Predict Our Path Forward

We asked youth homelessness funders:

Imagine a future in which philanthropy failed to catalyze the movement to end youth homelessness...

...why did it fail?

Here's what they said:

We failed to build narrative around the solvability of youth homelessness.

We never achieved real partnership: where everyone's contributions are valued.

We failed to support leaders with lived experience.

We didn't integrate young people's needs into our affordable housing agenda.

We never accounted for the tolls of the pandemic (e.g., isolation).

We failed to motivate government behind data-driven interventions. |
Government never scaled up the solutions.

We retreated from our commitment to racial justice.

Shiny-object syndrome inhibited us from focusing on the long term.

Paternalism is the status quo we return to when we don't listen to young people.

We never implemented trust-based philanthropy.

We focused too much on data at the expense of funding grassroots organizing.

We mined youth for stories but didn't implement their recommendations.

We ignored the pipelines into homelessness.

We shied away from out-of-the-box ideas.

We disagreed with each other on how to coordinate funding.

We feared innovation.

We never engaged other systems outside the homelessness sector.

We never built a shared vision with adjacent systems like foster care, education, etc.

We never confronted the systemic homophobia and transphobia that push so many into homelessness.

We underinvested in movement and powerbuilding.

We didn't support leaders of color with lived experience.

We focused on the nearterm at the expense of the long.

Systems remained unchanged.

We funded studies but never shared learnings widely enough.

We sacrificed meaningful participation at the feet of tokenization.

Maybe it was never philanthropy's role in the first place.

We never got to the root of the problem: capitalism.

So, how do we prevent such failure?

What do we need to learn? How do we need to be?

Crack the code of meaningful partnership

Build a unified agenda with cross-sector partners


Strategizing space filled with vulnerability, trust, and love
