

Brace Yourselves

As the development proposal for Walmer Road Baptist Church winds its way through the interminable planning process – now locked in legal action at OLT (the Ontario Land Tribunal) – it's not surprising that other properties on the street are in the development cross hairs. Most recently 40 Walmer Road has been targeted for demolition in order to make room for a 35-storey tower.



Above is the existing 4-storey apartment building at 40 Walmer nesting tidily and unobtrusively on its lot. It's possible you've never paid it any attention.



But this is the developer's proposal for the same space – a glass and steel tower soaring above a redbrick podium that bloats out to the lot lines.

How Can This Be?

In effect, Bloor Street is marching north. The whole west side of Walmer around the curve is at risk of tower creep as is all of St George. Builders are ignoring the official neighbourhood land use designation as they propose fully developed towers with virtually none or very little new open space.

Two years ago, the ARA's Planning and Development Committee (P+D) successfully petitioned the City to authorize a "four corners" study to monitor and coordinate the development node at Bloor and Spadina. But nothing has yet

materialized — it appears that each of the three proposed developments on those corners continues to be examined in isolation from each other.

And now it is apparent there is an urgent need for a full precinct plan to address the growing pressures on inner streets like Walmer and Lowther.

Keep Informed

If you want to have any say in what's happening in our neighbourhood, the first step is to be informed. By the time a tower starts to rise in concrete, steel, and glass it's far too late for you to have any impact. Many years of planning and negotiations and irrevocable approval will have gone into the project by that point.

Fortunately, you can now sign yourself up for alerts from the City's Application Centre. This relatively new feature makes it much easier for anyone to learn whenever a new project is filed. In the firm belief that every Annexonian should be alert to what's happening in the 'hood, here follow the steps you must take to get yourself in the loop:

First, go to the e-updates page: https://www.toronto.ca/home/social-media/e-updates/

Then, click on **New Development Application Notices.**

A drop-down menu listing three steps will appear.

Step 1: Check "University-Rosedale" from the list of wards

Step 2: Key in your email address in the dialog box

Step 3: Respond to the confirmation sent to your email address

Bingo! You will now be automatically informed when applications are filed. But truth to tell, you still won't necessarily be ahead of the game.

Better Yet – Come to P+D

Because of brutally tight timelines imposed by the Provincial Government, some developers (though not all) are canvassing interested parties before they submit an official application. They will go to the Councillor. They will seek a meeting with the Planning Department. And, in most cases, they will also reach out to the local Residents' Association (RA).

That's why, several times a year, P+D hears presentations from developers who are only at the earliest stages of planning. For example, the developers behind the proposal for 171–175 Lowther pictured above voluntarily shared their thoughts with P+D last September which allowed the committee time to express their first response.

If you want to be in on the ground floor of such presentations and ensuing discussions, please by all means join P+D. Meetings are held regularly on the first Tuesday of each month from 5:30 to 7:00 pm on Zoom. Just write to info@theara.org with the subject line "Attending P+D" and your name will be put on the distribution list. The more residents we have involved, the better. With a daunting 38 development projects currently in the works, P+D needs all the help it can get.

But our mood immediately soared to joy when he promised that <u>of course</u> the BIA would deploy its own grinder within the next couple of days and eradicate the blasted remnant.

It's hard to exaggerate how much we Annexonians benefit from the attention and inspiration of this BIA under Brian's management. Murals. Pole Wraps. Daily graffiti and trash eradication. Winter sidewalk clearance. And now stump removal. Fantastic!

Please do let the individual store owners know how much we appreciate their BIA's efforts.

Toronto Budget 2024

Our Mayor clearly meant what she said during the election campaign: she wants the people to be involved in the budget process from the ground up. To that end, the City has laid on a host of consultation sessions, one or more of which you are encouraged to attend. But where you might get even more satisfaction is by completing the "thought exchange" <u>online survey</u>. It's unlike any City survey you've taken before. It's a breath of fresh air. It's simple. It's direct. And it's open ended. You can finish it in a matter of minutes. Or you can become engaged in a lengthy dialogue as you review others' comments.

In short, this is a survey well worth taking. It's your chance to become an ally in Mayor Chow's crucial negotiations with Queen's Park and Ottawa for much needed dollars.

Afterwards the group attended Question Period as guests of MPPs Jessica Bell (front row left) and Kristen Wong-Tam (front row right). Charlotte reports that while the questions from the NDP side of the house were oriented towards the blight of demoviction, the responses from the government benches were, predictably, deflections rather than engagement with the issues.
