Juanella McKenzie, also known as Nelly, is an Adnyamathanha and Luritja woman of South Australia living and working on Barngarla land, Port Augusta.

Nelly has been creating multi-disciplinary art her whole life. Having spent much of her childhood on country, learning cultural practices from her elders, she uses art to preserve stories and techniques. Crediting her mother, Regina McKenzie, as being one of her mentors, Nelly's art practice she now passes on to her children. For Nelly, art is essential to maintaining connection to country and family.

Nelly's artwork has been acquired by the National Museum of Australia, the National Museum of Scotland and by art collectors worldwide.

Nelly's family has a strong connection to the nuclearfree fight as they have successfully fought the establishment of a nuclear waste dump on their land.

Long ago there was a man named Vira. He was a cheeky old man who loved witchety grubs. Vira had two nephews, neither or who liked him. Vira's nephews told him about a gum tree that had many witchety grubs. They suggested that he climb the tree and share the grubs with them. Vira climbed the tree, getting higher and higher, but when he reached the grubs, he refused to share them with his nephews and instead ate them all himself. In retaliation the nephews made the tree grow tall.

They asked their Uncle "can you touch the sky?" When he replied "yes", they pulled the tree back down to earth and left him stuck in the sky. The nephews took their Uncle's wives and kept them for themselves.

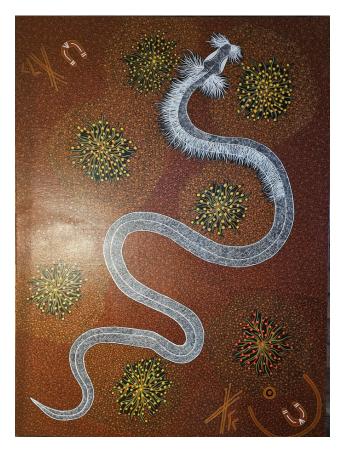

Emu Weave represents the Sun. The sun brings life and warmth, and the emus are sacred to our people Juanella plays an important role in cultural continuation, she teachers her children the stories of their homelands as they weave. Juanella wove this piece with her eldest daughter, Ngarlaa teaching her the ancient practice of weaving emu feathers.

This piece won the Malka Art Award in 2020.

This story takes place between Hawker and Quorn. The Seven Sisters were running away from the old man who wanted to marry them when they came across a handsome young hunter. Six of the sisters changed into the golden wattle. The seventh sister changed into the quandong tree as she wanted the young hunter to pick her.

He picked her fruit and she changed back into a woman. She passionately embraced him, and they made love into the night. Once he fell asleep the other sisters came and took their sister, telling her the old man was close and they needed to move. They later left, going into the sky as stars in the stomach of the serpent Akurru.

The hunter searched for the rest of his life looking for the seventh sister. He never loved again, and he died of a broken heart. It was the beauty and the tragedy of this story that inspired my making of this work.

When kingfisher came down from near Leigh Creek for ceremony, he lit fires all along the way. The serpent Akurru was running away from the fires. When Akurru got near Wilpena Pound he came upon a camp of yuras (Adnyamathanha people). Two young men saw the glow of Akurru's eyes and ran to safety just before the serpents swallowed the camp. Akurru is still laying on Country. The spears in his stomach and homes of the yuras can be seen in the peaks of the hills.

Long ago there was a young girl pregnant with child. Her mother accidentally killed her and pretended that all was fine. When the young woman's husband found out, he killed the mother. The bell bird heard the young man cry and came to comfort him, singing gently. As he cried, the waters from his wife's womb overflowed and created a freshwater spring. This spring is sacred to Adnyamathanha women.

Recently it was proposed that a nuclear waste dump be built nearby the spring, but the proposal was overturned following campaigning by the community. The site is now preserved and protected.

This painting is my way of showing love, respect & gratitude to our sacred medicine trees.

The meaning of the circles down the centre is the medicine trees, & the significant place/s where we collect medicines.

The leaves represent all the medicinal resources, e.g, bark, sap, leaves, or roots, gathered to make healing remedies

The colours, to bring to life their hidden treasures, their healing abilities.

Michael Donovan is a multi-disciplinary artist, he is inspired by the natural environment of his homelands, the ocean, waterways, rain-forests, plants, animals, sky, and the earth.

He was taught by his elders from an early age and his art practice is based on cultural preservation, exploring, experimenting with both ancient and modern techniques and materials.

Michael has won people choice award and second place in the Malka Aboriginal Art Prize 2020 as well as countless exhibition in both NSW and SA. His artwork is held in private collections all over the world.





Manta vs the submarine Porobibi

Porobibi is a Papuan Melanesian artist, currently based in Footscray, Naarm. He uses storytelling through music, spoken word, and community organising to highlight movements of resistance and continuity of culture. 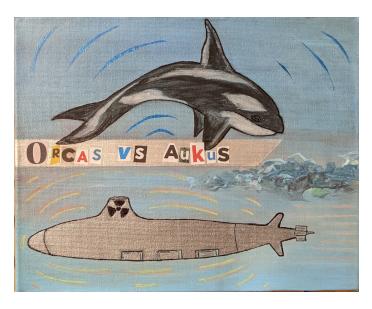

This artwork is a response to the logging of native forests. The black background represents the nocturnal habitat of the greater glider, and hints at the surreptitious nature of logging. The addition of 'white out' to the possum and tree refers to the erasure of habitat and species extinction, while recognising the role of paper manufacturers in the destruction of old growth forests. The real estate text alludes to the commercialization of land and natural resources.

Lyn Hovey is an artist and activist who has travelled to Marree and the Great Artesian Basin area since 1984 when the campaign against Roxby Downs uranium mine introduced her to local Aboriginal people affected by the nuclear industry. She has been part of Friends of the Earth monitoring water extraction and its effect on mound springs along the Oodnadatta Track. Her arts collaboration with Reg Dodd has included numerous exhibitions and public art works across Vic., S.A. and the NT. and the ongoing Marree Arabunna Museum and Art Gallery. Her anti-nuclear, environmental and political involvement connects her to an Australia wide activist movement.

The tank was delivered to a new house built by Aboriginal Housing at Alberrie Creek but before it was secured and filled it blew away across the desert. Arabunna man Reg Dodd tracked it across country for miles until he came to the edge of the white salt expanse of Lake Eyre South. The tank is a metaphor for the appalling water crisis in Marree and the surrounding area - many springs dried up by the over extraction of water by Olympic Dam mine and currently a crisis in the water supply for the township.

In the winter of 2012, I was part of the Lizard's Revenge anti-nuclear protest at "The Gates of Hell" (the gates to the Olympic Dam mine site). After the protest, when the SA cops decided to re-open the road north to the Oodnadatta Track, I took time out to check out the "Mayan Calendar End of Time" event at Mutonia Sculpture Park, Alberrie Creek.

On the property of Arabunna indigenous elder Uncle Kevin Buzzacott. There's a human powered washing machine, supplied with clean water from a longstanding artesian mound spring.

Regular drinkers from Uncle Kev's mound spring in 2012 were a mating pair of brolgas. He referred to them as "Charles and Di". They were obviously comfortable with the nearby presence of just one relaxed human with a camera, and yet I felt enormously privileged to be able to observe them at such close range, sharing the boggy ground around their mound spring as they went through a courting ritual dance.

"Anti Nuclear Brolgas?" --- YES! Uranium mining at Olympic Dam Mine, particularly a mine expansion then being proposed by its owner, represented a threat to never-ceded artesian waters for which the Arabunna nation were one affected nation of First Australian custodians. If the mine's huge water usage had increased, Arabunna custodians believed that was an unacceptable risk of drying up many mound springs north of Roxby Downs, including this one. No wonder the sleeping lizard felt aggrieved and vengeful! (see attached booklet)

When I started this piece of work in early 2019, it was only in my imagination. Who would have known that nine months later, this is what Australia would become and that the imaginary would become the reality. I went into the studio with images I had already taken of landscapes - urban, country and wild. I paired them with images and colours of fire and flames printed onto transparencies. Overlaying these transparencies onto the landscapes, I visualised what our world could and would become if we didn't look after it, if we kept ignoring and denying climate change.

A large fig tree tucked into my city garden inner with its' abundance of figs hanging like fat purple purses in summer, and its' large green leaves offering a canopy of dense shade, is in stark contrast to the bare branches of winter. Its' presence is a source of inspiration as it the changes form across seasons. It is a celebration for me of the vitality and power in nature. "Ficus Carica", the common fig is an ancient tree and across the centuries the fig leaf has been used to symbolize censorship or as a disguise in art or language. As such, a fig leaf has covered the genitals of Michelangelo's plaster sculpture of David; or a politician has described opposition's proposal as 'hidden by a fig leaf', inferring that it is

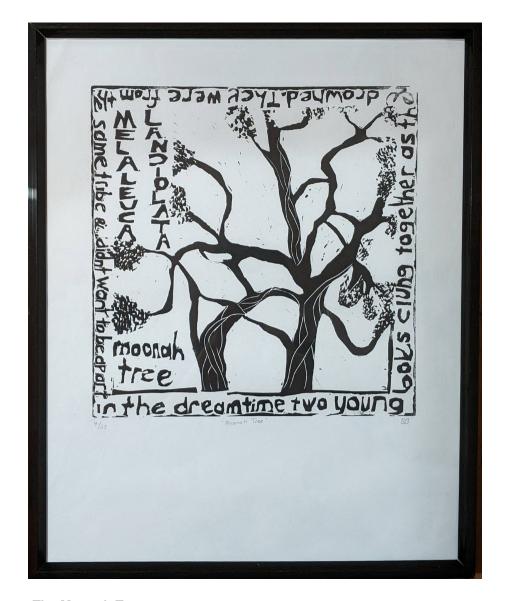


Peter Leiss was born London UK 1951. Currently lives in Melbourne and studied Photography & Film-making at Prahran CAE 1970–71.

In 2016 I had the privilege of being taken by Adnyamathanha woman Regina McKenzie to Hookina Springs. This place is a sacred site, the water runs up from deep underground. I took this photograph of the Springs with my back turned to the location proposed by the Federal Government to build a radioactive waste dump. These plans are an instance of ongoing processes of colonisation wrought by the self-serving interests and greed of government and White land owners.

Alex Moulis was born and continues to live in Sydney, on Gadigal land of the Eora Nation. Through their practice Alex explores the nature of borders, boundaries and exclusion through visual imagery. Their work attempts to make small poetic gestures of solidarity towards those affected by Australian Government policy specifically, and processes of 'othering' and marginalisation more broadly. Alex is also an Officer with the Department of Homo Affairs, a queer activist and performance group. They have completed a Bachelor of Fine Arts in Photomedia at the National Art School, Sydney.
