September Legislative Update

Legislative Updates

This week, the General Assembly reconvened for several committee meetings, and the House and Senate passed the following legislation:

Senate Bill 13: Political Terrorism Prevention Act. (Bipartisan Support

105-6)

Senate Bill 13 would do the following:

- Define "politically motivated act of violence" under the Criminal Procedure Act.
- Create an aggravating factor for felony offenses involving politically motivated acts of violence.
- Create a new felony sentencing enhancement for politically motivated acts of violence.
- Create a new aggravating circumstance in capital prosecutions when the capital felony is committed because of a victim's political beliefs or activities, and the criminal act was committed to silence political expression.
- Require that a notice of intent to seek the death penalty include the aggravating circumstance of political motivation, if applicable.
- Allow the Attorney General to assign a special prosecutor in cases involving a politically motivated act of violence.

Senate Bill 403: Additional Medicaid Funds and Retirements. (Unanimous Support 111-0)

- Adjust Medicaid funding to account for projected health care changes;
- Reduce funding for vacant positions across state agencies; and
- Reduce appropriations to future building reserves and the State Capital and Infrastructure Fund.

House Bill 307: Iryna's Law. (Partisan 81-31)

- Modify laws related to pretrial release conditions, sentencing (including adding an aggravating factor), and death penalty proceedings;
- Reform judicial procedures, including the suspension of magistrates and procedures for involuntary commitment of defendants found incapable of proceeding;
- Extend and clarify probation and post-release supervision for youth adjudicated of certain violent offenses, including victim notification rights;
- Appropriate funds for additional assistant district attorneys and legal assistants in Judicial District 26;
- Require certain involuntary commitment respondents to remain in custody pending hearing;
- Direct the Collaboratory to study the intersection of mental health and the justice system; and
- Prohibit the formation of certain task forces.

House Bill 358: Continuing Operations Part II. (Bipartisan Support 105-4)

• An act to provide additional disaster relief, to implement additional budgetary adjustments, and to make other changes.

House Bill 926: Regulatory Reform Act of 2025. (Partisan Support 72-37)

• An act to provide further regulatory relief to the citizens of North Carolina and would amend State laws related to State and local government, occupational licenses, commerce, environment, and various other regulations.

Golden Leaf Scholarship: website link <u>here</u>. Up to \$3,500 per school year is available to students who demonstrate financial need and want to attend a North Carolina public or private university or college.

NC Teaching Fellows Scholarship: website link here. \$10,000 per year at one of 10 partner institutions (Appalachian State University, East Carolina, Elon University, Fayetteville State, Meredith College, NC A&T, NC State, UNC Chapel Hill, UNC Charlotte, UNC Pembroke) for students interested in teaching STEM subjects at the middle and high school level or special education at any level.

State Employees Credit Union "People Helping People" Scholarship: website link here. One student from each school district in NC will receive \$10,000 in a one-time scholarship. The student must be a member of SECU or a member through a parent. Speak with your school's guidance counselor to apply.

Next NC Scholarship: website link <u>here</u>. Students from households making less than \$80,000 annually will have tuition fully covered at any NC Community College (minimum \$3,000) or tuition at least half covered at any public university in NC (minimum \$5,000).

J.T. Minnie Maude Scholarship: website link <u>here</u>. Open to students in multiple counties including Rockingham with scholarship amounts ranging from \$500 to \$7,500. Applications due March 1.

Aubrey Lee Brooks Scholarship: website link <u>here</u>. Open to students in multiple counties including Rockingham who have a FAFSA Student Aid Index not exceeding \$12,000. Must be seeking a degree at NC State University, UNC Chapel Hill, or UNC Greensboro. Up to \$12,000. Applications due March 1.




Museum and Archives Receives Grant


