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## Vision, Values, History

Founded in 2005, Be the Change Earth Alliance (BTCEA) is a Canadian charity with a mandate to empower an environmentally sustainable, personally fulfilling, and socially just human presence on this planet. We deliver socio-ecological education and empowerment programs that help youth and adults take personal and collective action on environmental and social issues. We aim to help individuals align their values and actions, and truly "be the change" they wish to create in the world.

In BTCEA's early years, we worked in communities offering Awaken and Change symposia, Be the Change Action Circles, What's Your Tree Circles, and the Great Turning environmental forums. Inspired by the work of Joanna Macey and Ken Wilber's Integral Theory, these initiatives galvanized concerned citizens to take real action for positive change. Even today, we hear stories of the lasting impact of these efforts, including circles that continued for many years.



In 2009, responding to requests from parents, BTCEA stepped into the public education system with a series of school assemblies. We were impressed by the passion and motivation of young people seeking to better understand and respond to global sustainability issues. This had a profound impact on our organization. We shifted the focus of our programs to youth, and worked collaboratively with teachers to develop learning resources and workshops. These programs, ever since, have helped students grapple with and act upon major socioecological challenges, ranging from environmental justice to biodiversity loss and climate change.



We believe education has the power to inspire action, alter behaviour, and shift worldviews. Educating young people also creates ripples of change throughout society. Today, our top strategic goal is to make socio-ecological education the norm in BC schools. In service of this goal, BTCEA provides free online learning resources to schools, a variety of workshops and training courses to students, and Professional Development to teachers.

At BTCEA, we value empowerment, connection, and authenticity. We take a holistic approach to sustainability that integrates environment, social, and spiritual connections and empowers action. We acknowledge that we live, work and play on ancestral Indigenous land across BC and actively seek ways to bring the Truth and Reconciliation process into our lives and work.

# Message from Our Executive Director

I'll never forget the words a high school student named Natalie wrote in a letter to Vancouver City Councilors urging them to take climate action, back in summer 2019. It was her birthday. "I turned fourteen today," she wrote, "but instead of celebrating with my family and friends, I'm asking for my future. I want to live, grow old, and have a family, something that shouldn't be a luxury."

At the time, I was a Program Coordinator at BTCEA, and just dabbled my feet into the world of climate education and empowerment for youth. Natalie's words crystalized for me the distressing reality of youth climate anxiety. Witnessing how climate change was increasingly creating sadness, despair, helplessness and hopelessness, I set a personal conviction to help youth navigate these feelings and discover a sense of hope and agency on climate change. Half a year after Natalie's letter, I stepped into the role of Executive Director at BTCEA.

Part of what makes BTCEA's work special, I believe, is our emphasis on helping youth navigate climate-related anxiety and grief through peer-to-peer discussion and through taking tangible, personal and collective action. We aim to help youth like Natalie gain the knowledge, experience, skills and support to take meaningful climate action, whether it's reducing their carbon footprint, raising their voices, or working for structural change.

The 2021-2022 year was one for the record books. I am proud of how our diverse programs achieved both breadth – engaging 15,000 students across nearly every BC school district through workshops and learning resources – and depth – providing hands-on climate action mentorship to eight small teams of youth over the course of several months. We also continued to deepen our commitment to educating on climate justice and embodying the values of anti-racism, social justice, equity, diversity and inclusion in our workplace.

Beyond our educational offerings, I am proud of our staff team. Each member of our small, dynamic team of staff, all under 30-years-old, has moved me with their passion and commitment to meaningful climate education, resilience during the challenges of the pandemic, and consistent support, compassion and care for their fellow teammates. Our team has felt like a true community. I believe our efforts to "be the change" internally have helped manifest the positive impact you will read about in the coming pages.

As this report goes to print, I am in my final weeks as Executive Director, after over three years of service. This has been an incredible journey of learning and growth for me. I am deeply grateful for my teammates, Board Directors, our organizational partners and collaborators, and every member of the BTCEA community for their constant support. And it has been students like Natalie who have continuously inspired me with their courage, creativity and commitment.

As activist Adrienne Maree Brown writes, "when we are engaged in acts of love, we humans are at our best and most resilient." For me, leading BTCEA has been an act of love, and it has, I believe, brought out my best.

## **Program Highlights & Impact**

In 2021-2022, Be the Change Earth Alliance delivered **110** workshops, provided learning resources to **over 1,200** teachers, and engaged **over 15,000** students in environmental learning and action. Below, we highlight three significant, high-impact programs this year.

## **Student Leadership for Change**



Student Leadership for Change (SLC), our flagship program, is an online library of learning resources that enable teachers to engage their students in meaningful learning, dialogue, and action on environmental and social issues. SLC comprises student Action Packs, videos, lesson plans, classroom

activities, at-home projects, and more. This year, we featured a new package of learning resources focused on UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) which helped students explore and take action on six interconnected goal global goals.


In 2021-22, 1,289 teachers registered to use SLC, a notable increase from the previous two years' 716 and 410 teachers respectively. Those teachers brought holistic, action-oriented education to over 13,000 students in over 450 schools and 53 districts in British Columbia! In addition, BTCEA provided 16 Pro-D workshops, training 280 teachers on pedagogies and practical techniques for socioecological education.




### **Teacher Story - Lori York**

## **Empowering Workshops for Students**

Thanks to the success of our grant applications and the easing of pandemic restrictions, BTCEA delivered 110 classroom, outdoor and virtual workshops, more than doubling our goal of 50! We engaged 2,200 students in Metro Vancouver and across BC in hands-on, environmental education through three workshops and experiences. A notable feature of our workshops this year was an explicit focus on the UN SDGs, and how taking local action on interconnected social and environmental issues can advance these global priorities.

Water Is Life workshops focused on how threats to freshwater ecosystems intersect with climate change and social justice concerns. In this two-part series, students pledged to take tangible actions to reduce their ecological footprint after the first workshop, and reported back on their experience in the second. BTCEA calculated that students' actions reduced CO2 equivalent emissions by 133,528 kg, conserved 4,974,370 L of water and diverted 369 kg of plastic waste!

Youth Climate Ambassador workshops, delivered in partnership with the Climate Hub at UBC, empowered student participants to each create their own personal climate story, and to use this story to call their communities to take action on climate

justice. These peer-to-peer workshops are facilitated by UBC students, just a few years older than their high school counterparts, creating a unique space for teens to explore and share their emotions surrounding climate change and the affirmation that comes from taking meaningful action.

Youth Habitat Clean-ups educated students on how solid pollution impacts local ecosystems in a placed-based, experiential way. Students cleaned up 12 beaches and parks in Metro Vancouver, diverting over 200 kg of waste! Students reported habitat clean-ups to be fun and engaging.

### **Teacher Story - Dayna Margetts**

Dayna Margetts is an Environmental Science Teacher in Kelowna, who has recently stepped up as a volunteer Professional Development workshop presenter for BTCEA!

"The 2-part Water is Life workshop provided students with an opportunity to learn about real-world ways that they can reduce their water use and carbon emissions. They were then challenged to incorporate some of those behaviours into their daily lives and track their progress. They reported that the challenge helped bring the impact of such actions into their everyday decision-making, which empowered them to make more environmentally-conscious choices."

### Teacher Story - Liz Bendfeld

Liz Bendfeld (she/her) is a Science, Physical Education, Careers and Outdoor Education teacher at Frank Hurt Secondary in Surrey, BC. In 2021-2022, Liz booked us for four Water is Life workshops, two Climate Ambassador workshops, and one Youth Habitat Clean-up. She also utilized Student Leadership for Change in her classroom!

"I set a goal for pedagogical growth each year. My goal a few years ago was to prioritize climate crisis education in my classes – and discovering that BTCEA was offering a Professional Development workshop on that very subject was the perfect opportunity. I did not have a lot of background training or education in climate science or environmental science so I was looking for something that was entry level that I could learn along with my students. At the same time, I wanted to address climate anxiety in my students. Student Leadership for Change learning resources were the perfect tool to tick all those boxes. I also try to run my classes as paperless as possible and the PDFs and online links in the Action Packs make this easy to implement.

After my experience with SLC, I booked several workshops for my students. The Water is Life and Climate Ambassador workshops are so well done. The presenters are relatable and flexible. Students can come in with no background information and the presentations are great as an introduction but the presenters are so knowledgeable that if the students are coming in with lots of background information they can push their understanding further.

I have been doing Student Leadership for Change Action Packs for a couple of years now and I am starting to see the ripple-out effects. I have students come back and tell me about positive changes they are doing. I have had several students stick with habits that they formed through taking action challenges as part of my class. I have also spread the word about Action Packs and workshops in my school and I am finding that more teachers are teaching climate in their courses as a direct result of having these resources available. Due to the availability of BTCEA resources more teachers are teaching their students about climate issues and taking action."

## **Youth Mentorship on Climate Change**

Youth for Climate Action (Y4CA) empowered teams of Vancouver students to design and implement climate action projects in their communities. BTCEA provided hands-on mentorship, guidebooks and training workshops to 84 youth across eight teams. Y4CA participants gained key skills, experiences and most importantly – hope and agency – related to climate action. Here are some project highlights:

- Youth from three different schools collaborated to design and deliver three climate justice Professional Development workshops to inspire and support 48 teachers to bring climate justice education into the classroom.
- Youth worked to advocate and support their school to create a more sustainable school cafeteria by encouraging plant-based menu options and creating clear signage for waste and recycling.
- Two youth teams created ecological rain gardens to divert run-off from entering storm drains, support local pollinators and create community green spaces.

Grade 8 students at Lord Byng Secondary School explore what climate justice means to them during a workshop designed and delivered by their school's Y4CA team in June 2022.

Another mentorship program, Reclaiming the Environmental Narrative (REN), supported seven youth (aged 14-24) from Black, Indigenous, and People of Colour (BIPOC) communities to gain confidence as storytellers and environmental changemakers. Each participant developed a multimedia storytelling project that explored their relationship with nature, the climate crisis, and the environmental challenges affecting them and their community. Projects included an animation, a play, a novel, and a poetry collection, and were highlighted at an online Showcase event in March 2022.

"It helps me feel less alone and overwhelmed by the climate crisis. I feel like I have a better idea of how to handle emotions that relate to eco-anxiety. I also have learned a lot about how to recruit people and have a meaningful conversation with them. Those are both very useful skills that I have been struggling with for a while."

## **Organizational Development**

## **Strategic Collaborations**

Building meaningful, reciprocal, trusting relationships with other organizations and education stakeholders is an important part of BTCEA's DNA and theory of change. This year stands for how we strengthened our relationship with the UBC Climate Hub and Vancouver School Board Sustainability, and built new relationships with Classrooms to Communities network, RAVEN Trust and Vancouver Black Library.

BTCEA and the UBC Climate Hub have collaborated on the Youth Climate Ambassador Project since 2019 (see above). Each year, the personal and professional relationships between our organizations have deepened. This year, we co-applied for and won two significant grants, from the City of Vancouver and the Canadian Red Cross, which will enable us to bring climate storytelling training to a diverse student body in Metro Vancouver and in Kamloops, BC.

After working together in various capacities for over five years, BTCEA and the Vancouver School Board Sustainability deepened our collaboration this year. At our bi-weekly meetings, staff from each of our organizations explore strategic opportunities to advance holistic environmental education in Vancouver. A highlight of our year was collaborating with high school students to hold a Professional Development workshop, "Learning from Students & Each Other: Rethinking Climate Education" to over 30 teachers in February 2022.

# Justice, Equity, Diversity and Inclusion


The BTCEA Board of Directors, staff and volunteers recognize that embodying justice, equity, diversity and inclusion (JEDI) is crucial, ongoing work. When it comes to decolonizing our perspectives, both personally and organizationally, we acknowledge that we are early on this journey. Yet we remain highly committed to both short and long-term change – dismantling systems of oppression within our organization, within our pedagogies, and within the education system more broadly.

This year, our staff set goals to:

- 1. Continue to improve internal workplace culture to uphold JEDI.
- Improve and revise learning resources and educational programs to uphold social justice and anti-racism.
- Develop organizational policy and practice around JEDI.
- 4. Build relationships and partnerships with social justice and BIPOC-led organizations.
- 5. Seek and receive guidance and accountability on our JEDI work, in part through external advisors.
- 6. Improve how we communicate JEDI priorities, work, and progress internally and externally.

For each goal, we felt we made some progress. For example, we formed a Policy Committee to develop and revise organizational policies to be more equitable and inclusive; launched the REN initiative (see above); received feedback on how to improve our workplace culture through a JEDI internal staff survey; and formed new relationships with Vancouver Black Library and RAVEN Trust to offer support and work towards future collaborations. We also took time to reflect, learn and unlearn through readings, small group discussion and full-team meetings. We know there is much more to do, and we are earnest in efforts to advance this work in a bold, equitable way.
