We enhanced our onboarding process this year for a more welcoming, informative new-member experience.



Our focus is on building the capacity of parents and teams to take action. We offer training sessions and one-to-one support to find opportunities to learn together.

We hosted events to meet and engage with new families.....

Parents and kids in Ottawa joined up for monthly 'We Bike For Our Kids' events throughout the summer to encourage participation from parents with limited experience of biking with their kids.

FOK Ottawa-Gatineau also led the organization of a family-friendly Kidical Mass event in Ottawa, with more than 250 families out advocating for safe streets and active transportation.

In Halifax, For Our Kids brought parents together in the aftermath of the devastating wildfire that threatened Nova Scotia. They talked about what they were feeling and the positive climate action they could take on. This event was part of a For Our Kids pilot project called "Parents Talk Climate", bringing families together in-person where we don't yet have For Our Kids teams. We're planning a second event in our pilot series for 2024.





Local teams ran events to help families engage more deeply

For Our Kids Ottawa-Gatineau organized a "Climate Moms and Dads Drop In" for families to join participant-led discussions and explore topics like: "heat pumps and parenting", "e-buses and bottles" and "nap schedules and home electrification".

Pour Nos Enfants/For Our Kids Montréal self-organized a mini-retreat and strategy session, to reflect on their four years of organizing together, look at new ways to work collectively, plan campaign strategies, and consider new areas of focus. Goal #2:

Phasing out fossil fuels

Pour Nos Enfants/For Our Kids Montréal was part of a successful movement that led its city council to ban gas from new building construction beginning in 2024.

For Our Kids Burnaby was part of a similar win in December when its city council approved changes meaning all new buildings will need to use clean energy for heat and hot water.

Recent research shows that gas use in the home can undermine the health of occupants, especially children. It's also bad for the health of the planet.




Capping Oil and Gas Emissions

A cap on emissions from the oil and gas industry is a key piece in reaching Canada's emission reduction goals.

For Our Kids teams and members connected to advocate for a strong emissions cap by sending postcards and emails to their MPs, meeting to share their concerns in person and writing to media.

In collaboration with other groups, 3,185 postcards have been sent, and we've heard from MP offices that the volume of communication has impacted the conversation.





School actions

In September, the Victoria District School Board unanimously approved its Climate Action Plan. The plan has been 4 years in the making – and Parents 4 Climate (Victoria) have been involved every step of the way. They shared their insights and advice to other parents in <u>our stories</u>.

One of FOK Alberta's team leaders brought a resolution to the Alberta School Councils' Association (ASCA) to "Integrate Environmental Stewardship, Sustainability, Climate & Biodiversity Education Throughout the Curriculum from K-12".

The team has also been working hard to highlight the pervasive influence of the oil and gas industry throughout the education system, initiating an <u>important investigative report</u> published in *The Narwhal*.



Electric School Buses

Throughout the year, parents in BC have been working to support the ASTSBC who were able to put together a joint submission for 255 new electric school buses on behalf of 32 school districts.

We also made this fun video with some middle school students in Victoria in March.



For Our Kids Burnaby joined their city's
Active Schools Travel Stakeholder
Committee to help find ways to get more
kids walking and biking to schools.









For Their Future Yukon has hosted two Climate Cafes to support families and neighbours with climate emotions, anxiety and discuss actions. They were interviewed by CBC North and are making plans to partner with the Yukon Canadian Mental Health Association in 2024.

FOK Vancouver is leading formation of the Vancouver Point Grey Multi-Generational Climate Team to bring grassroots support for bold climate action to their elected provincial representative and to BC Premier David Eby.

Organizers in a newly forming For Our Kids team in London, Ontario hosted a table at a their local Earth Day "Earthfest", attended a climate rally outside of their local MP's office and held a family-friendly climate picnic.





For Our Kids Burnaby organized frequent in-person gatherings for team members and families in the community to connect with their kids, nature and each other, while taking hands-on action. This included: native species planting, an old growth forest walk and tours of the Burnaby Eco-Centre and Farmer's Market.

They also facilitated a "kids climate action club" with their kids aged 7-12 to plan and implement actions together over the next few months.



For Our Kids North Shore teamed up with Force of Nature to host a table at their local Lynn Valley Fair.





In Toronto, FOK members were part of leading community discussion and action against planned expansion of the Portlands gas plant in the city's East End—a movement that is gaining momentum and support.

For Our Kids Burnaby bought climate action to their local Hats Off parade.

On a cold morning in November, members of FOK Ottawa-Gatineau rallied outside the Sustainable Finance Forum and met with MPs and Senators attending the event. One parent's story of why she brought her kids to the rally was published as an <u>op-ed</u>.

Earlier in the year, two parents wrote a comprehensive <u>submission to the Standing Committee on Banking</u>, <u>Commerce and the Economy</u> in support of Bill S-243: The Climate-Aligned Finance Act



In November, 113 parents emailed the Royal Canadian Geographical Society to ask why they were honouring RBC's CEO at their annual gala - while RBC continues to be a world leader in fossil fuel investment, including projects like Coastal GasLink pipeline. The construction of that pipeline is violating Indigenous rights, forcibly removing land defenders from their territory, and destroying sacred spaces and water sources.

We are still awaiting a response from RCGS.







We recently launched a new action inviting teams and members to uncover banking sponsorship in their communities. We have been noticing that Canada's big five banks are often seen supporting events and fundraisers for kids, healthcare, education, sports and the arts, while investing heavily in fossil fuels at the same time. We think there's a contradiction here and we want to map out how and where big banks show up in communities across the country.

Following a summer with record-breaking global temperatures and devastating wildfires across the country, thousands of students and Vancouver residents marched to call for stronger climate action.

The march started outside Vancouver City Hall on Friday afternoon and made its way across the Cambie Street Bridge toward the Vancouver Art Gallery — mimicking the route of the 2019 climate march attended by nearly 100,000 people.

This year's march was co-ordinated by several grassroots organizations, including Climate Convergence, For Our Kids, Doctors for Planetary Health and many others.

Goal #3:

Be the change we want to see





Historically environmental and climate movements have failed to listen to and learn from experiences and solutions offered by BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, People of Colour) activists – even while acknowledging that climate change disproportionately impacts BIPOC communities.

We are committed to the ongoing work of challenging our own implicit and explicit biases and the structures that uphold racism as we work for climate justice.





FOK's Justice, Equity, Diversity and Inclusion (JEDI) committee, led by two parents from the network, developed and implemented a comprehensive strategy with the guidance of Bloom Consulting. One major goal was a <u>member survey</u> to set a baseline for how members understand and use JEDI principles in their actions.

From the survey, we learned:

"there is a fairly high level of systemic understanding of how social, racial, climate and environmental justice are intimately interconnected, and a strong sense of passion and commitment to integrate these in FOK's work more explicitly."

"there is a hunger for learning and connecting across diversity with racialized communities on climate justice in solidarity."






Our network support team and JEDI committee members took part in the 'Whiteness at Work' training program provided through one of our funders, Patagonia, to deepen our understanding of how we can build anti-racism into the network and our community organizing.

Network training and learning events over the year supported members to integrate justice and equity issues into their climate action.

Chelsea Vowel and Clayton Thomas-Müller held a moving and educational discussion on 'Indigenous Rights, Climate Justice and Parenthood' in March with 235 registrants.







In April, educator and storyteller <u>Sara Mai Chitty</u> presented a training session on going beyond the words of land acknowledgements to meaningful actions.

Following up on her "How to Raise an Anti-Racist Child" sessions with the network, we were thrilled to work with Kerry Cavers, founder of Moms Against Racism, on a deeper 3-session training series focusing on anti-racism practices for community organizing.

The first two sessions were presented in October and November, with the third scheduled for January 2024.







A major change in 2023 was the move to a parent-led governance model.

The new National Council came together for the first time in September, with seven members from across the country.

They are parents who are volunteering their time, experiences, and passion to lead the strategic direction of the network. To us, it makes absolute sense that our grassroots network should be led by our members, and we look forward to their leadership in the years ahead.





2023 was a busy and productive year for For Our Kids. We want to say a huge thanks to all the teams and members who have taken time to speak up (and act up!) for our kids this year. Every action in every community makes a difference.
