New House oversight panel aims to stop misuse of state grant dollars by nonprofits: A new House committee began working toward better preventing state grant dollars from being inappropriately spent. Rep. Kristin Robbins (R-Maple Grove) chairs the House Fraud Prevention and State Agency Oversight Policy Committee . . . Referencing a 2023 report, officials from the Office of the Legislative Auditor said state-funded grant expenditures to nonprofit organizations averaged \$514 million between fiscal years 2018-22. Of the roughly 2,400 recipients, the average grant was \$68,000. Most recipients are on the up and up, but still nefarious results have still occurred. In the office's presentation, Deputy Legislative Auditor Jodi Munson Rodriguez said state agencies are not complying on purpose, but a lack of training for grant management staff and the lack of a standard statewide grant registry system are among problems encountered. More: Some Minnesota lawmakers want to stop the practice of legislators giving money directly to nonprofits, concerned that it leads to uneven outcomes and lax oversight while favoring politically connected nonprofits: State government increasingly relies on nonprofits to complete its work . . . State agencies typically award a grant after performing background checks and analyzing numerous proposals, ultimately giving it to the applicant that best meets their criteria. But lawmakers can also go around that competitive process and directly name a nonprofit, granting funds in a budget bill through what are known as legislatively named grants . . . Ideally, Robbins said the Legislature should get rid of the practice of legislatively named grants, but she recognized that that would take time — and there's no mechanism to make lawmakers do it. According to a 2023 audit. Minnesota struggles to oversee money it sends out the door . . . Both competitive and legislatively named grants are supposed to go through the same type of oversight by state agencies, but

Legislative Auditor Judy Randall on Monday told members of the House fraud committee that her office has recommended that the Legislature stop employing legislatively named grants since 2007 . . . Marie Ellis, public policy director for the Minnesota Council of Nonprofits, said the vast majority of funding from the state to nonprofits is through the competitive process. But Ellis also said it can be unnecessary for a nonprofit to go through an onerous competitive process if, for example, they are the only organization in an area of Minnesota that provides that specific service.

House Republicans push for streamlined environmental permitting process: Rep. Josh Heintzeman (R-Nisswa) believes businesses needing environmental reviews and permits to operate in Minnesota are hampered by unnecessarily lengthy and burdensome permitting processes by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency. He sponsors HF8, which he says would modernize existing regulatory systems and make them more efficient . . . The bill would limit extensions from 60 days that a local unit of government must make certain determinations under the Wetland Conservation Act to one extension that could not exceed 60 days. It would also require that if an environmental or resource management permit is not issued or denied within the applicable goal for issuing permits, the agency must immediately begin review of the application and take all necessary steps to issue the final permit, deny the permit, or issue notice of the draft permit within 150 days of the date the goal was not met. To be more efficient, the agency would be required to issue separate permits for construction and operation of certain facilities and be required to issue these permits in a manner that minimizes the time required to construct and begin operation. DFL members are not convinced environmental regulations would not be relaxed under the bill and expressed concerns that public input on permitting would be reduced. One provision would limit public input by modifying the signature threshold needed on a petition to require an environmental assessment worksheet from 100 individuals who live or own property in the state to 100 individuals who live or own property in the county or one or more adjoining counties where a project is being proposed. New Minnesota DNR advisory committee meets for first time: Eli Mansfield, chair of the state chapter of Backcountry Hunters and Anglers, is also chairing the new DNR committee. The Fish and Wildlife Advisory Committee, the new iteration of the Minnesota DNR's citizen oversight committees, met for the first time on Monday, Feb. 3, for a kickoff. Read more.

Partnership between Minnesota DNR, Fond du Lac Band could bring elk to northeastern Minnesota: Elk used to roam across the entire state of Minnesota. Today there are just a few hundred, and only in the northwestern part of the state. But that could soon change. On Thursday night, the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources and the Fond du Lac Band of Lake Superior Chippewa [held] a public meeting to discuss the reintroduction of elk to the Fond du Lac Reservation and surrounding areas in northeastern Minnesota. It's a project that started more than ten years ago, and now is on its way to becoming reality. Read/Listen here.

Cattle producers, farmers cautious of Minnesota elk herd expansion: As elk damage continues in Minnesota and more funds are requested to handle that damage, plans for herd expansion continue to take shape. The current elk herds of northwest Minnesota may have some of the herd picked up and moved to northeast Minnesota on the Fond du Lac Reservation consistent with direction and funding provided by the Minnesota Legislature in 2023. It's a project that's been kicked around for the last 11 years . . . Members of the public have had opportunities to bring their comments and concerns to the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources about this plan including a public hearing on Monday, Feb. 11, via an online video call . . . Kaitlyn Root, executive director of the Minnesota State Cattlemen's Association, commented during the hearing and asked DNR staff what assurances they could give to cattle producers and farmers that this would not adversely affect them. Elk depredation is a chief concern of theirs. Read more.

Minnesota elk hunt offers more permits, expands area: "Elk populations have increased significantly and we've observed increasing conflict because of elk depredation, so the number of permits available near Grygla has been increased and a new hunt has been authorized in Kittson County," said Lou Cornicelli, DNR big game program coordinator. Hunters have until Friday, July 18, to apply for one of 23 elk permits. In total, 12 permits (two either-sex and 10 antlerless) will be offered in the Grygla Zone and 11 permits (one either-sex and 10 antlerless) will be offered in the Kittson County Zone in the Lancaster vicinity. State lawmakers introducing a bill to extend the state ban on mining in the Boundary Waters: It follows an executive order by President Trump that cancels a Biden Administration moratorium on mining: Ingrid Lyons is executive director of the nonprofit Save the Boundary Waters and says the area deserves the state's protection . . . Environmental groups have been fighting the project and said at the time their study is tantamount to an admission that the current mine plan is fundamentally flawed. They say mining the large untapped reserves of copper, nickel and platinum-group metals under northeastern Minnesota would pose unacceptable environmental risks because of the potential for acid mine drainage from the sulfide-bearing ore.
