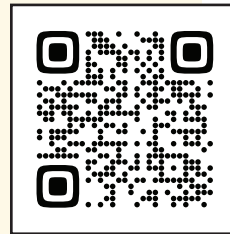
# \$26.8m in Community Benefits Coming to Regent Park

Toronto Community Housing and Tridel have finalized a Community Benefits Agreement for Phases 4 and 5 of the Regent Park revitalization. Through this agreement, \$26.8 million dollars will be invested directly into programs and supports for Regent Park residents.

More than 1,000 Regent Park residents voted to decide how these funds should be used. The package selected by residents places a strong

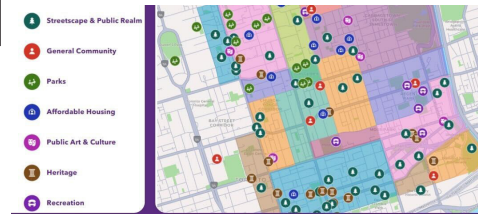
focus on education, employment, and community spaces. The funding will support post secondary scholarships for Regent Park tenants, new and improved community spaces in revitalized buildings, job training and employment supports for local residents, wage funding tied to revitalization related jobs, and grants for community led initiatives such as youth programs, seniors supports, and neighbourhood events.

## Spring Update 2026

**It's been a very busy fall and winter in Toronto Centre and at City Hall, and I'm proud to see that more and more results are visibly taking shape.**

Together, we've made real progress and delivered real results. Encampments in our parks are now virtually



zero: the plan that my team and I have put in place, in conjunction with fast responses by our City's social services staff, has meant that hundreds of people have now come out of the cold and into supportive and

transitional housing, where they can better access the supports and services they need.

Similarly, here in Toronto Centre we've achieved 10,257 housing starts: we're building and delivering more housing and affordable housing. We've acquired a new, much larger building for the St Lawrence Library to move to in a couple of years so that it can serve Moss Park as well. We even made our voices heard and reversed a

proposed cut to the Downtown East Action Plan – which now will really start ramping up this spring and summer.

We've opened not one but two new TTC lines so all of us can get around Toronto better . . . and yes, they've been going through some teething issues, but they've also led to the rapid adoption of a city-wide plan to speed up all of our LRT surface routes, which will result in better transit all across Toronto.

We're well on the way to having the Church-Wellesley Village designated as a cultural district, which will help keep our Village vibrant and thriving. Barbara Hall Park is in the process of a significant revitalization, and the strategy we developed for Off-Leash Areas for dogs has been scaled up city-wide, so there will be more and better options for all our doggos.

## We Did It: Downtown East Action Plan Now Fully Funded!



I cannot overstate the importance of the Action Plan in addressing many of the challenges that are still holding all of Downtown Toronto back. Historically, our eastern downtown has been ground zero for litter, graffiti, vandalism, neglect, and cleanliness challenges, which spiral into larger issues.

**Just one month ago, a significant cut loomed for the Downtown East Action Plan in the City's 2026 Budget.** Thanks to the passionate input of residents and businesses in our Ward, that cut has been reversed and the Downtown East Action Plan will be fully funded and moving full speed ahead with its safety, cleanliness, and revitalization measures. Thanks to Mayor Chow for prioritizing this with the budget.

Because the Action Plan is fully funded, 2026 is about to become the year where we make real progress on addressing these issues.

This funding will now support Clean Streets, Community Outreach, and Harm Reduction teams, as well as Community Safety initiatives to ensure that our neighbourhoods are clean, safe, inviting, and welcoming.



## Renovations to Begin for New Library Location

**The Toronto Public Library (TPL) St. Lawrence Branch will be moving to 339 Queen Street East - a new space that will be six times larger than its current site!**

The new space will allow the library to transform into a larger district branch and bring exciting new opportunities to the Corktown, Regent Park, and St. Lawrence neighbourhoods it borders.

The new library location will be significantly larger, to accommodate more users, programming, and library holdings. We're also looking forward to this new District Library being more accessible, and becoming a community hub with the first-rate programs, services, and facilities that our TPL are renowned for.

To support it as a district branch, I have released \$3 million in community benefits in order to fund enhanced library programming space, virtual interview rooms, and a digital innovation hub/fabrication studio—one of only two in the whole City—to ensure this branch is a jewel in TPL's portfolio.



## Centre of Excellence

The Centre of Excellence is a newly opened community space located inside the Regent Park Community Centre at 402 Shuter Street.

For many years, this part of the building was locked up and unused, but I had the space transferred to Parks and Recreation and reimagined as a community-focused hub. Our goal was to ensure this publicly-owned space could finally serve our neighbourhood.

The Centre of Excellence will provide dedicated space for mental health supports, arts and creativity studios, one-on-one therapy rooms, and job development and employment services. By transforming a previously inaccessible area into a welcoming community resource, the Centre of Excellence is helping expand opportunities, services, and support for residents in Regent Park.

## Your City's Budget Highlights for 2026

I've been working hard with the Mayor and Council to ensure that this year's city budget is investing in what's important and serving us better.

The TTC fare freeze continues to remain in effect for its third year. We're investing in Toronto Police, and in the Toronto Community Crisis Response Team.

At the same time, we found \$788 million in reductions and efficiencies - that's \$108m more than last year.

- \* Hiring more police, fire, paramedic & mental health workers
- \* 20% tax break for small businesses
- \* Major renovations for Moss Park Arena

- \* Investing in youth programs for skills, training, and development
- \* Regent Park e-Zamboni charging shed
- \* Riverdale Farm repairs
- \* Chiller and roof replacement for St Lawrence Community Centre
- \* \$100,000 for winter and hygiene care drop-in centres
- \* \$185,000 for the Toronto Tenant Support Program
- \* \$90,000 for a Toronto Seniors Housing Corporation pest removal strategy
