

Message from Joan Lawrence

Co-Chair of the Calgary
Climate Hub

I regret that I will not be able to join you at the AGM this year as my son is graduating that night and I must be with him. If I could duplicate myself, I would. This is a familiar feeling, and one I know that many of you share: there is so much to do, and so little time. If only there were more of us to go around.

But guess what? There *are* more of us. And there will be still more of us in the year ahead. The work that the Hub has done, that you have done as Hub members and volunteers, has accomplished what once seemed impossible: We have helped make it acceptable to talk about climate change in Canada's oil capital. More than talk about it--we have made it acceptable to do something about it.

On a snowy night in November of 2019, I stood on a cold porch waiting to find out if I would be invited in to join the Board of the Calgary Climate Hub. At the time, I had only a very basic understanding of climate change, a limited awareness of what municipal-level climate action might look like, and no idea at all of the huge challenges the pandemic would bring. What I did have was time on my hands, and a sense of urgency.

When I crossed that threshold, what I found was others who shared my sense of urgency, who were willing to let me take chances and make mistakes, and gave generously of their time to help me learn. Over my past two years as Co-chair I have been given so many learning opportunities: how to talk to a city councillor, how to chant at a demonstration, how to write an MOU, how to chair a meeting, how colonization is at the root of climate change.

I will be forever grateful to the amazing people I have met. Working alongside you has been a tremendous privilege. I would particularly like to recognize my Co-chair, Rob Tremblay. Rob, you work so hard and have such an enormous impact. Thank you for your dedication and support.

It's normal for people to come and go in an organization, whether they are members or volunteers. The thing about climate change is, you don't stop caring and working on it even if you leave. The Hub has created many tiny spokes, some as small as a single person, who are spreading the message that the climate emergency is real, that it is caused by our actions, and that we can do something about it right here in our own community. That taking action with and for each other changes not only our climate, but also ourselves.

There is still so much to do. There are so many more people doing it. We can help each other.

Message from Robert Tremblay

Co-Chair of the Calgary
Climate Hub

New to the Hub was levelling up our capacity with our wonderful new-in-2022 Director Angela McIntyre and Volunteer Coordinator Daniel Smithies joining our stalwart resident climate communicator Steve Bentley. They brought creativity, professionalism and, critically, dedicated time in pursuit of our mission to make Calgary a climate leader. Notably we launched the Climate Lens podcast.

Additionally, new leaders such as Rob Miller and Heather Addy came into frame to lead our Forests for Calgary initiative to plant tiny forests around Calgary, especially in areas underserved by our current tree canopy.

My focus within the Hub has typically been on our advocacy to city hall. In this regard we did more than I have ever seen and focused on two major points of advocacy: the updated Calgary Climate Strategy and the 2023 Four Year Budget. We both strategized and mobilized.

We authored numerous positions such as eight one-page style position papers outlining what we though should be in the Climate Strategy on topics from electricity to land-use and a "budget platform" outlining our desired budgetary measures to fund the Climate Strategy. Using these pieces, we built relationships with and advocated directly to councillors as both items went through council.

We mobilized hundreds of Calgarians to speak to councillors through emails, private meetings and presentations to council in order to push our collective positions stronger climate action from the City. We were successful in lobbying key councillors for the passage of the Climate Strategy, with key amendments supporting net-zero by 2035 electricity. Critical to this effort was a Day of Action in which we organized group meetings between our members and 8 our of 14 councillors to speak to the importance of a climate strategy with a strong vision, all on the same day. We also secured further funding for climate action in the budget, with an additional \$40M for cycling infrastructure amended into the budget in response to over 40 speakers mobilized by the Hub and partners demanding more for the climate. Partnerships were key to our efforts with Calgary Alliance for the Common Good, Bike Calgary, Project Calgary, Alberta Wilderness Association and Action Dignity coming to mind.

Looking forward to next year, I am keen to see our advocacy continue and focus on bringing new leaders forward to scale up our capacity. I believe that what isn't asked for isn't considered, and I am keen to see us continue to ask why we can't have a city that shows more leadership on addressing the defining issue of our time: climate change.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

WHAT HAPPENED IN 2022

In 2022 the members of the Calgary Climate Hub stood shoulder to shoulder in pursuit of making Calgary a leader on Climate Action. We advocated for better municipal policies and the proper budget to support those policies. We spoke at City Hall, we planted trees, we rode bikes, we sang songs, we chanted, and we rallied.

At the heart of all this work, we supported the individuals who want a little less conversation and a little more action please.

We have been actively advocating for policies and actions that address climate change, such as promoting renewable energy, reducing emissions from the oil and gas sector, and supporting the 5A Transportation Network (Always Available for All Ages and Abilities).

The Forests For Calgary Project is a step towards Environmental Justice, an attempt to address the inequality of the tree disbursement across Calgary by planting trees in communities that need them the most.

In addition to these accomplishments, the Calgary Climate Hub has been active in engaging with the community through our book club, networking events, climate partnerships, and education.

I want to thank each and every one of you for your tireless efforts and showing up to make a difference. This work isn't easy but it's easier knowing we aren't alone. One of the memories I hold dear from 2022 is the line of 125 volunteers on a hill, passing trees hand to hand, to plant in a valley. Dr. Joe Vipond took a look at me and he said "I think you're crying." He was right. I was.

AACOC NUMBERS:

times.

THE CLIMATE LENS PODCAST

Created in spring of last year with our first show in July and our latest show airing April 20th of 2023, the Climate Lens has become a new means of tying the biggest, hottest climate and climate-adjacent news stories on the planet to Hub-specific initiatives right here in Calgary. Topics ranged from a multi-episode deep-dive on urban sprawl versus smart-growth, November Calgary budget activism, COP27, the energy transition in Alberta, our upcoming provincial election and more.



Messages From Our Partners

Calgary Alliance for the Common Good

The first year of work on the Calgary Foundation Climate Organizing grant focused on education, training and dialogue, conducting research and bringing together experts to create a range of possible scenarios for a just transition while knitting together partners for action. The leaders we worked with and trained were able to use their training to take action to support the City of Calgary in adopting the Calgary Climate Strategy: Pathways to 2050, which was successful in July 2022. Research and action after the adoption of the Climate Strategy shifted to addressing the four-year budget cycle to ensure that funding was allocated to the Climate Strategy pathways in November 2022. Through collaboration, shared research and discourse across diverse organizations and community groups, 128 people registered to speak to the city council and successfully secured over \$128 million in funding for transit, active infrastructure, and the arts in November 2022.

As we move into year two, focus will be on continued relationship building among local stakeholders, training leaders within CCH to set strategic priorities, and establishing Climate Strategy implementation monitoring and research to inform action in holding decision-makers accountable.







Climate Partners with Arusha

- · Program designed and implemented

Project Conclusions:

- Proved participant willingness to meet for 20 hours over three months and commit to climate projects.
- Relationships and support established with Federation of Calgary Communities and City of Calgary, with support for CA-focussed approach.
- Diversity of climate-relevant themes: equity, transport, food, software, policy, etc.


