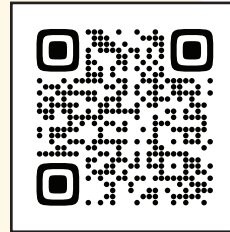

509 Parliament Update

Many residents concerned about the proposed 10-storey building at 509 Parliament Street have reached out to me with concerns about height, heritage, impacts on Broadcast Lane, and waste pick-up.

As City staff support this application, outright refusing it will result in a loss at the Ontario Land Tribunal. By continuing to defer action on this item at Toronto and East York Community Council, I am pushing the applicant for further changes to minimize the impact of waste pickup on Parliament Street to try and get some benefit from this development for the people of Cabbagetown.

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Spring Update 2026

It's been a very busy fall and winter in Toronto Centre and at City Hall, and I'm proud to see that more and more results are visibly taking shape.

Together, we've made real progress and delivered real results. Encampments in our parks are now virtually



zero: the plan that my team and I have put in place, in conjunction with fast responses by our City's social services staff, has meant that hundreds of people have now come out of the cold and into supportive and

transitional housing, where they can better access the supports and services they need.

Similarly, here in Toronto Centre we've achieved 10,257 housing starts: we're building and delivering more housing and affordable housing. We've acquired a new, much larger building for the St Lawrence Library to move to in a couple of years so that it can serve Moss Park as well. We even made our voices heard and reversed a

proposed cut to the Downtown East Action Plan – which now will really start ramping up this spring and summer.

We've opened not one but two new TTC lines so all of us can get around Toronto better . . . and yes, they've been going through some teething issues, but they've also led to the rapid adoption of a city-wide plan to speed up all of our LRT surface routes, which will result in better transit all across Toronto.

We're well on the way to having the Church-Wellesley Village designated as a cultural district, which will help keep our Village vibrant and thriving. Barbara Hall Park is in the process of a significant revitalization, and the strategy we developed for Off-Leash Areas for dogs has been scaled up city-wide, so there will be more and better options for all our doggos.

We Did It: Downtown East Action Plan Now Fully Funded!



I cannot overstate the importance of the Action Plan in addressing many of the challenges that are still holding all of Downtown Toronto back. Historically, our eastern downtown has been ground zero for litter, graffiti, vandalism, neglect, and cleanliness challenges, which spiral into larger issues.

Just one month ago, a significant cut loomed for the Downtown East Action Plan in the City's 2026 Budget. Thanks to the passionate input of residents and businesses in our Ward, that cut has been reversed and the Downtown East Action Plan will be fully funded and moving full speed ahead with its safety, cleanliness, and revitalization measures. Thanks to Mayor Chow for prioritizing this with the budget.

Because the Action Plan is fully funded, 2026 is about to become the year where we make real progress on addressing these issues.

This funding will now support Clean Streets, Community Outreach, and Harm Reduction teams, as well as Community Safety initiatives to ensure that our neighbourhoods are clean, safe, inviting, and welcoming.



Taking Action on 233 Carlton

If you haven't yet read Andre Berman's coverage in The Bridge about the outrageous overspending on 233 Carlton - which is supposed to be a women's resource and drop-in centre that hasn't opened yet - you really should. It's appalling.

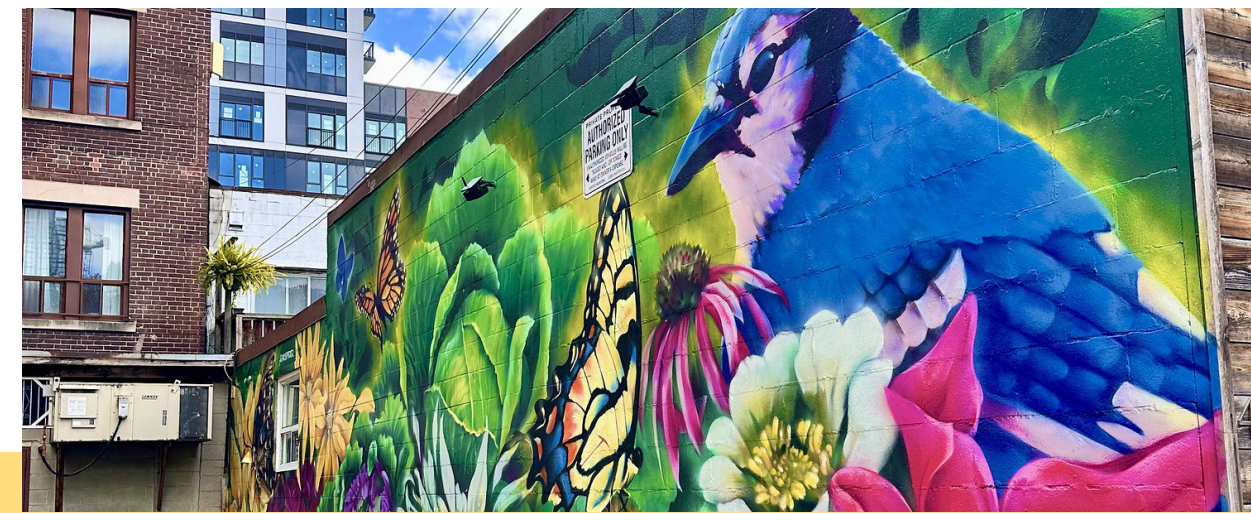
The agreement entered into by City Staff using delegated authority, whose costs spiked far beyond anything reasonable, all while keeping myself and the rest of Council in the dark.

Every reasonable person should be outraged. I've personally submitted

an administrative inquiry to get to the bottom of this. People's hard-earned tax dollars deserve respect, and every dollar needlessly wasted is money diverted from services that people need.

I'm taking action to ensure that this never happens again by enhancing accountability measures on projects that do not have council oversight, and lowering the threshold for when they take effect.

Your City's Budget Highlights for 2026

I've been working hard with the Mayor and Council to ensure that this year's city budget is investing in what's important and serving us better.

The TTC fare freeze continues to remain in effect for its third year. We're investing in Toronto Police, and in the Toronto Community Crisis Response Team.

At the same time, we found \$788 million in reductions and efficiencies - that's \$108m more than last year.

- * Hiring more police, fire, paramedic & mental health workers
- * Small Business tax cut increased to 20%
- * Major renovations for Moss Park Arena
- * Investing in youth programs for skills, training, and development
- * Regent Park e-Zamboni charging shed
- * Riverdale Farm repairs
- * Chiller and roof replacement for St Lawrence Community Centre
- * \$100,000 for winter and hygiene care drop-in centres
- * \$185,000 for the Toronto Tenant Support Program
- * \$90,000 for a Toronto Seniors Housing Corporation pest removal strategy

Ontario Street Reconstruction

The City of Toronto is conducting combined sewer replacement and road resurfacing on Ontario Street, between Carlton Street and Wellesley Street East. This includes replacement of the combined sewer system, replacement of the City-owned portion of substandard water services, manhole replacement, trench and sidewalk restoration, and road resurfacing and streetscape improvements.

Work is underway, construction teams have been mobilized, materials have been delivered, and sewer inspections have begun. Work is progressing block-by-block from Carlton Street north toward Aberdeen Avenue and Wellesley Street East.
