## What's Happening: 4-night Sit-In Outside the Capitol, New Eviction Moratorium Through October 3rd

Following Representative Cori Bush's four night sit-in outside the Capitol, the CDC issued a new eviction moratorium after the expiration of the previous moratorium on July 31. The new moratorium runs through October 3rd and prohibits renters in communities with high COVID-19 transmission rates from being evicted for nonpayment of rent. It currently covers 90% of renters across the country and 80% of counties. The new moratorium also offers an opportunity for communities to disburse emergency rental assistance to households at risk of homelessness.

However, this moratorium has limitations. Protections no longer apply once a community moves out of substantial or high level status of community transmission. In addition, the moratorium does not protect renters who have already been evicted from their homes, which are disproportionally individuals and families from BIPOC communities. This makes it critical that Emergency Rental Assistance is quickly distributed to rehouse folks and prevent them from experiencing homelessness.

Landlord associations are pushing back on this new moratorium and it may face legal challenges, which makes the quick and equitable distribution of ERA funds all the more crucial. Funders Together is working with national partners to stay updated on the moratorium and understand how philanthropy can support communities in the midst of this new moratorium and the barriers it faces. Through upcoming policy updates, we will provide up-to-date information on the role you can play in supporting your community.

## **How Philanthropy Can Take Action**

On **Thursday, August 12 from 3:30-5:30p ET/12:30-2:30p PT**, the Melville Charitable Trust is hosting a Philanthropy Eviction Prevention Strategy Session as a follow up to the <u>White House's Eviction Prevention Summit events</u> earlier this summer. This call is focused on creating concrete action steps for philanthropy from the <u>46 communities</u> that face the greatest eviction risk. Participants will hear from federal partners, learn from other funders about how philanthropy can support equitable distribution of Emergency Rental Assistance funds, and discuss additional funding opportunities to support eviction prevention.

## Focusing on the Long-Term Vision: Supporting Visionary House Bills

In partnership with other members in the <u>National Coalition for Housing Justice</u>, Funders Together to End Homelessness signed on to support Representatives Maxine Waters (CA-43) and Cori Bush (MO-01) in their respective bills to address the urgency of the homelessness crisis and advance housing justice. In June, Rep. Waters introduced two bills: the <u>Ending Homelessness Act of 2021 and the Housing is Infrastructure Act of 2021</u>. The Ending Homelessness Act would transform the Housing Choice Voucher program into a federal entitlement while the Housing is Infrastructure Act would provide a federal investment of over \$600 billion in equitable, affordable, and accessible housing infrastructure.

In late July, Rep. Bush introduced a visionary and ambitious resolution - the <u>Unhoused Bill or Rights</u>. The Unhoused Bill of Rights affirms the rights of people experiencing homelessness, calls on Congress to permanently end homelessness by 2025, and guarantee housing, health care, and livable wages for people experiencing homelessness.

We are currently working through the National Coalition for Housing Justice to secure co-sponsors and endorsements for these bills to show support for robust federal investments to address affordable housing and end homelessness.
