overseeing implementation
- Creating a system-wide, data-informed response to ending homelessness

Key features:

- Members represent sectors, not individual agencies
- The ATEHO provides backbone support
- The table operates on shared values including collaboration, Indigenous leadership, and the right to housing

Who's at the Table

- Co-led by the City + Alliance
- 18 members from key sectors
- Members represent sectors—not individual organizations
- Backbone support: Alliance

How Decisions Are Made

- Collaborative, consensus-based approach
- Grounded in data, sector input, and engagement

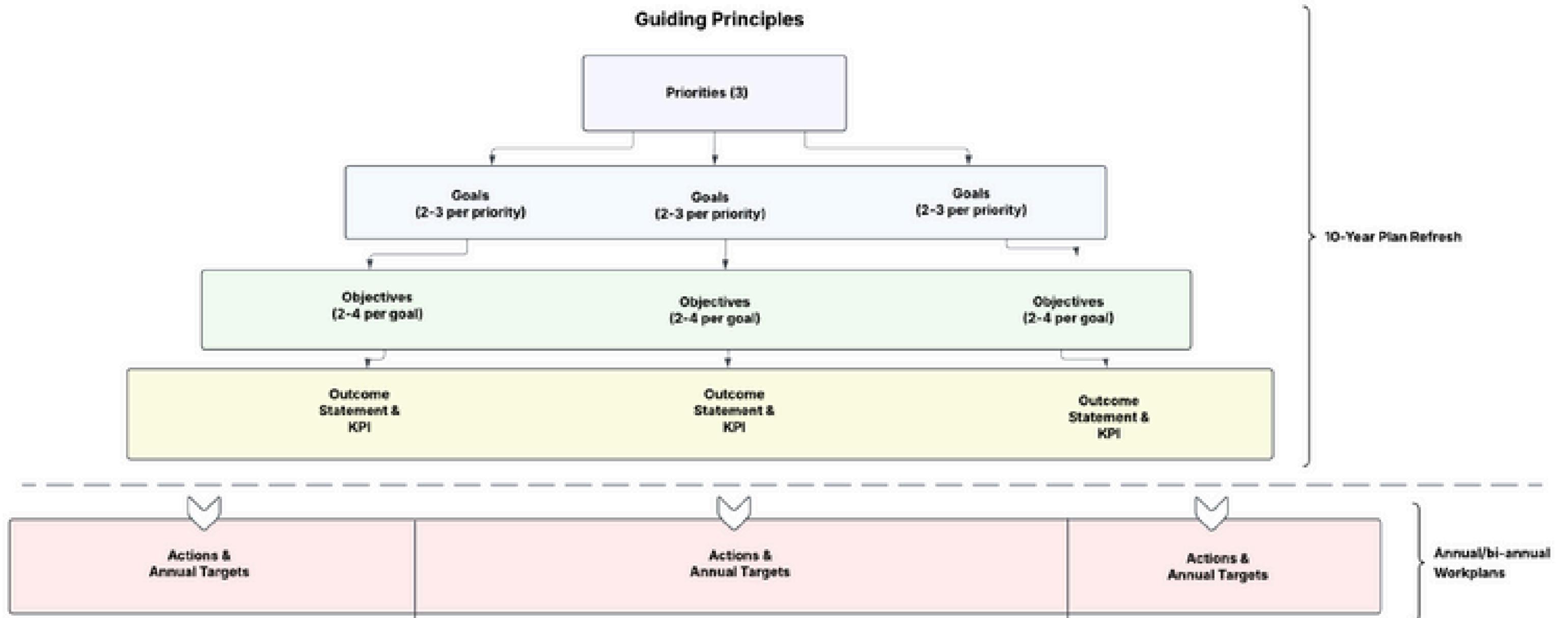
What Accountability Looks Like

- Shared ownership, not just City oversight
- Two-way communication with sectors
- Progress tracked through indicators, lived expertise & feedback loops

10-Year Plan Refresh: Framework Development

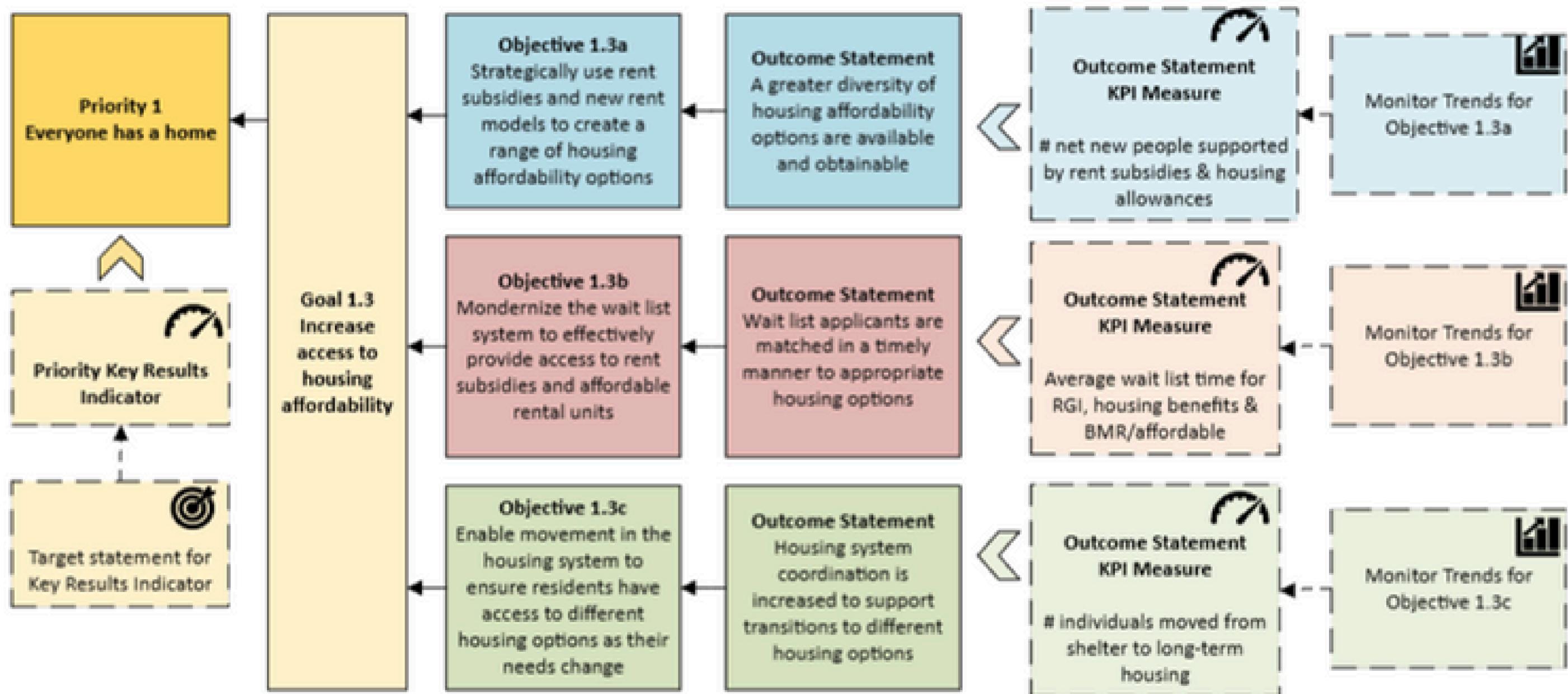


10-Year Plan Refresh: Measuring Success (Current)

- **Targets are linked to highest-level goals. Objectives and outcomes are not measured directly.**
- Benefits:
 - Easy to communicate
- Drawbacks:
 - Do not measure performance of specific objectives, need for greater specificity
 - Difficult to understand the impact of certain actions

10-Year Plan Refresh: Choosing Key Indicators

Key Performance Indicators (KPIs):



- Reviewed best-available data and made recommendations:
 - 10-Year Plan (2020) & Annual Progress Report
 - Term of Council Priorities & Various Directions from Council
 - Legislative Requirements (Provincial/Federal)
 - Housing Needs Assessment
 - Existing Dashboards
- Received feedback from City staff and HHLT Working Group
- Will continue to develop and grow

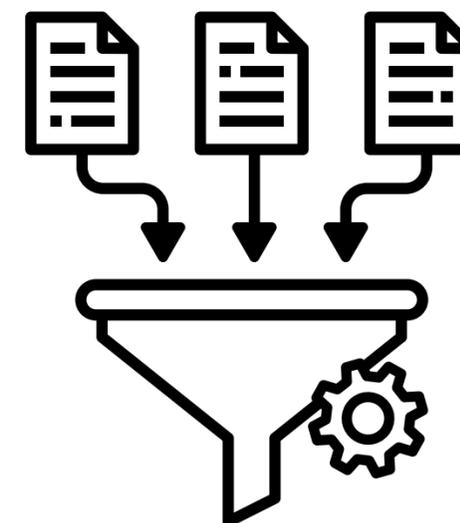
Key Results Indicators (KRIs):

- Currently in-development with HHLT



Working Group Discussion: Data lives in many places

- System-level databases (HIFIS & IHS)
- Organizations' internal tracking systems, databases and client and staff surveys
- Connected sectors and systems (child welfare, carceral, hospitals)
- As-yet unconnected sectors. (LTB)
- As-yet unknown



Working Group Discussion: Results vs Performance indicators

Results indicators: the big picture.

- Reported as a summary to date, monthly or quarterly or annually.
- Allow us to look back and see how we did.
- Allow us to identify emerging trends and identify priorities.
- Gives us a clear snapshot to know whether we are making progress toward our goals

Performance indicators: the details.

- Reported on a dashboard daily.
- What's happening today? For this client? Or at this location? Or for this activity?
- Allows us to analyze performance against benchmarks and make adjustments.
- Gives us the details needed to adjust tactics to improve results.

What is your organization already tracking?

1. Reflect individually

- What indicators does your organization currently track?
- What matters most to your team or board?
- What do you wish you could track?

2. Share at your table

- Listen for common themes, gaps, and surprises
- Use the worksheet to capture key insights

3. Wrap up together

- Identify one meaningful metric your table would “rally behind”
- Note one insight about what it would take to track progress more meaningfully



***From Insight to
Alignment: Cross-Sector
Exchange***

Part 1: Listening Across Sectors

Instructions:

1. Join a new, mixed-sector table – Sit with people from sectors you don't usually work with
2. Assign a note taker (on Flip Charts)
3. Share 1 insight from earlier discussions – A challenge, metric, or reflection from your sector
4. Listen actively – What's familiar? What's different? What surprised you?

3. Discuss what collaboration could look like – Focus on shared challenges, opportunities, and conditions for success
