Legislative News Highlights

Supreme Court sides with DFL, Simon, says 68 House members needed for floor action: The Minnesota Supreme Court determined Friday that 68 members must be present to conduct business in the state House of Representatives, likely forcing Republicans back into power-sharing discussions with Democrats who have boycotted the state Capitol for two weeks. The unsigned order was the unanimous decision of the six justices who heard <u>oral argument</u> on the dispute Thursday . . . The disagreement over quorum, the number of House members who must be present to conduct business, has been brewing since before the opening day of the Legislature on Jan. 14. Initially after the November election, the DFL and GOP were evenly split with 67 members each in the House and they were negotiating a power-sharing agreement. But in late December, a Ramsey County judge voided the election of DFLer Curtis Johnson, finding the candidate lived in Little Canada and not the Roseville and Shoreview district he sought to represent. With a 67-66 advantage, the GOP ended power-sharing discussions and claimed a majority. <u>Read more</u>.

But even a court ruling won't resolve everything . . . [The Court decided that] the House needs 68 people present to be a legal quorum to begin the session, [but] the House can't get to that number unless the House DFL ends its boycott. And that boycott won't end until the GOP agrees it won't try to unseat Rep. Brad Tabke of Shakopee, House DFL leaders have repeatedly said . . . Without an agreement between House GOP leader Lisa Demuth — speaker of the House in the eyes of the GOP members — and former DFL House Speaker Melissa Hortman, the boycott likely will not end, despite a DFL victory in court or at the ballot in Roseville . . . Both the House and Senate leadership have said they will follow the court's interpretation of the constitution . . . Tuesday, Hortman said she didn't know if the House boycott of the chambers will last until the Roseville

A DFL win at the Supreme Court [will] change the bargaining positions of the two parties — Demuth, for example, would not yet be speaker and her chamber no longer open for business. But Hortman said she thinks a negotiated agreement is a better path to a solution than the courts. Read more.

Outdoors-related bills already in play during early stages of Minnesota Legislative session: Budget priorities are on protecting and managing groundwater, managing and preventing the spread of AIS, and continuing to support the state's parks and recreation areas with fee proposals tied to them...The few policy items the DNR may try to tackle will be small technical matters, such as allowing commercial Lake Superior fishermen to keep eelpout by-catch rather than discarding it. Walz presents \$887 million infrastructure spending plan: The governor's proposal is an early step in the process and comes after the 2024 legislative session adjourned without a bonding bill, leaving some local and statewide projects without public funding. Walz announced his bonding bill proposal at the Rapidan Dam, which made national headlines last year after flooding caused the dam to partially fail. Read more and more. Walz's plan includes:

- \$144 million in water and transportation infrastructure, including more than \$107 million to support grants and low-interest loans to keep Minnesota's water clean. The infrastructure plan also includes \$5 million for flood mitigation and prevention, and \$10 million for work on the Rapidan Dam.
- \$395 million for maintenance of state facilities
- \$238 million for public safety projects, such as a laboratory for the Bureau of Criminal Apprehension and a headquarters building for the Minnesota State Patrol.
- \$44 million for housing and environmental projects

State needs more efficient environmental permitting to be competitive, bill proponents say: Rep. Josh Heintzeman (R-Nisswa) sponsors HF8 to modernize existing regulatory systems and make them more efficient while still protecting the environment. [He] said businesses needing environmental reviews and permits to operate in Minnesota are hampered by unnecessarily lengthy and burdensome permitting processes by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency . . . The bill would limit extensions from a 60-day time limit that a local unit of government must make certain determinations under the Wetland Conservation Act to one extension that could not exceed 60 days. To be more efficient, the PCA would be required to issue separate permits for construction and operation of certain facilities and be required to issue these permits in a manner that minimizes the time required to construct and begin operation. Minnesota Center for Environmental Advocacy submitted a letter outlining objections to several aspects of the bill. Read more.

House DFL Leader Melissa Hortman said March 11 is the "most likely" date for a rescheduled special election in House District 40B, with Gov. Tim Walz expected to issue a writ on Feb. 5. The special election in Senate District 60 will still proceed on Jan. 28 as originally planned: via Star Tribune's Briana Bierschbach, on X.

Environmentalists rally to protect BWCA: The Boundary Waters Canoe Area, and a big effort to protect it, took center stage at the State Capitol on Thursday afternoon. Supporters of the Boundary Waters are concerned President Trump's energy policy reopens the path for mining and at a rally called this a crisis moment. President Trump has long been on the record to undo the Biden administration's ban on mining and there are several ways Trump can do that – administratively and through Congress. But the environmentalists at the Capitol promised a fight in court to further protect the unique area. Read more.

Wolves more likely to be delisted under Trump, but whether deer numbers increase is uncertain: With the help of the Republican-controlled Congress, such a change is possible, if not probable. Whether deer numbers in northern Minnesota increase as a result, addressing the frustrations of whitetail hunters in that part of the state, is another question. Either way, the Trump administration is likely to accelerate removal of Minnesota's (and Wisconsin's and Michigan's) wolves from protection under the Endangered Species Act (ESA), where they are listed as threatened, and return them to state management . . . wolves have gained a lot of friends in recent decades, making politics, not biology or policy integrity, the major force driving their management. Ice fishing is hot in Minnesota this winter, thanks to the cold: For the six-week period between Nov. 28 and Jan. 13, anglers purchased 56,500 licenses from the Department of Natural Resources. That's the highest post-Thanksgiving sales number at least since the 2015-2016 ice fishing season. The data, gathered by the DNR at the request of the Minnesota Star Tribune, showed a 152% increase from last year's paltry sale of 22,387 licenses. Read more.

Pittman-Robertson dollars dip for Minnesota; State audit of DNR use of federal dollars on WMAs expected in coming months: Federal dollars from the Wildlife Restoration Fund are key to much of the DNR's on-the-ground field work. As another round of funding is announced, state officials await the results of a legislative audit review of timber harvest on WMAs. Read more.

Anderson: Pheasants, ducks, butterflies: Their chances — and yours — improve 80 acres at a time: Ducks Unlimited and other groups help the Minnesota DNR acquire conservation lands with Legacy Act money. Since the Legacy Act's inception, DU has purchased about 75 parcels of wildlife habitat totaling 8,000 acres using the Outdoor Heritage Fund. Each property, which by law must be open to hunting, is subsequently donated back to the DNR for establishment as a state wildlife management area. Read more.
