AN EQUAL VOICE PROVINCE SNAPSHOT, 2025

Alberta (Alta.) has had a record three women premiers, but its legislature has not yet achieved gender parity by having women make up at least half of its MLAs. The Legislative Assembly of Alberta seats 87 members, of which 31 are women (36%). Alta.'s last election took place in May 2023.

GOVERNANCE STRUCTURE

Alta. has a unicameral legislature, with one chamber: the **Legislative Assembly of Alberta**. As a parliamentary democracy, Alta. has 87 constituencies which are each represented by an elected **Member of the Legislative Assembly** (MLA).

The political party with the most elected MLAs forms government, and their leader becomes the head of government, called the **Premier**. The Premier selects MLAs to serve as Cabinet Ministers.

The Lieutenant Governor of Alberta is appointed by the Governor General of Canada and represents the King, Canada's Head of State.

MILESTONES

1917

Alta. was the first Canadian province or territory to elect women MLAs to its legislature. Louise McKinney and Roberta MacAdams Price were also the first women elected to a provincial legislature in the entire British Empire.



1921

Irene Parbly was the first woman named to Cabinet in Alberta.



1985

Helen Hunley was the first woman to be appointed Lieutenant Governor of Alberta.



2011

Alison Redford was the first woman premier of Alberta.

2022

Danielle Smith became the third woman premier of Alta. Three women - Alison Redford, Rachel Notley & Danielle Smith - have now held that role. This is more woman premiers than in any other Canadian province or territory.

2023

Rhiannon Hoyle was the first Black woman MLA and Jodi Calahoo Stonehouse was the first First Nations woman ML elected in Alberta.

2023

Alta.'s 2023 election saw a record number of women win seats in the province's legislature, with 33 women MLAs out of 87 (37.9%). This is the highest proportion of women MLAs in Alta.'s history.
