# House Environment Committee discusses discounted fishing license fees for Minnesota's senior anglers:

Rep. Mary Franson (R-Alexandria) proffers HF413 that would let state residents aged 65 and older fish for free; HF276 would reduce their annual license fees to \$15. Rep. Jim Nash (R-Waconia) sponsors that bill. Adult residents now pay \$25 annually for an angling license until they turn age 90, when fees are waived. The House Environment and Natural Resources Finance and Policy Committee laid both over for possible inclusion in a committee bill . . . Eliminating licensing fees for residents 65 and older, as called for in the free fishing proposal, would cost the DNR an estimated \$4 million per year in lost fees, said Pat Rivers, deputy director of the department's Fish and Wildlife Division. An additional \$1.1 million would be lost annually because the DNR would also receive less money from an excise tax the state collects on fishing equipment purchases, which are distributed proportionally based on the number of fishing licenses purchased, he said. An annual reduction of \$5.1 million per year to the game and fish fund would need to be made up somehow, Rivers said, most likely by a fee increase to anglers under age 65. Read more.

Counties alarmed about potential 50% state cut to aquatic invasive species prevention: Gov. Tim Walz has proposed a 50% cut in Minnesota's \$10 million program to fight aquatic invasive species, and that has raised concerns among county officials . . . The money goes to counties to pay for education outreach and hands-on work, like boat cleaning stations and inspectors at public accesses, to prevent the spread of aquatic invasive species like zebra mussels and starry stonewort . . . The state created the \$10 million AIS aid program and has been distributing it to counties for at least a decade . . . That money goes to counties based on a formula that involves the number of public boat launches and accompanying parking spaces there are in each county . . . Read more.

Minnesota lawmakers look at speeding up environmental permitting process: The bills — HF8, introduced by Rep. Josh Heintzeman, R-Nisswa; and SF570, introduced by Sen. Grant Hauschild, DFL-Hermantown, and Sen. Justin Eichorn, R-Grand Rapids — encapsulate several reform proposals for Minnesota's environmental permitting process. Among them is a proposal to cap currently unlimited wetland permit extensions, to one extension of 60 days for local units of government to make permitting decisions under the Wetland Conservation Act. The bill also proposes that the commissioner of the Pollution Control Agency would oversee permits if the approval process exceeds 90 to 150 days, depending on the permit type. Additionally, the bills would restrict citizen petitions against projects to only those living within the county where the project is located, and allow permit applicants to request an expedited permit review . . . Environmentalists and concerned citizens met the bill with some resistance during its first hearing Thursday. Aaron Klemz, chief strategy officer for the Minnesota Center for Environmental Advocacy, said he believes Minnesota's permitting problem is with "a lack of enforcement and the inability to say no when proposals don't meet our environmental standards, not the lack of a deadline . . . ." How will job cuts to federal land agencies affect Minnesota? The Forest Service, which is within the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), is firing 3,400 employees, about a 10% reduction of the agency's workforce, according to a Reuters report. A USDA spokesperson said in a statement that the department "has made the difficult decision to release about 2,000 probationary, non-firefighting employees from the Forest Service." Here is what is known and unknown about the workforce at federal land-management agencies in Minnesota and the region: An agency employee in Minnesota who requested anonymity out of fear of retribution said the cuts and fallout have SNF staff "in crisis mode." More forest colleagues are worried they'll lose their jobs, and some career employees feel pressured to resign or risk losing benefits, the worker added. The workforce that manages the 3 million-acre national forest "already is 100 employees down" to about 250, said the employee. They include a variety of jobs such as rangers, firefighters, biologists, and visitor services staff . . . Before the newest job cuts, the Forest Service nationally was facing an expected \$500 million budget shortfall. SNF managers had said 23 seasonal jobs would go unfilled, meaning routine work such as cleaning campsites and messy trails would take a back seat. Read more and more.

DNR setting the table for a possible bigger walleye catch on Mille Lacs: State Fisheries Chief Brad Parsons and members of his staff at the Department of Natural Resources said Tuesday night they will give consideration to suggestions for a two- or three-fish walleye bag limit this year. In 2024, state-licensed anglers weren't allowed to keep a single walleye caught from Mille Lacs until August. The stringent regulation last year was borne out of concerns about overrunning last year's safe harvest level of a total of 91,500 pounds. Confident that this year's safe harvest level will be set significantly higher when negotiations conclude soon with Ojibwe tribes who share in management of Mille Lacs, Parsons and Brian Nerbonne of the DNR listened to hypothetical rule-setting suggestions from an 18-member advisory committee that met at Izatys Resort in Onamia and by teleconference. Members repeatedly vocalized a desire for the DNR to get aggressive with early-season harvest rules this year. Read more.

MPCA finalizes changes to feedlot general permits: In January, the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) finalized changes to the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) and State Disposal System (SDS) feedlot general permits. The finalization came after a public comment period over the summer and subsequent revision by the agency. Like the draft permits, the finalized permits require farms that accept transferred manure from permitted facilities to follow the same land application and reporting requirements as permittees. That includes adhering to the MPCA's list of nitrogen best management practices (BMPs)—practices that vary depending on the time of year and whether a farm is located in a <u>vulnerable groundwater area</u>. Notably, in vulnerable groundwater areas, the only allowable nitrogen BMP from Oct. 1-14 is application to a growing perennial or row crop or planting a cover crop prior to or within 14 days of application. Lawsuit derides 'Frankenstein's monster' omnibus bill as unconstitutional, but what says the Minnesota Supreme Court? The state constitution includes a "single-subject" rule for legislation, but omnibus bills remain omnipresent in Minnesota politics. The Minnesota Legislature's love of the omnibus bill — and whether it will ever push the state Supreme Court to enforce the constitution's "single-subject" rule — could get its biggest test in a lawsuit filed last week. In Minnesota Gun Owners Caucus v. Tim Walz et al, the plaintiffs argue that if any bill violates the provision that bills only cover a single subject, the record-setting 1,400-plus-page bill that ended the 2024 session might be the one . . . The suit asks the courts to toss out the entire law. Short of that, it asks that the sections dealing with binary triggers be invalided. Read more.

Study Examines the Age of Groundwater and Nitrate Trends in Southeast Minnesota: A newly published study by researchers at the Minnesota Department of Agriculture (MDA), the University of Minnesota's Minnesota Geological Survey, and the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources reveals new information about the age of groundwater in the state's distinctive Driftless Area of southeastern Minnesota . . .The results showed that most monitoring sites with elevated nitrate had groundwater less than 20 years old. Nitrate levels in this water were either decreasing or relatively steady. Improved agricultural practices may have contributed to these results. Read more.
