Glossary

The simple definitions below are provided for ease of reference while you complete your Student World View. They will appear in *bold italic*.

Dominant Social Paradigm (DSP)	Paradigm: a clear pattern of something or way of looking at something. The DSP is the view that humans are superior to all other species, the Earth provides unlimited resources for humans, and that progress is an inherent part of human history.			
Environmental World View	A perception of the world and the way we interact with it that supports environmental or ecological priorities for the sustainability of all current life forms, in the present and future. An environmental world view includes the specific concepts defined in the New Environmental Paradigm (NEP).			
Ethical	Refers to the morality or 'right and wrong' nature of human actions.			
Factory Farms	Also known as Industrialized Farms, raise large numbers of farm animals indoors in small closed areas; intended to maximize production at minimal cost.			
Food Additives	Substances (often chemical) added to foods to preserve and enhance taste and appearance.			
GMO	An organism whose genetic material has been altered by using genetic engineering.			
Industrial World View	This world view holds the belief that continued and increasing economic growth and consumption is the best course of action for human society. The Dominant Social Paradigm (DSP) defines certain attributes of the Industrial world view used in this survey.			
New Environmental Paradigm (NEP)	The view that humans represent only one among many species on Earth; that human activities are determined by the environment as well as by social and cultural factors; and that humans are strongly dependent upon the environment and its resources.			
Preservatives	Substances that delay food spoilage.			
Processed Food	Foods that are packaged in boxes, cans or bags. These foods need to be processed extensively to be edible and are not found as is in nature. They often contain additives, artificial flavorings and other chemical ingredients.			
Sustainability	The ability to continue a defined behavior indefinitely. Global sustainability refers to the ability of the planetary life support systems to continue indefinitely, for future generations.			
World View	The overall perspective, ideas and attitudes from which one sees and interprets the world. A collection of beliefs about life and the universe held by an individual or group.
