Summary Report

















About the Forum

In partnership with leading healthcare stakeholders, the Climate and Health Alliance (CAHA) has run annual events focusing on environmentally sustainable healthcare since 2012 (excluding 2020).

The vision of the Greening the Healthcare Sector Forum is to:

- inspire healthcare stakeholders to make positive changes towards a more sustainable healthcare system;
- provide an opportunity to build connections, share knowledge, learn from others, and build new skills:
- showcase current examples of research, policy and practice supporting the transition to net zero carbon and environmentally sustainable healthcare.

In 2023, CAHA and the Western Australian Department of Health's (WA Health) Sustainable Development Unit (SDU) partnered to deliver the Greening the Healthcare Sector Forum in Perth. South Metropolitan Health Service hosted the Forum at the Fiona Stanley Hospital. The event was also fully available online.

2023 program

The theme of this year's forum was "Empowering action for sustainable, climate resilient healthcare". The world is striving for a low carbon, sustainable and climate resilient future – and healthcare delivery must change alongside it. It's evident we need to act – but how do we actually drive the shifts in our healthcare system we need to bring about change? How do we engage our decision makers, suppliers, our colleagues and our patients in the process? How do we overcome barriers to progress?

The forum focused on the 'how' – how do we empower action to deliver sustainable and climate resilient healthcare?

Main program

A diverse line-up of speakers, from healthcare, government, industry partners, academia and beyond, shared their expertise on current research, policy, industry innovations and practical examples of sustainable healthcare in action.

In addition to the Welcome session, there were four sessions across two days:

- Strategy and systems
- Engagement and leadership
- Sustainability in practice
- Caring for Country

Awards

Sustainable Healthcare Champion Award

In 2023, the Forum organising team called for nominations for its inaugural Sustainable Healthcare Champion Award. The award recognises a person or team who has demonstrated passion for sustainable, low-carbon, climate resilient, equitable and effective health systems. They are someone who has gone above and beyond to bring about real and tangible change.

The Forum Steering Committee selected the winner, Dr Sarah Joyce, the Sustainable Development Officer in the WA Health SDU. As Project Director for the world's first statutory inquiry into climate change and health, Sarah played a significant role in the development of the framework which has allowed the WA health system to respond to climate change and inspired positive climate action more broadly.



Greening the Healthcare Sector Forum People's Choice Award

Attendees had the opportunity to vote for the best poster presented at the Forum. This award was presented to 'Food Organics at FSH Patient Catering' by Genaveve Palmer at the Department of Patient Catering, Fiona Stanley Hospital.

Attendance

The Forum organising team aimed to ensure the Forum was relevant for a wide range of people working in or connected with the health sector in Australia and New Zealand.

The Forum brought together health and aged care sustainability champions, leadership and executive, government representatives, students, researchers and suppliers from across Australia and New Zealand. Together, attendees explored the big issues and solutions to fostering a healthy, sustainable future for people and the planet.

Attendee numbers included:

- 240 attendees over both days in person
- 21 group viewings (included ~135 attendees on both days)
- 162 attendees online over both days

A total of 37 expert speakers and 14 workshop facilitators took part in the Forum.

Environmental sustainability at the Forum

To minimise the environmental footprint of the Forum:

- Attendees could join online instead of travelling to the venue
- Attendees were provided with information about how to reach the venue via active and public transport
- Carbon emissions associated with the Forum were offset
- Vegetarian/vegan catering was provided
- Waste minimised through reusable serviceware where possible
- Attendees were encouraged to BYO reusable water bottles and coffee cups
- Tickets and Forum program were all available electronically for attendees


Presenters and facilitators were gifted Banksia Aroma Pods from Banksia Gifts Australia.

Attendee feedback

A total of 60 survey responses were received. Of these respondents, 53.3% (n=32) attended in person, 33.3% (n=20) online and 13.3% (n=8) online as a group. The majority of those who responded attended both days (69.5%), while 25.4% attended day 1 and 5.1% attended day 2.

Overall satisfaction

86.7% (n=52) of respondents reported that they were either very satisfied or satisfied with the Forum. The remaining responses reported satisfaction as either neutral (10%, n=6) or dissatisfied (3.3%, n=2).

The key areas which respondents reported they liked most about the Forum included:

- Caring for Country session
- Quality of presentations and diversity of speakers
- Opportunity to participate in workshops and tours
- Practical message from presentations
- Opportunity to network with others

- "Engaging presentations, some excellent speakers showcasing some impressive work that is occurring."
- "Learning about what is happening across Australia and NZ. It is not often that you can be involved in this type of forum to increase your knowledge."
- "High calibre of presenters, and great diversity of topics. Excellent and meaningful Caring for Country session."
- "Very inspirational forum which left me with a sense of hope that I can make a difference at my own health care organisation"

Key lessons respondents reported they learnt from the Forum:

- Urgency of action
- The importance of working with First Nations peoples and embedding Caring for Country into healthcare initiatives
- Small changes can result in big impacts
- Current initiatives underway across Australia and New Zealand
- Collaboration and breaking down of silos is needed for effective implementation of strategies
- Need for top down and bottom up efforts
- "First nations learnings were rich, and if we all valued the land as they have, we would be better off. The importance of student and clinician education re climate change; and the importance of exercise as transport and to promote health, whilst warding off noncommunicable diseases"
- "Many facilities are making much effort to reduce waste and use more environmentally friendly practices. Changes need to be made from the executive level, and they need to see past the immediate possible increase in costs or labour, and view it as a public health/preventative concern. The bottom line will become apparent once procedures are in place."
- "we all can do something areas where you think there can't be big changes, there can be (e.g. eye clinic) let's not make excuses, let's be bold and look at innovative ways. the need for information sharing between areas of government (between the different Health service providers)"
- "Helped me 'find-my-tribe' and linked me in with resources / websites / organisations / templates / funding sources and scholarship and funding opportunities that I didn't even know existed and would have taken me a long time to find on my own."
- "Look to NZ for leadership in the journey towards zero carbon footprint. Learn the lessons from Sweden, Netherlands and the UK. We need a voice in Australia for Sustainable Health Care, by the people for the people, and including our First Nations people, listen to their collective wisdom. Work towards a bicultural Health Model. It all starts with Change Behaviours..."


Actions respondents shared they would take post forum:

- Embed climate and health into resources for health professionals and undergraduate curriculum
- Start the conversation at their workplace
- Pursue collaboration opportunities with new contacts
- Share information and learnings with colleagues
- Start a quality improvement project
- Pursue publication of the work they have already completed
- Involve Traditional Owners in sustainability planning
- Advocate for a sustainability officer position at their organisation
- Put together a business case for implementing sustainability initiatives

The key areas which respondents reported could be improved largely related to technical challenges related to the hybrid delivery of the Forum.

Forum exposure
