YUKON

AN EQUAL VOICE PROVINCE SNAPSHOT, 2025

Yukon (Y.T.) has had one woman premier, and its legislature came very close to achieving gender parity when women and gender diverse people made up nearly half of its MLAs. The Yukon Legislative Assembly seats 19 members, of which 8 are women and gender diverse people (42.1%). Y.T.'s last election took place in April 2021.

GOVERNANCE STRUCTURE

Y.T. has a unicameral legislature, with one chamber: the Yukon Legislative Assembly. As a parliamentary democracy, Y.T. has 19 constituencies which are each represented by an elected Member of the Legislative Assembly (MLA).

The political party with the most elected MLAs forms government, and their leader becomes the head of government, called the **Premier**. The Premier selects MLAs to serve as Cabinet Ministers.

The Commissioner of Yukon is appointed by the Government of Canada and represents the federal government in the territory.

2002

Y.T.'s cabinet achieved gender parity, with 4 women - Pat Duncan, Sue Edelman, Pam Buckway and Cynthia Tucker – out of 7 members (57.1%). This was the first time that a Cabinet anywhere in Canada consisted of more women than men.

Y.T.'s 2021 election saw a record number of women and gender diverse people win seats in the territory's legislature, with 8 women and gender diverse MLAs out of 19 (42.1%). This is the highest proportion of women and gender diverse MLAs in Y.T.'s history.
