There are some welcome new splashes of colour up Dupont way near Huron – both of them from the talented hand of Sarah Imrisek, a community-engaged artist and coder who signs her work "Cymatiste." (For those of us who didn't know – the word is derived from "cymatics" as in "the study of sound vibrations on a physical medium." Got it?)

In other words, Sarah is cutting-edge. But you wouldn't guess it from the whimsy of her latest creations in the 'hood. First, there's the charming Bell box mural up at Wendat Square that she finished just last month.



And then, over a bit to the east, is the ebullient sign for newcomer Chilliy Pepper Tacos (yes, that's how the owners spell it) -- the latest restaurant in a series to occupy the space at 176 Dupont. (If you're unfamiliar with the location, think its recent incarnations – Rose and Sons, The Big Crow, The Grand Elvis.)



Who knows? There's always a chance that Chilliy Pepper Tacos will last as long as People's Foods at that site. And for sure, Sarah's artwork deserves that length of exposure.

ARA Cornfest: Sunday September 10


Save the date for sure: **Sunday September 10** from **3:00 to 5:00 pm.** That's when your ARA Board will host the annual Cornfest – the second most important

It's to be held on **Sunday September 3rd** between **10:00 am and 2:00 pm** all the way down at <u>Fred Hamilton Park</u>. And you'll for sure need to arrive on wheels if you intend to take advantage.

To give you a sense of the scale of the operation, ponder the following statistics from the City: That's quite a load of waste diverted!

Waste Diversion Statistics 2022

2022 In-community events	107,775 kg of electronics 327,520 kg of household hazardous waste 102,215 kg of reusable household goods
2022 Drop-Off Depot events	7,610 kg of electronics 16,445 kg of household hazardous waste 6,148 kg of reusable household goods

...with sweet teeth satisfied by Ines' cotton candy, caramel corn, and snow-cones...




Fingers crossed that next year this community event will get the Funday weather that it deserves.
