Agriculture and Natural Resources Budget:

In **Agriculture and Natural Resources Budget** we heard and update on the World Cup.

Taxation:

In **Taxation** we finished voting on bills to get them on floor.

Appropriations:

The House **Appropriations** committee finished working through the House Budget Bill (HB2434) and agency budgets. These will now move to House Floor which we will work the week of February 23.

On the House Floor: These bills will now move to the Senate.

HB2653 – Requires the secretary of correction to assist inmates with obtaining identification and the documentation needed for employment prior to release from custody. This includes certified copy of birth certificate, social security card, driver's license or state identification card, resume with inmate's skills and trades, vocational and educational training records.

SB30 – would require new occupational licensing requirements and material changes to occupational licenses by a state agency be approved by joint resolution of the legislature.

HB2615 – would designate a portion of U.S. highway 75 as the Brig Gen George H Wark memorial highway and redesignating a current portion of the purple heart/combat wounded veterans for U.S. highway 75.

- Voted Yea

HB Sub for SB281- would require and permit public elementary and secondary school to adopt policies and procedures regulating the use of personal electronic devices (cell phones) and social media platforms, this includes in the classroom, passing period, and lunch time. Requiring all cell phones to be turned off and locked or stowed.

The bill would allow students to use a cell phone to contact guardian by a school phone and when required for a personalized education program (IEP) or 504 plan.

The bill would also provide indemnity for lost or damaged devices and exempt virtual schools.

HB2605 – would designate a portion of U.S. highway 36 as the deputy sheriff Brandon Gaede memorial highway.

- Passed
- Voted Yea

HB2491 – would require state agencies to report quarterly noncitizens receiving public benefits to the secretary of state, to ensure voter rolls are up to date and noncitizens are removed.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2451 – would prohibit government officers and employees to use public assets to advocate for or against proposed amendments to the constitution of the state of Kansas and ballot questions.

- Passed

HB2453 – requires applications for advance voting ballots be filled 14 days prior to election day, advanced voting by completed by 12:00p.m. the Sunday prior to election day, extends the time for transmittal of advance voting to 22 days prior to the election, and ending voter registration 23 days before election day.

HB2214 – would enact the Safeguarding American Veteran Empowerment (SAVE) Act, which would limit compensation for certain assistance of veteran benefits. I proposed an amendment to require accreditation which failed.

HB2220 – would permit local authorities with jurisdiction over city residence districts to reduce the maximum speed limit to 25 miles per hour without an engineering and traffic investigation.

HB2412 – would amend the crimes of endangering a child and aggravated endangering a child, increasing the penalties one level.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2364 – would prohibit health insurer from denying coverage of a non-opioid in favor of an opioid prescription or requiring a patient to try an opioid prescription drug prior to providing coverage of the non-opioid prescription.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2393 – would extend the Judicial Branch surcharge on various docket fees through June 30, 2030. Along with removing any outdated statutory references and dates.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2444 – when consecutive sentences are imposed, they cannot be imposed to more than one case. Creating special sentencing rules when a felony is committed while on probation, parole, or post release supervision.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2610 – would limit the use of a summons instead of a warrant for the arrest of a defendant to misdemeanor crimes and requiring that any bond set after failing to appear to a summons shall not allow the defendant to be released on the defendant's own recognizance.

HB2537 – increases the penalties for sexual extortion when the offender is over 18 years of age and the victim is less than 18 or a dependent adult.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2518 – would increase the criminal penalties for certain violations of the breach of privacy and modifying the culpable mental state required to commit such crimes from “knowingly and without lawful authority” to “intentionally and without lawful authority.”

- Passed

- Voted

HB2747 – when calculating a person’s criminal history score under the Kansas sentencing guidelines act, all courts shall consider certain factors in determining whether a prior violation of law is comparable to any act described in certain driving under the influence crimes.

HB2613 – the crime victims compensation board shall establish and pay the fee for examination of persons who may be victims of sexual assault. The board will be reimbursed the costs being paid by the defendant.

HB2614 – adds exceptions regarding the victims and compensation board to confidentiality requirements.

- Passed
- Voted Yea

HB2536 – would require guardians for adults with cognitive impairment or diagnosed with a neurological condition to complete training approved by the secretary for aging and disability services prior to appointment.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2501 – would provide immunity from civil liability for firearms licensees who enter a firearm hold agreement with a firearm owner at the end of the agreed term.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2504 – would prohibit cities or counties from adopting resolutions that prohibit landlords from refusing to lease due to a financial payment or consideration from the federal Housing Choice Voucher Program or any other housing assistance programs where participation by landlords is voluntary, restrict landlord’s ability to consider income qualifying methods, or limits the amount a landlord may require for security deposit.

HB2560 – would authorize the state board of regents to sell and convey certain property in the city of Manhattan, Riley County, Kansas on behalf of Kansas State University (KSU).

- Passed
- Voted Yea

HB2374 – would alter the student medical loan act to create the specialty practice student loan program and ending the psychiatry and OBGYN medical student loan

program. The bill would also establish a specialty practice student loan repayment fund and transfer funds and liabilities from the abolished fund.

HB2594 – Modifies the crime of blackmail related to threatened dissemination of any videotape, photograph, film, or image of another identifiable person who is nude or engaged in sexual activity by removing the connection to breach of privacy and describing the content of the videotape, photograph, film, or image. The bill would add media created, altered, or modified by AI.

HB2591 – would give financial institutions additional tools to protect members against fraud by allowing members to allow a trusted friend or family member to be contacted if financial exploitation is suspected and allow suspicious transactions to be temporarily delayed for up to 10 business days when exploitation is suspected.

HB2497 – would change statute to provide that no prepayment penalty shall be assessed more than 6 months after the execution of a note made primarily for personal, family, or household purposes. The bill would still allow prepayment penalties on real estate mortgages for commercial purposes.

HB2590 – changes the Kansas Trust Code to create the Kansas Community Property Trust Act, add powers to a trustee to reimburse the settlor of a grantor trust, allow a designated representative of a trust, expand the settlor's intent on governor instruments, and clarify the duty to inform and report to beneficiaries.

- Voted

HB2606 – would amend the definition of "conviction" in the Kansas Uniform Driver's License Act to align with the federal law establishing standards for commercial driver's licenses.

- Passed
- Voted Yea

HB2408 – leased ground owned by a county-recognized community land trust shall be considered as a factor in determining fair market value. TAX

- Passed
- Voted Yea

HB2437 – would authorize the use of additional resources for verifying voter records, removing individuals disqualified for voting from such records and providing an open records request exemption for certain information relating to such records.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2477 – would require the Kansas department of agriculture to publish on the department's official website, showing the location of all applied for diversions of water, including requested changes in the point of diversion more than 300 feet and expanding the current notice requirement to apply to all landlords within half a mile of proposed diversions or changes.

- Passed
- Voted Yea

HB2462 – requires the secretary of health and environment to adopt rules and regulation that allow for direct and indirect potable reuse of treated water.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2460 – provides exception to the KORA for members of the legislature to have identifying information, such as home addresses or home ownership, restricted from public access.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2511 – amends law that directs the Kansas State Department of Wildlife and Parks (KDWP) to establish separate accounts of the State Agricultural Production Fund for each state-owned property under the control and jurisdiction of the Secretary of Wildlife and Parks The bill would require the separate accounts to be used for habitat management costs and expenses associated with all state-owned properties.

HB2489 – requires school districts to provide fentanyl abuse education programs and maintain supplies of naloxone.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2485 – authorizes the chief executive officer of the state board of regents to negotiate and settle repayment obligations under scholarship, grant or other financial aid programs administered by the board. The bill would prohibit the payment of additional funds to students subject to repayment obligations.

- Passed

HB2663 – would change the requirements for student cohorts and achievement goals for school district at-risk accountability plans.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2530 – provides transferability to credentials earned through ACT work keys readiness assessments towards a degree.

- Passed
- Voted Yea

HB2555 – requires all grant applications to be submitted to the Rural Health Transformation Program, following review by the Kansas Rural Health Innovation Alliance, be presented to the State Finance Council. The presentation must include the grant recipient, purpose, planned expenditures, physical location, and intended outcomes. Also requiring quarterly performance reports after the funds are spent to the State Finance Council.

HB2368 – enacting the Anesthesiologist Assistant Licensure Act, adding regulations and licensure of anesthesiologist assistants (AAs) under the Kansas State Board of Healing arts.

- Failed on Voice Vote in Committee of the Whole

HB2562: permitting the issuance of special license plate or permanent or temporary placard for a person with a disability based on documentation from a physical therapist.

- Passed
- Voted Yea

HB2562 – allows for special license plate or permanent or temporary placard to be issued for a person with a disability with documentation from a physical therapist.

- Passed
- Voted Yea

HB2737 – enacting the taxpayer agreement act to provide a alternative method for tax increment financing of municipal economic projects.

- Passed
- Vote

HB2700 – allows who purchase or lease digital electronic equipment to obtain the legal authorization and needed documentation and parts to maintain and repair equipment.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2481 – removes requirement that a hotel, motel, or tourist court must have more than two bedrooms to qualify for collecting the transient guest tax, and that all qualifying rentals collect the tax.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2602 – establishes requirements for a portable benefit plan for independent contractors.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2604 – would include gross vehicle weight in the definitions for classes of commercial motor vehicles for drivers' licenses purposes. The bill would also modify the definition of commercial motor vehicle, "air mile and gross vehicle weight in the Kansas uniform commercial drivers' license act."

- Passed
- Voted

HB2603 – defines and establishes criteria "battery-charged security fence". The bill would prohibit municipalities from adopting or enforcing ordinances, resolutions, codes, standards, or regulations related to fences, as described in the bill.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2460 - provides exception to the KORA for members of the legislature to have identifying information, such as home addresses or home ownership, restricted from public access.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2507 – increases the cap on migratory waterfowl stamps fees for residents from \$8 to \$25 and \$100 for non-residents. While removing requirements for the stamp to be validated by the stamp holder's signature.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2505 – Amends the Kansas Open Records Act to not require the Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks (KDWP) to disclose the precise location of endangered species or in danger of becoming endangered.

- Passed
- Voted Yea

HB2729 – amends informed consent provisions of the Woman's-Right-to-Know Act concerning required information and required notice signs for both abortion procedures and medication abortions.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2727 – allows plaintiffs to elect to limit recovery in claims brought for violations of the informed consent provisions of the Woman’s-Right-to-Know Act and would not allow parties to the suit to request the convening of medical malpractice screening.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2635 – creates the Pregnancy Center Autonomy and Rights of Expression Act, prohibiting regulations, policies, procedures, or other measures that would prohibit or require pregnancy center take specific action. Proponents believe the bill would protect freedom of speech and association. While opponents state the bill favors individuals of a certain faith over the rights of others and concerns with the conduct of pregnancy centers.

HB2642 – removes obsolete reference to global intangible low-taxed income provided under the federal internal revenue code in determining Kansas adjusted gross income.
TAX

- Passed
- Voted Yea

SB244 – requires designation of multiple-occupancy private spaces in public buildings for use by only one sex imposing criminal and civil penalties for violations. Defining “gender” as biological sex at birth for statutory construction, directing division of vehicles to invalidate and reissue driver’s licenses.

- Motion to Veto Prevailed
- Voted against

HB2435 – amends the Gas Safety and Reliability Policy Act, allowing gas utilities to recover growth-related capital investments throughout Gas System Reliability Surcharge (GSRS) and adjust the timing of Kansas Corporation Commission (KCC) proceeding to complete a GSRS docket from 120 days to 90 days, and raise the cap on monthly charges to residential customers.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2647 – authorizes the Kansas department of transportation to establish a statewide fiber system for transmitting broadband connections. The bill would establish the Kansas Broadband Revolving Fund in the State Treasury to create and maintain the system.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2574 – creates law and amends provisions concerning the administration and organization of information technology and cybersecurity services within each branch of state government and certain elected officials.

- Passed
- Voted

Sub Bill for HB2731 – requires the Secretary for Children and Families and the Office of the Inspector General (OIG) to exchange documents related to cash assistance, childcare assistance, and food assistance fraud investigations.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2738 – would direct the Secretary for Children and Families to request a waiver from the U.S. Department of Agriculture to exclude candy and soft drinks from foods eligible foods for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP).

- Passed
- Voted

HB2502 – would revive law authorizing resident senior combination hunting and fishing licenses, amend the Kansas kids' lifetime combination hunting and fishing licenses fees, and remove the sunsets.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2633 – increases the maximum service charge for licenses, permits, stamps from KWDP from \$1 to \$2 and \$.50 to \$1. The bill also allows service centers to add credit card processing fees.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2509 – adds advanced practice registered nurse to the definition of healthcare provider in the healthcare provider insurance availability act.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2520 – changes the definition of “Home Plus” in the Adult Care Home Licensure Act, increasing the number of residents in such a facility from not more than 12 to not more than 16.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2521 – expands the Kansas Tort claims act to include child placement agencies that contract with the secretary for children and families. The bill adds that “state” means a child placement agency if the child placement agency has a current contract with the Secretary for Children and Families.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2320 – amends law regarding best interest determinations, public school enrollment, and the creation of transportation plans for children in the custody of the Secretary for

Children and Families. The bill would also change transfer of records requirements between public schools and the children in the custody of the Secretary for children and Families.

HB2522 – permits highway construction and maintenance vehicles in road construction zone to display flashing amber, white, green lights always or under certain conditions white and blue lights.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2552 – requires certain forms and journal entries to be filed with the Kansas Sentencing Commission to include present investigation reports. The bill prohibits the Commission from recognizing the validity or receiving documents submitted in any other manner.

- Passed
- Voted Yea

HB2618 – requires the Kansas State Board of Education to biannually report federal financial assistance for education purposes to the legislature. Establishing sunsets and repealing various reports.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2524 – the bill would allow the continuation of family foster home licenses when the applicant or license otherwise qualifies and a person who resides in a home where someone has a convicted or adjunction offense, was a child with a convicted or adjunction in custody and place in such home, is less than 26 years of age, and maintains residence in such home or has been adopted legally by someone residing in such home.

HB2627 – expands permissive preference in private employment to include current servicemembers and eligible spouses.

- Passed
- Voted Yea

HB2569 – challenges the constitutionality of an election statute to be brought in the district courts of Shawnee county.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2703 – creates the Kansas Health Insurance Affordability Transparency Act.

Requiring the Kansas Department of Insurance to prepare reports concerning the financial impact to covered individuals that would result in the passage of legislation to a legislator.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2626 – expands veterans' preference in government employment to include current members of the national guard and member eligible spouses.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2732 – directs the state registrar of vital statistics to provide death certificates to survivors of deceased veterans with service-connected disability, that establishes relationship between cause of death and service-connected disability.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2758 – directs the capitol preservation committee to develop and approve plans for registry kiosk of Kansas military forces killed in action or who died of wounds incurred during active duty, to be placed in the state capitol.

- Passed
- Voted Yea

HB2519 – continues the following exceptions from the Kansas Open Records Act (KORA) KSA 8-3, 158, division of vehicles, emergency contact information of holder's driver's license. construction permit, or non-driver's identification cards, KSA 22a-243, state child death review board, information acquired by entity established by city or county, KSA 20-221b: certify reinsurers' files with commission of insurance, KSA 41-353: alcohol fulfillment house, reports containing name or address of consignee of alcoholic liquors, and KSA 75-782: elder and dependent adult abuse multidisciplinary team.

- Voted

HB2528 – requires state board of nursing actions related to nonpractice violations be void, to allow for late license renewal for professional, practical and advanced practice registered nurses, setting fees for late license renewal, limits on unprofessional conduct relation to nursing, prohibiting the board from taking retaliatory action based on lawful actions.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2564 – requires dentists to expressly accept claim credit card or electronic transfer payments by a dental benefit plan.

- Passed

- Voted

HB2568 – this bill will determine and declare annually increases or decrease to existing motor vehicle fees or camping, utility, or other fee established through rules and regulations.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2676 – permit a pharmacist to initiate therapy for certain conditions consistent with the pharmacist’s education, training, and experience. Except for treatment of opioid use disorder or for medication-assisted treatment.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2588 – requires that electrical contractors, master electricians, journeyman electricians are licensed through the Kansas Board of Technical Professions beginning July 1, 2026.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2760 – provide interstate practice privileges for estheticians through the esthetics licensure compact.

- Passed
- Voted Yea

HB2761 – establishes the Speech Language Pathology Assistant Licensure Act, establishing the powers, duties, and functions of the Secretary for Aging and Disability Service in carrying out the act. The license would expire after two years.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2702 – requires applicants for physician assistant license submit to criminal record check.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2736 – requires nondisproportionate share hospitals that use the Kansas Department of Health and Environment process to screen uninsured patients within 90 days of discharge to determine if any they are eligible for charity care discounts or financial assistance.

- Failed on Final Action
- Voted

HB 2250 – defines “emergency opioid antagonist as including an expired emergency opioid antagonist for a person rendering aid to another in need of reasonable need of medical assistance.

- Passed

- Voted

HB2740 – adopts the compounding standards established by the United States Pharmacopeia and allowing exemptions. Uniform standards are important to ensure Kansas pharmacies and outsourcing facilities can safely operate in national healthcare environment.

- Passed
- Voted Yea

HB2762 – changes the crime of unlawful sexual relations to describe a person in a position of authority for a school.

- Passed
- Voted Yea

HB2750 – changes the crime of unlawful sexual relations to include a person in a position of power in a school.

HB2527 – prohibits courts from assigning work release for defendants with prior conviction that requires registration.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2609 – provides statutory framework for allowing an adult to receive decision-making assistance from one or more other adults, called the Supported Decision-Making Agreements Act.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2573 – create an alternate set of qualifications and extending recognition of CPA's licensed in other states if the qualifications are met.

- Passed
- Voted Yea

HB2539 – requires the City of Eudora Township Board elect the Board of Directors of the Eudora Community Library.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2571 – requires that two municipalities about a roadway that they must enter into a cost sharing agreement for maintenance within 180 days of entering the negotiation.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2482 – changes specific statutory references to exams provided by the ACT to examinations provided by a nationally recognized college entrance exam or preparatory exam. Requiring the Kansas State Board to provide students a nationally recognized college entrance exam that separately assesses math, reading, English, and science,

aligned with the nationally recognized college entrance exam, and career readiness assessment that leads to a nationally recognized credential.

- Voted

HB2596 – allows the Secretary of Corrections to enter contracts to produce manufactured or modular homes under the Prison-made Goods Act of Kansas. Requiring the Secretary to charge private contractors the average rate for square footage used and the greater \$15 per hour or the market rate for the utilized skills.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2688 – NDAs related to childhood sexual abuse or human trafficking shall not be judicially enforceable.

- Passed
- Voted Yea

HB2593 – requires political subdivisions hold an open meeting to discuss a contingency fee contract for legal services before approving the contract and requiring the Attorney General's approval.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2595 – establishes the Attorney Training Program for Rural Kansas Act which sunsets in July 2031, established and administered by the Rural Kansas Advisory Committee. Including Law Student Training and Stipend Program for Rural Kansas which provides \$3000/semester to law students for up to three years and the Attorney Training and loan Repayment Program for Rural Kansas, allowing up to \$20,000 yearly, totaling a maximum of \$100,000. For students attending KU Law or Washburn University Law and practice in rural Kansas.

HB2503 – repeals the mail ballot election act and removes statutory references to mail-ballot procedures in Kansas Law.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2553 – would allow the authorization of the PBS Kansas distinctive license plate.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2624 – authorizes the disorganization of a county fire district by the board of county commissioners when such district contains no territory.

- Passed
- Voted Yea

HB2719 – creates an exception to the rules and regulation filing act for technical amendments, creates a process for certain rules and regulations to receive priority status in the adoption process, removes references to revival of rules and regulations, clarifying that the department of budget is not required to approve proposed rules and regulations mandated by the federal government and adding references to department of corrections rules and regulations that are not subject to the act.

- Voted

HB2114 – clarifies which structures shall be considered water obstructions and not a dam. Increases application fees for a permit to construct, modify, or add to a dam.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2346 – establishes the Kansas Sports tourism grant program administered by the secretary of commerce. Providing matching grants to communities for developing and continuing sporting events, providing funding for such grants from state economic development initiatives fund or from the state general fund if funds are not available.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2739 – does not require fire sprinkler systems in multi-family dwelling of four or less attached units.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2763 – provide interstate practice privileges for athletic trainers.

- Passed
- Voted Yea

HB2589 – prohibits the secretary for children and families services from accepting anonymous reports of child neglect or abuse.

- Passed
- Voted Yea

HB2601 – creates a child abuse and neglect registry by the secretary for children and families.

- Passed
- Voted Yea

HB2639 – changes the name of juvenile crisis intervention centers to juvenile stabilization centers. Along with changing the intake criteria and treatment provided.

- Passed
- Voted Yea

HB2651 – allows a challenge to voluntary acknowledgment of paternity anytime after acknowledgement in cases of fraud, duress, or mistake.

- Passed
- Voted Yea

HB2655 – authorizes the chief judge of municipal courts to establish a specialty court program and provide for expungement when a person has completed the requirements.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2357 – allows the sealing and expungement of court records and consideration of mediation in eviction actions where the rental agreement is governed by the residential landlord and tenant act.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2587 – allows licensed private psychiatric hospitals to maintain emergency medication kits for pharmaceutical emergencies.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2366 – expands naturopathic doctors' scope of practice, increasing continuing education requirements, and changes license and regulations.

- Failed on Final Action 58-58
- Voted

HB2535 – excludes certain portions of the crime of cruelty to animals do not apply to any person who catches a feral cat to provide vaccination, spaying or neutering and returns the cat to the location it is caught at.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2613 – provides crime victims compensation board to establish fees chargeable for conducting examinations of persons who may be victims of sexual assault.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2614 – allowing certain exceptions to the confidentiality of records and information for the crime victims compensation board.

- Passed
- Voted Yea

HB2652 - requires the clerk of the appellate courts to publish monthly cases of the supreme court and court of appeals, cases which have not been entered and filed within six months of submission.

- Passed
- Voted

HB2352 – requires duly ordained minister of religion to report certain abuse and neglect except when reporting would violate penitential communication privilege and requiring training for persons obligated to report abuse.
