Our award-winning citizen science program Reef Watch SA - now in its 26th year - was relaunched in Feb with a new team (Char Nitschke, Nathan Janetzski and James Tilly) and program of our ever-popular Reef Rambles. We ran 13 public Rambles with more than 100 participants, introducing a new generation of South Australians to the wonders of our reefs.

The state-wide Community Conversations will take place in late 2023. Our home and hub has had another big year as the front door for the environment. As well

as offering venue hire and office space for community, business, environment and social organisations, the Joinery also hosted performances and exhibitions during Adelaide Fringe and SALA Festival, and offered guided tours as part of the 2022 SA Nature Festival. In Oct-Nov 2022, we ran the *Creating Positive Change Fellowship*, a new 8-week program

for South Australians passionate about climate action and nature protection to develop

practical skills and confidence to make a difference. Expert presenters included Robert

Simms MP, journalist Tori Shepherd and Kaurna Elder Uncle Tamaru Smith. Another huge year for our campaign to protect Adelaide's tree canopy included a powerful comparison report on bushfire exemption laws, submission writing workshops, community

Since the St Kilda Mangroves Alliance formed in 2021 we have worked to ensure best practice remediation is put in place for the recovery and long-term health of this globally significant area. This year we facilitated production of the St Kilda Mangrove Community Vision in response to the area's disastrous dieback of mangroves, samphire and salt marsh.

outreach events and actions to save irreplaceable local trees on Victor Harbour Rd,

Brighton Rd, Dudley St, Glynburn Rd and at the proposed Crows oval in Thebarton.

When plans were announced for a police horse barracks at Mirnu Wirra (Park 21W) in the southern Park Lands, we stepped in to protect it alongside concerned citizens, Traditional Owners and environment groups. After a strong campaign that included two rallies and a huge community response, the Police Commissioner announced an alternative site in April 2023.

As Murray-Darling Basin Plan turned 10 in 2022, we joined with Conservation Councils across the Basin to form the Murray-Darling Conservation Alliance. Together we have coordinated the movement to protect our rivers, from advocating with Federal politicians to connecting community and experts with the Life and Death for the Murray-Darling roadshow.

After more than a decade, the campaign to block plans for a nuclear waste dump in Kimba on the Eyre Peninsula reached a head this year. We continued to stand behind the Barngarla people as they took their fight to the Federal Court, amplifying their voices and offering events and connection points for community to support this critical campaign.

We look forward to working more deeply with the membership and everyone concerned about climate and nature in South Australia to increase our impact.





In 2022–23 financial year, the Council realised a deficit of \$44.200.

The result was better than our budgeted deficit by \$19,000, contributed by improved revenue from various categories and cost savings. Some of the categories with improved revenue include Rental income (up \$12,000), with the application of new accounting standards on donations and sponsorships continue having a positive impact on our project revenue.

Our fundraising revenue dropped slightly by \$5,000 compared to last year. This is in addition to \$3,000 being held on the balance sheet for the depreciation of our Joinery solar panels (funded by our generous supporters).




Total revenue decreased by \$152,300 in comparison to 2022 revenue, contributed by a \$163,000 decrease in project grants and service contracts income.

Despite the lower revenue, cost savings realised across various expense categories, resulted in an overall reduced loss compared to both budget and last year results.

Our balance sheet remains strong with Net Quick Assets of 1.51, although lower than 2021-22 ratio. The reduction in the ratio was due to an increase in current liabilities mainly Trade Payables and Project funds received in advance.
