Funder Call: <u>AFFH Proposed Rule and Immediate Actions for Philanthropy</u>

In January, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development announced an <u>Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing (AFFH) proposed rule</u>. According to HUD, the proposed rule is aimed to "faithfully implement the Fair Housing Act's statutory mandate to affirmatively further fair housing (AFFH), which directs HUD to ensure that the agency and its program participants proactively take meaningful actions to overcome patterns of segregation, promote fair housing choice, eliminate disparities in opportunities, and foster inclusive communities free from discrimination.

On February 9, 2023, <u>HUD published the proposed rule into the Federal Register</u>. Public comments are accepted until April 10, 2023. Join this funder call to learn about how philanthropy can act and to ask questions about submitting public comments.

As described in our <u>November 2022 summary</u> of the Toronto learners' exchange with funders from both the US and Canada, some communities on both sides of the border are piloting school-based interventions modeled after Australia's <u>Geelong Project</u>. The premise is straightforward: homelessness and school disengagement are interconnected. Youth who don't complete high school are far more likely to experience homelessness as young adults, and youth who experience housing insecurity will likely struggle in school. And the <u>rationale for prevention</u> surely speaks for itself.

Known in North America as <u>Project Upstream</u>, the idea is to screen all students in pilot schools for a range of risk factors associated with homelessness and school disconnection and refer young people and their families to resources that help them retain their housing. Despite its promise though, obstacles have inhibited widespread adoption of the model in the US, and, candidly, it may not be the long-term intervention we need. We hold both its potential and limitations in tension.

New Opportunity by ACF:

The Association for Children and Families (ACF) has just posted <u>a forecasted grant opportunity</u> that will put \$6 million over three years into a Runaway and Homeless Youth - Prevention Demonstration Program (RHY-PDP) that will allow communities up to \$200,000 to design and delivery of community-based demonstration initiatives to prevent youth and young adults from experiencing homelessness. <u>Learn more</u> as we consider opportunities for philanthropy to support this promising effort.
