

2016 ASH Year 10 Snapshot

Topline Results



Daily smokers are participants who report smoking at least once a day. **Regular smokers** include daily smokers along with participants who report smoking weekly or monthly.









Māori and Pacific smoking remains disproportionately high, especially for girls

Daily smoking rates for Māori and Pacific participants were significantly higher than for non-Māori non-Pacific participants in Snapshot 2016.

Māori girls still have higher daily smoking rates than Māori boys, while the gap between Pacific girls and boys and non-Māori non-Pacific girls and boys has closed compared to previous years.



Māori smoking decrease slows in 2016



Daily smoking rates for Māori have continued to decrease but may have slowed.

Daily smoking rates for Māori show less of a decrease (i.e. much less change from 2014–2016) compared to non-Māori in 2004–2006).
