One of our most innovative current projects is the creation of a Wealth Gap Equalizer Loan and a grant program to support historically disadvantaged homebuyers.



ADVOCACY, ANTI-RACISM, RACIAL JUSTICE

Roadmap to School Integration: Lessons learned from "Nice White Parents"

consisted of two community conversations with Julie Snyder, Executive Producer of the podcast *Nice White Parents*, moderated by Dr. Adunni Anderson. The Schools Committee posed questions about the best approaches to racially integrated schools that are truly inclusive and have all students' and families' best interests in mind.

The Wealth Gap Equalizer Loan, a pro-integrative financial incentive developed to address the need to improve the prospects for Black and non-white Hispanic homebuyers, was designed and will be available in 2022.

ChooseSOMA: This new website was developed by the Marketing Committee to reach prospective Black in-movers and offers information on the community and support in the home-buying process.

Community Organizing Workshop for Youth was sponsored by the Coalition Youth Collective and led by advocate Larry Hamm, leader of the People's Organization for Progress. He shared advice and strategies for aspiring racial and social justice activists using his experience as a student activist at Princeton to his work with POP.

Anti-Asian Racism Coffee House Discussion focused on anti-Asian hate, its roots in American history, and microaggressions toward Asian people. Parents shared their experiences in SOMA and groups discussed AAPI invisibility and what we can do to make the towns more inclusive of the AAPI community.

Journey to Anti-Racism Groups formed after we hosted Journey to Anti-Racism Coffee Houses in 2020. About 40 attendees continued meeting monthly with Coalition facilitators in small groups to learn more and find ways to take action.



I have a better understanding of how I have facilitated systemic racism by my focus on things like test scores. And teaching my kids that life is more about supporting the success of a community than about their personal test scores is a far better education.

DEVELOPING UNDERSTANDING...

Conversations on Race, in partnership with Seton Hall, focused on educational justice with teacher, author, and activist, Jesse Hagopian who shared information that demonstrates what were up against in creating equity and racial justice in education. Small groups discussed plans of action for SOMSD.

Dear MAPSO: The Conversation, hosted by the Coalition Youth Collective, showcased youth perspectives on persistent racial inequities through poetry, art, and film. Attendees shared their experiences in youth-facilitated discussion groups.

Juneteenth was honored and celebrated in SOMA at the Durand-Hedden House with period reenactors, art, poetry, music, and an historical exhibit on slavery in New Jersey that explained the state's complex legislative history regarding slavery and emancipation.

Connecting through Art in Challenging Times was an Integration through the Arts project that used film documentary to highlight social and racial justice issues. Coalition Youth Collective members developed filming and editing skills to produce films for release in 2022.

Presentation by Dr. Khyati Y. Joshi, author of White Christian Privilege: This event was organized by the SOMA Action Religious Justice Committee and supported by the Coalition's Interfaith Outreach Committee.

Demographics Report: Based on the 2020 US Census, our newest report delves into neighborhood integration and overall diversity and integration levels over 20 years and looks at comparable suburban towns in our region.



... AND BUILDING RELATIONSHIPS

The 20th Annual MLK Observance was held virtually and in the aftermath of a white supremacist insurrection in our nation's Capitol. We were grateful to provide this opportunity to reflect on what community means in a time of crisis with speaker Andrea McChristian of the NJ Institute for Social Justice, students who shared powerful and provocative ideas, composer Mark Miller, Special Dance of Columbia High School, the Coalition Youth Collective, and the Bufford School of Music.

The Luminary Project created over 2600 luminary kits that were lit on Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Day throughout SOMA neighborhoods, Seton Hall University, around Meadowland Park pond, with messages of hope for peace and healing in a time of hurt and loss.

"Bloody Sunday:' Memories of a Civil Rights Prodigy: The Coalition on Race, SOMA Action Racial Justice Committee, and SOMA Justice partnered to bring Black History to life in a virtual conversation with Civil Rights activist Joanne Bland who crossed the Edmund Pettis Bridge with John Lewis and others at age 11 on "Bloody Sunday," March 1965.

Black Health Matters: COVID19 Vaccine and the Black Community featured a panel of Black medical professionals--Dr. Omar Bey, Dr. Camara Phyllis Jones, and Sean Hudson, who discussed COVID19 vaccines and was moderated by Professor of History, Race and Public Policy at Harvard University, Khalil Gibran Muhammad.

Brother Outsider: The Life of Bayard Rustin: SOMA Pride hosted a screening of this visionary civil rights activist. Audrey Rowe of the Coalition moderated the panel.






