Free trade agreements hurt communities at the roots

More and more free trade agreements? There is nothing free about it. They are costing you and I significantly as we lose our communities in the process. And there is no more important sector than agriculture and this too is being cut at the roots by free trade.

How is this happening?

While the local farmer's market concept is catching hold and seems to be flourishing, the constant pressure by governments towards new international free trade agreements puts too much pressure on local suppliers to sell to outside markets.

Buyers are not able to find the quantities they need to supply the local food market, forcing them to provide more and more imported goods and produce.

We are in effect, producing less and less for our own market, and sending more and more out of the country. And once a new agreement is inked, there is little chance for us to

turn this around. And how does this make any sense, when we can't find enough locally grown produce? While it may seem we are making good progress, our supply to local markets may have already reached a plateau.

What we need now is a commitment by our governments to improve linkages in farm production within our own markets, whether that is Canada-wide, provincial or at the regional or municipal level.

This linkage or "infrastructure" currently exists but is crumbling under the weight and pressure of the demands related to free trade and global markets.

Governments need to review practices

It is time for our three levels of government to review the practice of leaving farming to market forces which are not in our control. They must consider legislation geared toward improving our local, provincial and national food distribution system.

Union workers have a role

CUPE and other trade unions are effective lobbyists for working people. The 10 per cent shift is an excellent example of what we are capable of. But let's continue to pressure our governments at all levels to institute "laws" which are



aimed at supporting agriculture at the roots.

Enhanced labelling needed

Grown in BC or grown in "XYZ"
Region certification and labelling programs need to be enhanced.
We must have a commitment from Government that they will not allow any further erosion of our local market infrastructure.

Abandoning a reckless pursuit of ill-conceived free trade agreements on a first-come first-served basis would be a good start.



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INCINERATORS FOR WASTE DISPOSAL?



There is much debate about the use of incinerators for waste disposal. Currently, the GVRD is exploring the possibility of using incinerators instead of landfills to address Metro Vancouver's waste problem.

Incinerators are intended to reduce the amount of waste filling our landfills and in some cases to generate energy. Toxins from waste in landfills frequently leeches into our waterways, contaminating all living things, including human beings.

Environmentalists fear incinerators could escalate global warming and lead to the release of environmentally harmful toxins such as dioxin and nonoparticles, a recently recognized agent feared to be extremely

dangerous to the health of living beings.

The use of incinerators could undermine reduce, reuse and recycling initiatives by destroying products that would otherwise be recycled, thereby reducing the drain on valuable earth resources.

Without further exploration into their potential impact, we must exercise extreme caution before agreeing to the use of incinerators in order to address our waste problems.

Need some examples?


Here are some areas and jobs that will proliferate in the next decade in a green world despite government inaction.

Ten Percent Shift – good for local economies, and the environment

CUPE BC's Ten Percent Shift campaign is starting to gather a head of steam. Just over a month after its launch, the campaign to support vibrant and sustainable local economies has seen nearly 200 people take the pledge to shift ten percent of their spending to locally owned businesses and locally produced goods and services.



Climate Change has created a new phenomena – "Climate Zombies."

Climate Zombies are quickly populating our elected houses in both the United States and Canada. They are funded and supported by some of the wealthiest people on earth. Far right-wing ideologues who are doing everything in their power to prevent mankind from fighting Greenhouse Gas emissions as they say it will ruin the economy and their bottom line.

Climate Zombies are politicians in government who support the denial of the effects of Climate Change on the world. The 112th Congress in the United States is now populated with a majority of Zombies. Very scary.

These Zombies express the classic variants of global warming denial. "The planet is not warming, that extreme cold weather refutes these concerns." Zombies claim that man's influence is unclear, that climate scientists are engaged in a hoax, scam or corrupt conspiracy and that limiting greenhouse gases would have no impact on global warming.

Recently the Climate Change Accountability Act was introduced into parliament by the NDP, Bill C 311. It was designed to:

- Cut greenhouse gas emissions 25% below 1990 levels by 2020 and 80% by 2050
- Mandate the government to set regulations that ensure targets are met

- Punish polluters who break regulations
- Ensure government accountability with publicized 5-year target plans
- Establish independent reviews to ensure government measures reach targets

Despite Parliament passing this Bill twice, it was delayed in the Senate, which allowed Canada to enter the 2010 climate change conference in Cancún with no clear direction.

In fact the Senate voted it down, in an unheard of act, with no debate. Prime Minister Harper ordered the vote while many Liberal Senators were not in the Chamber. Harper has done what he has long said he would not do, use an unelected body to interfere with law in this country.
