Legislative News Highlights

Negotiations between Minnesota House Republican, Democratic leaders stall: which likely means a continued boycott by Democratic-Farmer-Labor members that's now more than two weeks old. The new normal in the House, which is currently home to 67 Republicans and 66 Democrats: Minnesota Secretary of State Steve Simon, presiding over a half-empty chamber, asks members to bow their heads in prayer; members and staff then recite the Pledge of Allegiance; members take attendance on a roll call; and Simon declares that there are not enough members present to conduct business. Republican House leader Lisa Demuth, R-Cold Spring, told reporters Wednesday that she didn't meet with Democratic leader Melissa Hortman, DFL-Brooklyn Park, and had no plans to do so again in the near future . . . House Democrats want written assurance that Republicans will refrain from attempting to unseat one of their members. Republicans want to elect a speaker and control House committees for the next two years — even after a special election for an open seat in the north metro that's expected to bring the chamber back to a tie . . . At stake is the status of Rep. Brad Tabke, a Shakopee Democrat who won his reelection by 14 votes in a contest marred by 20 missing ballots. A judge ruled in an advisory opinion that Tabke would have won anyway, and a do-over is not needed. The Minnesota Constitution grants the House the power to seat its own members, however, and Democrats fear Republicans will refuse to seat Tabke. All 66 House Democrats have been boycotting the Capitol since Jan. 14 in an effort to deny Republicans a quorum and control of the chamber. Read more.

House GOP sues secretary of state, accusing him of overstepping authority as presiding officer: The lawsuit comes in the wake of a Supreme Court ruling last week that declared a quorum in the House of Representatives is a static 68 members . . . House Republican leaders Lisa Demuth and Harry Niska, the petitioners, now say in a court filing that Simon has ignored their constitutional right to "compel the attendance of absent members" and has "unilaterally" convened and adjourned the House without recognizing any motions. Doron Clark (DFL) wins SD60 Special Election: The special election to fill the open seat in Senate District 60 following the passing of DFL Sen. Kari Dziedzic Tuesday broke the temporary tie in the chamber. Doron Clark (DFL) received 7,783 votes, 90.9%, and Abigail Wolters (GOP) received 746 votes, 8.7% When Clark is seated, the DFL will control the Senate, 34-33.

Minnesota Senate Republicans fail in attempt to expel Woodbury DFLer facing burglary charge: Minnesota Senate Republicans failed Monday to compel a vote to expel Democratic Sen. Nicole Mitchell over her pending first-degree burglary charge from an incident last year in Detroit Lakes.

The motion was the first attempt by the GOP to oust Mitchell this session although the party tried several measures last year and have a pending ethics complaint against her . . . Sen. Jordan Rasmusson, R-Fergus Falls, brought the motion against Mitchell, noting that her criminal trial was to start Monday in Becker County before it was postponed by the judge until <u>after the session</u>. Rasmusson said Mitchell has "refused to offer a compelling explanation for her conduct" last April, which he termed as "felony burglary and terrorizing an elderly family member." Rasmusson's motion was ruled out of order after a lengthy back-door discussion that involved the two current Senate presidents: Sens. Bobby Joe Champion, DFL-Minneapolis, and Jeremy Miller, R-Winona. <u>Read more</u>. Expelling Sen. Nicole Mitchell would require 45 votes in the state Senate; at least 12 DFLers would have to join the GOP to expel Senator Mitchell.

Another bill aims to end Minnesota's shotgun zone for deer, this time giving counties the chance to decide: The Minnesota Senate is considering eliminating the state's shotgun zone again this year, but it's seeking that change in a different manner than that of last year's bill, which fell apart as legislators sought certain county exemptions. Environmentalists sue to keep momentum on nitrate pollution solutions: Wary of a new federal administration that seeks more environmental deregulation, several groups are suing the state Agriculture Department and Pollution Control Agency to ensure progress in cleaning up nitrate pollution in southeast Minnesota. The lawsuit, headed by the Minnesota Center for Environmental Advocacy (MCEA), seeks to get state courts involved in enforcing updates to Minnesota's nitrate standards across the board. They also want to reopen the process behind some of the rules for commercial manure and fertilizer application and get more public feedback. Read more.

DNR expands fight against CWD after the deer disease crops up in Hennepin and Clay counties: The positive test results were detected in antiered bucks harvested by hunters during the firearms season. The two findings will trigger new surveillance measures that will affect many deer hunters in Deer Permit Areas 266

and 701 . . . This week's announcement is the second blast of bad news in the past three weeks regarding the health of Minnesota's whitetail deer population. On Jan. 8., the DNR announced a <u>startling increase in the prevalence of CWD</u> in deer located in the state's southeastern corner. Because computer modeling now predicts the disease spreading to 15% of deer in that area in 2008, the DNR has cancelled an off-season culling program there that was designed to keep the disease in check. Following the latest detections, DNR will likely follow its oft-utilized CWD Response Plan calling for three years of testing deer harvested in the affected deer permit areas. The permit areas will be redrawn and categorized as CWD management zones. Typically in those zones, the DNR mandates CWD testing for any deer harvested during the opening weekend of the firearms season. If more positives are detected during the three-year sampling period, testing is extended. Read more.

A special muskie regulation on Minnesota's Leech Lake?: Leech Lake and its muskies have become ground zero in debate about forward-facing sonar and whether new regulations could protect big fish . . ."With the advent of techno advancements in angling, including FFS and rapid information exchange, catch-and-release muskie mortality appears to have soared. The expansive refuge of deep/open water is now bare ground - nowhere for the muskies to hide. The biggest muskies are concentrated in predictable areas. Handling stress, following the rigors of the spawn, makes increased mortality of the most valuable fish an unsustainable issue on the muskie population, "the report states. Read more.

Last Week at the Legislature:

The House of Representatives canceled scheduled hearings this week due to the Supreme Court decision on quorum.

On Tuesday at 3:00 PM, Senate <u>Capital Investment</u> heard overviews from Senate Counsel and Senate Fiscal staff. See: <u>Bonding Basics</u> and <u>Budget Presentation</u>. The committee will also heard from the following agencies regarding the Governor's Capital Investment recommendations: <u>Metropolitan Council</u>, <u>Minnesota Department of Natural Resources</u>, <u>Minnesota Pollution Control Agency</u> (see also: <u>MPCA Statewide drinking</u>

<u>water contamination mitigation</u>), <u>Minnesota Board of Water & Soil Resources</u> (see: <u>Local Government Road</u> Wetland Replacement Program), and Minnesota Department of Human Resources.

At 3:00 PM, Senate <u>Agriculture</u>, <u>Veterans</u>, <u>Broadband and Rural Development</u> met to hear a <u>presentation</u> from the Office of Broadband Development and presentations from broadband providers on changes to broadband statutes enacted last session. The committee also heard two bills relating to CWD: <u>S.F. 0553</u> (<u>Wesenberg</u>): Farmed Cervidae fencing requirements provisions modifications (see: written testimony in support from <u>Minnesota Elk Breeders Association</u> and <u>Minnesota Farm Bureau</u>, and <u>Report</u>: Moratoria on Cervid Farms is not Effective at Controlling the Spread of Chronic Wasting Disease prepared by Minnesota Elk Breeders Association, Minnesota Deer Farmers Association, North American Elk Breeders Association, and North American Deer Farmers Association; and <u>S.F. 0659</u> (<u>Wesenberg</u>): Certain duties transferal from the commissioner of natural resources to the Board of Animal Health (see: <u>Bill Summary</u>).

On Thursday at 8:30 AM, Senate <u>Taxes</u> discussed a number of bills including <u>S.F. 0345</u> (<u>Klein</u>): Nonprofit bird preservation organizations sales and use tax exemption authorization: see also: <u>Senate Research Summary</u>, <u>Fiscal Note</u>, and letters in support of the bill from: <u>Ducks Unlimited</u>, <u>Pheasants Forever</u>, and <u>Ruffed Grouse Society</u>.

Next Week at the Legislature:
