




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







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2018 paper - 98 Sentenced Young People held in detention
"We identified rich diversity of languages, and multilingualism was
common. Most young people for whom English was not their first language
demonstrated difficulties in SAE (Standard Australian English) competence.
Further, nearly one in two young people were identified with language
disorder – over half of whom had language disorder associated with FASD.

- What just happened


- What's going to happen next?

Cranga Tamariki Act (1989) (changes from 1 July 2019) requires health, education, social and legal services to be provided in an accessible manner

 Section 10 and 11 of the Act – Duties of Court and Counsel 11(2)(aa) "Except where section 10 (relating to proceedings) applies, the child or young person must be given reasonable assistance to understand the reasons for proceedings or process, the options available to the decision-maker, and how these options could affect them; and...."

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What is a Communication Assistant?

- · Court-appointed. Officer of the Court
- Neutral and impartial
- There to provide advice about, and to facilitate communication between a vulnerable witness/defendant and the court
- Specialised skills in assessing and intervening to enable more effective communication. In NZ, role undertaken by speech-language therapists

Communication Toolkit

Supporting oral language provides better:

Access to literacy and education

Participation in positive interactions and interventions

Pro-social development, and skills to make and keep relationships

Ability to solve problems with words (not behaviour) and talk yourself out of trouble Better life chances and wellbeing
