Coalition pushes legislation targeting waste left on Minnesota's frozen lakes: Sponsored by Rep. Andrew Myers (R-Tonka Bay), it would require the Department of Natural Resources — in consultation with the Pollution Control Agency and Board of Water and Soil Resources — to develop and administer a statewide Keep it Clean program to prevent water pollution from garbage and human waste left on the ice of state waters during winter activities. Grants would be available for local units of government and non-governmental organizations to implement initiatives to support the program . . . The House Environment and Natural Resources Finance and Policy Committee on Tuesday laid over the bipartisan bill — three of its eight co-sponsors are DFLers — for future consideration. The bill does not specify a desired funding request, something the committee will investigate when putting together its budget. Read more.

House bill seeks to expand 'carbon-free' energy definition to include burning wood waste: Rep. Spencer Igo (R-Wabana Township) . . . [is] sponsoring HF249 [which] would amend the definition of "carbon-free" technology to include energy produced by a utility that combusts wood chips derived from timber harvesting operations. On Tuesday, the House Energy Finance and Policy Committee approved the bill, as amended, by a voice vote and sent it to the House Floor. Legislation enacted in 2023 requires municipal utilities and

Igo referred to burning waste wood as "renewable carbon-free power," but more than one committee member took issue with that description, as well as Igo's contention that it could be called "carbon-neutral." One was Rep. Larry Kraft (DFL-St. Louis Park), who asked how a burning process that releases carbon into the atmosphere could be called "carbon-neutral." Read more.

Looming federal cuts complicate Minnesota budget: Minnesota lawmakers will start crafting a budget next month without knowing the impact of funding cuts, tax law changes, tariffs and other sweeping fiscal policies promised by the Republicans controlling the federal government. Next week's state budget forecast, which will tell state lawmakers how much money they have to work with for the next two-year budget, will not account for the massive spending cuts federal Republicans are targeting over the next decade, state budget director Ahne Minge said at a meeting of the Senate Finance committee Thursday . . . If those funding cuts come to fruition, however, the state would have to pay more for Minnesotans to maintain the same level of benefits. But the state is already spending more money than it's bringing in, and there's a potential \$5 billion deficit on the horizon starting in 2027, according to the most recent economic forecast. Read more. Senators on both sides agree any cuts from the federal government would create complications for passing a state budget here in Minnesota . . . But it's too early to say who would be affected until lawmakers receive more clarity from Congress. Read more.

Trump administration locks MPCA out of \$200 million in federal grants awarded to the state last year for community-based climate projects, leaving projects in limbo and underscoring the uncertainty and disruption unleashed by Trump's early budget cutting. Last July the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency awarded the money for initiatives to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, including climate-friendly farm practices, peatland restoration, energy efficiency, vehicle electrification and more . . . Now, the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency says the Trump administration has locked them out of those funds, and projects that had been planning on using the funding to get off the ground are scrambling to find alternatives. Nonprofit working on Mississippi River project loses federal funding: Ellen Reed, executive director Mississippi Park Connection, said her organization already completed about \$200,000 of a more than \$2.5 million, four-year project funded by the Inflation Reduction Act and the Infrastructure bill. Reed said despite court orders directing the White House to release the funding allocated by Congress, her group still can't access that money. Read more.

Red Lake Nation continues to speak out against plan to reintroduce elk to NE Minnesota: The Red Lake Nation feels overlooked by the DNR and the Fond du Lac Band of Lake Superior Chippewa, according to Red Lake Tribal Council member Allen D. Pemberton . . . He said they heard about the joint DNR and Fond du Lac plan to move elk from Red Lake Nation ceded territory in northwest Minnesota to northeast Minnesota at the same time as the public . . . Pemberton doubled down on his previous statement during a recent meeting on the issue that Red Lake will kill a moose in the Northland for every elk Fond du Lac takes from their territory where the band has rights to hunt. That land was given to the U.S. government in an 1863 treaty that

Pemberton says was forced upon them . . . DNR Elk Coordinator Kelsie LaSharr said Red Lake Nation was not part of the conversation initially because they weren't hunting elk in 2014 when Fond du Lac proposed the plan. Read more.

Energy panel advances bill to recycle wind, solar waste: HF1040, a bill sponsored by Rep. Peggy Scott (R-Andover) . . would require producers of solar panels and wind energy conversion systems to implement a product stewardship program to collect and recycle discarded solar and wind materials. It would prohibit the retail sale of such infrastructure in Minnesota unless the producer is participating in a stewardship plan approved by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency . . . In 2023, the Legislature mandated a study from the Pollution Control Agency on how to deal with the issue, and the report was released this week. Kirk Koudelka, assistant commissioner of land policy for the Pollution Control Agency, said that many of its recommendations dovetail with what's in the bill, particularly the need for a solar waste recycling program. Read more.

Avian flu surge, other issues prompts call for more emergency agriculture funding: Avian influenza [is] infecting Minnesota's meat birds, breeder turkeys, egg layer chickens, and, since October 2023, cattle herds. Minnesota farmers need to be prepared to face these and future agricultural emergencies, says Rep. Paul Anderson (R-Starbuck), chair of the House Agriculture Finance and Policy Committee and sponsor of HF1101. The bill would make a one-time \$1.5 million appropriation in fiscal year 2026 from the General Fund to the agricultural emergency account. . . . The committee laid over HF1101 for possible inclusion into the committee's budget bill. Read more.

Minnesota environmental groups sue state over nitrate pollution: The lawsuit is an attempt to get state agencies to adopt new fertilizer regulation rules. It's filed against the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA), which regulates manure spread as fertilizer, and the Minnesota Department of Agriculture (MDA), which regulates commercial fertilizer. Runoff from agriculture fertilizer has led to high nitrate levels in private wells. According to the Minnesota Health Department, consuming high levels of nitrate can lead to birth defects, thyroid problems and cancer. Read more.

Minnesota bills would provide cheaper fishing opportunities for older anglers: The House Environment and Natural Resources Committee forwarded two bills that would modify fishing licenses prices for people 65 and older. . . If anglers 65 and older weren't required to buy licenses, the state would lose about \$1 million from Sport Fish Restoration funding, as well as about \$4 million from the state's Game and Fish Fund. "An annual reduction of about \$5 million per year to the Game and Fish Fund will increase the urgency of a fee increase to ensure the solvency of the Game and Fish Fund," said Pat Rivers, deputy director of the DNR Fish and Wildlife Division. Responsible foraging on state lands subject of potential task force: Rep. Isaac Schultz (R-Elmdale Township) sponsors HF819, which he said came about when constituents learned in 2023 the DNR was considering severely limiting foraging in state parks without input from foragers . . . [The bill] would create a task force to study the issue and advise the Department of Natural Resources on how best to develop foraging regulations

that "balance the need for ecological sustainability with the right of Minnesotans to enjoy the state's bountiful natural resources." But the [DNR] is concerned because of reports from field staff who have seen 80-100 people at a time come to a single state park to gather food. That level of harvesting can have a "significant impact" on the food supply of other animals. Read more.

Senators Johnson Stewart, Eichorn, Hauschild, and Hawj introduced--S.F. No. 1751: A bill for an act relating to natural resources; implementing recommendations of Aggregate Resources Task Force; requiring a report; appropriating money; amending Minnesota Statutes 2024, sections 84.94, subdivision 4; 473.859, subdivision 2. Referred to the Committee on Environment, Climate, and Legacy.

Senators Pappas, Lang, and Housley introduced--<u>S.F. No. 1754</u>: A bill for an act relating to state government; transferring certain state-owned land in the Cloquet Forestry Center to the University of Minnesota; appropriating money for defeasance of outstanding debt on certain state bond financed property. Referred to the Committee on State and Local Government.

Senators Kupec and Johnson introduced--<u>S.F. No. 1770</u>: A bill for an act relating to agriculture; appropriating money for grants to the Northern Crops Institute. Referred to the Committee on Agriculture, Veterans, Broadband, and Rural Development.

Senators Dibble, Eichorn, Hauschild, Johnson Stewart, and Hawj introduced--S.F. No. 1833: A bill for an act relating to capital investment; appropriating money for forests and forestry capital projects; authorizing the sale and issuance of state bonds. Referred to the Committee on Capital Investment.

Baker, Koznick, Kotyza-Witthuhn and Her introduced: H. F. 1355. A bill for an act relating to occupational safety; requiring holders of permits to harvest or destroy aquatic plants to safely use scuba diving equipment; establishing requirements for commercial diving operations; amending Minnesota Statutes 2024, section 103G.615, subdivisions 1, 3; proposing coding for new law in Minnesota Statutes, chapter 182. The bill was read for the first time and referred to the Committee on Workforce, Labor, and Economic Development Finance and Policy.

Kozlowski; Heintzeman; Hansen, R., and Franson introduced: H. F. 1389. A bill for an act relating to state government; transferring certain state-owned land in the Cloquet Forestry Center to the University of Minnesota; appropriating money for defeasance of outstanding debt on certain state bond financed property. The bill was read for the first time and referred to the Committee on State Government Finance and Policy.

Freiberg; Anderson, P. H., and Klevorn introduced: <u>H. F. 1478.</u> A bill for an act relating to local government; amending priority criteria for public land survey system monument grant program; appropriating money; amending Minnesota Statutes 2024, section 381.125, subdivision 1. The bill was read for the first time and referred to the Committee on Elections Finance and Government Operations.

Stephenson and Bliss introduced: H. F. 1587. A bill for an act relating to state lands; appropriating money to condemn certain land in Cass County and authorizing its transfer for no consideration. The bill was read for the first time and referred to the Committee on Environment and Natural Resources Finance and Policy.

Senators Green, Hoffman, and Utke introduced--S.F. No. 1887: A bill for an act relating to state lands; requiring approval of the use of state money to acquire real property in fee; proposing coding for new law in Minnesota Statutes, chapter 16B. Referred to the Committee on Environment, Climate, and Legacy.

Senators Hawj, Eichorn, Utke, Housley, and Pappas introduced--S.F. No. 1960: A bill for an act relating to capital investment; appropriating money for construction of a new National Loon Center in the city of Crosslake; authorizing the sale and issuance of state bonds. Referred to the Committee on Capital Investment.

Koegel, Her, Heintzeman, Schultz, Lillie, Skraba, Gillman and Fischer introduced: H. F. 1633. A bill for an act relating to capital investment; appropriating money for capital improvement at public water access and boating facilities on public waters and at state fish hatcheries; authorizing the sale and issuance of state bonds. The bill was read for the first time and referred to the Committee on Capital Investment.

Davids, Her, Cha, Myers and Robbins introduced: <u>H. F. 1687</u>, A bill for an act relating to taxation; sales and use; providing an exemption for sales to nonprofit bird preservation organizations; amending Minnesota Statutes 2024, section 297A.70, by adding a subdivision. The bill was read for the first time and referred to the Committee on Taxes.

Warwas, Skraba and Kozlowski introduced: <u>H. F. 1729</u>. A bill for an act relating to state lands; authorizing private sale of certain tax-forfeited land. The bill was read for the first time and referred to the Committee on Environment and Natural Resources Finance and Policy.

Senators Pha, Rest, and Hoffman introduced-- <u>S.F. No. 1755</u>: A bill for an act relating to environment; appropriating money to improve water quality in Upper Twin Lake.

Senator Putnam introduced-- <u>S.F. No. 1839</u>: A bill for an act relating to agriculture; establishing a program to provide grants to prevent the spread of avian influenza; appropriating money. Referred to the Committee on Agriculture, Veterans, Broadband, and Rural Development.
