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## **PART 1: Short Answer**

### **1. Describe your qualifications for the office you are seeking. Feel free to add anything that you would like our Members to know about you and your candidacy.**

I'm an openly gay man who was born in Guatemala. My parents brought me to this country undocumented, at the age of 14. I came here carrying one of my little sisters on my back in search of the American Dream. I was a Dreamer before the concept even existed. Even though I didn't speak the language and my parents were poor (making minimum wage as a janitor and a factory worker), I studied hard and was accepted into Stanford University five years after my arrival. I put myself through Stanford and was then accepted into Harvard Law School, graduating in 1996.

After working as an attorney in private practice for a couple of years, mainly to pay off loans, I dedicated my life to public service to give back to a country that has given me so much; to make sure that I work to give individuals like myself the opportunities I have had.

Since then, I have served as a San Francisco Deputy City Attorney, eventually serving as the General Counsel for the San Francisco Public School System, where I oversaw implementation of a federal Consent Decree to ensure equal opportunity for students of color in San Francisco Unified. I also served as a San Francisco Police Commissioner, where I worked to bring more transparency to the police department and to hold accountable any police officer who engaged in misconduct.

I ran for and was elected to represent District 9 on the San Francisco Board of Supervisors, serving the maximum of two full, consecutive terms. (See more in question 8).

After leaving the San Francisco Board of Supervisors, I was hired as Deputy County Executive for the County of Santa Clara, where I managed and created different departments dedicated to immigrant relations, gender equity, and cultural competence. I also oversaw the County's outreach, education and communications throughout the COVID-19 pandemic.

I left my work as a Deputy County Executive in Santa Clara, to become San Francisco District Attorney Chesa Boudin's Chief of Staff. In that role, I oversee the day-to-day operations of the office. (See more in question 5).

I am running for California Assembly because my broad, diverse and extensive professional experiences will make me the most effective, progressive legislator in Sacramento among the candidates in this race. I have been tested more than anyone running. You don't have to wonder whether I will stand up to special interests in Sacramento because I have been doing it for many years. In fact, I've been doing it all my life.

I am also running because I believe that representation matters. San Francisco hasn't elected a Latino or Latina to represent it in the California Legislature since the 1800's. It is time to change that. Given the disproportionate impact that COVID-19 has had on the Latinx Community, it is time that someone from that community represents San Francisco in the Capitol. At a time when Dreamers and immigrants are scapegoated and under attack, the fact that a formerly undocumented person like me could represent San Francisco would



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make a huge difference for Dreamers and immigrants in San Francisco and throughout California.

Lastly, for many in the LGBTQ Community it is critical to once again have LGBTQ representation in this seat. Prior to the current Assemblymember, this seat was held by Tom Ammiano, Mark Leno, and Carole Migden, three incredible queer leaders who were trail blazers for the community. While I appreciate that the current Assemblymember is a strong ally, the LGBTQ Community needs more. Having someone from the LGBTQ Community means that the person will be a leader who isn't afraid to push the envelope the way Ammiano, Leno and Migden did for so many years.

I hope the Harvey Milk LGBTQ+ Democratic Club will join me in the fight for a more equitable, more diverse, and more progressive California.

### **3. Describe your past work addressing the climate crisis and environmental justice and your vision for a just transition away from fossil fuels. Please include specific policies you would promote to achieve this.**

**California needs a Green New Deal.** Cleaning up our environment with a Green New Deal will do more than fight climate change. It will fight poverty with green jobs typically paying much more than a living wage. It will fight crime with crime rates plummeting for people with stable, family-sustaining jobs. And it will fight diseases like cancer, diabetes, asthma and even COVID-19, which we know are made worse by wildfire smoke and air pollution.

As a Supervisor, I often fought to make sure that environmental issues, and the health of our communities were considered in tandem and given equal standing with economic considerations, especially when it came to land use approvals and business licensing decisions. I opposed development projects such as the Hunters Point Shipyard development in Bayview Hunters Point by Lennar and supported shutting down PG&E's polluting peaker plants for that very reason. One of my proudest achievements as a Supervisor was authoring the landmark legislation that established Clean Power SF, the community choice aggregation program which competes with PG&E and offers customers like myself 100% clean energy in San Francisco. It is for this very reason that I was also proud to pass Free Muni for Low Income Youth, to enhance access to our public transportation system and reduce our reliance on driving.

As an Assemblymember, I will collaborate with legislative colleagues, environmental



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advocates, and community stakeholders to set more aggressive target dates and amounts for the reduction of greenhouse emissions in California, with an emphasis on ensuring that such reductions do not occur on paper alone. We must reduce the disproportionate burden of pollution in California's low-income communities and communities of color. While serving on the Board of Supervisors, as San Francisco's representative on the Metropolitan Transportation Commission, I worked to ensure proper implementation of existing state legislation designed to reduce greenhouse gas emissions in the Bay Area.

Additionally, I support a ban on fracking. I do believe that in the process of developing such a ban, we should work with labor partners to make sure that they have a role in the development and implementation of the ban to ensure the protection of workers who have retired from or are currently working in that industry.

#### **4. What work have you done to address economic inequality and housing unaffordability in San Francisco? What will you do to address them if elected?**

During my time as District 9 Supervisor, I enacted landmark legislation that allowed San Francisco to protect neighborhoods and communities from displacement and gentrification through the establishment of Cultural Districts, beginning with the creation of the Latino Cultural District; this legislation has led to the creation of other cultural districts, including the Castro Cultural District and the Transgender Cultural District.

Additionally as Santa Clara County Deputy Executive, I also oversaw implementation of Santa Clara County's \$950 million housing bond which spearheaded the construction of supportive housing to address the growing crisis of homelessness.

In the Assembly, I will address homelessness with the most fundamental solution – housing.

#### **5. Describe your work addressing racial injustice, economic inequity, and police brutality in San Francisco.**

Following my time as a Santa Clara County Deputy Executive, I had the tremendous opportunity to join the San Francisco District Attorney's Office as Chief of Staff. I am proud of the work we have done to reform our criminal justice system in San Francisco including:

- Ending cash bail citywide;
- Filing the first ever homicide case against a police officer in the history of San Francisco; and
- Helping to reduce the jail population during the pandemic while still maintaining public safety.

Additionally, as stated before, I also served as a San Francisco Police Commissioner, where I worked to bring more transparency to the police department and to hold accountable any police officer who engaged in misconduct.



**6. How have you supported transgender San Franciscans, and how will you do so if elected?**

As District 9 Supervisor, I worked to ensure that the transgender community in San Francisco had access to medical services and healthcare. As a deputy county executive, I learned that our transgender residents had to travel to San Francisco just to receive necessary medical attention and services. I worked to replicate my work in San Francisco, making health care and medical services accessible to the transgender community in Santa Clara.

I appointed Honey Mahogany, the first Black transgender member of the San Francisco Democratic County Central Committee who would also become the first Black transgender elected official in the state of California upon her election to the DCCC. In the race to succeed myself as chair of the SF Democratic Party, I was proud to continue my support of Honey, now the first Black transgender chair of the SF Democratic Party. Representation matters, and that is why I have supported and will continue to support our transgender leaders.

As an Assemblymember, I will use my work in San Francisco and Santa Clara the model for our state, and ensure that transgender Californians have the same access to resources, attention, and care that cis Californians receive.

**7. How have you supported other members of the LGBTQ community, and how will you do so if elected?**

I've supported LGBTQ candidates at state, local, and federal races like Rafael Mandelman and Mark Leno. I've used my powers as chair of the SF Democratic Party to appoint leaders like Honey Mahogany and Carolina Morales to governing bodies and leadership positions. LGBTQ representation at the leadership table is important—that is why I have and will continue to support LGBTQ candidates and leaders in our community.

As the only gay candidate in the race, and, if elected, the first gay Latino Assemblymember from San Francisco, my unique experience will shape the policies I champion and allow me to be a voice for the change and progress we need. I will work with community organizations, like the Milk Club, and stakeholders to ensure that community voice is at the heart of our work in the legislature. I will make sure that my work in San Francisco fighting for LGBTQ rights will become a model for the state. I will make sure that California continues to be a leader in LGBTQ rights, and that from San Francisco to California, and from California to the United States, we create a more inclusive future.

**8. Describe a time when you worked against an established power structure or entrenched authority to achieve progressive change. How was this positive change accomplished?**

I'm proud to say that during my tenure representing District 9 on the San Francisco Board of Supervisors, I established myself as the most progressive voice on the Board, and as a fearless fighter for the underdog, including working on the following:



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- Protected San Francisco's Healthcare Care Security Ordinance against efforts by the business community to pocket tens of millions of dollars per year that should have gone to provide healthcare for their workers.
- Working closely with allies, I helped lead the fight against CMPC's effort to close St. Luke's hospital and build the CPMC Van Ness Campus union-free, eventually working to put together an agreement that ensured the building of a world class hospital at the Bernal/Mission Campus, and helping nurses successfully maintain and expand their union.
- Enacted landmark pay equity legislation to ensure pay equity for women and people of color who work for City government.
- After voting against the Twitter Tax Break, enacted the Legacy Business Program to help small businesses that were struggling to stay open during the "Great Recession" in the aftermath of the 2007 financial crisis.

In addition to this professional work, I have been a proud activist in the Democratic Party where I have worked to push the party left as much as possible. For the last four years, I was proud to serve as Chair of the San Francisco Democratic Party, where my allies and I were able to take control back from corporate Democrats. During my tenure we had many successes, including helping to elect a progressive super majority to the City and County's Board of Supervisors and the governing boards of other key public agencies and helping to pass progressive ballot measures, including Prop C which taxed wealthy corporations to provide services for the homeless and Prop F which gave renters facing eviction the right to legal counsel.

Every progressive accomplishment is the result of broad coalition building with community activists and stakeholders to fight for results that move our city and state in a more progressive, equitable, and inclusive direction.

### **9. How have you worked to mentor and build the bench of future leaders?**

Working to mentor future leaders and bringing them to the table has been important to me. I have worked to recruit and publicly endorse young leaders running for office whose innovation and ideas will solve today's problems.

As a leader in San Francisco Democratic politics, I have worked to bring new voices and future leaders to the table. In the most recent DCCC election, I led a successful slate that included new voices, community activists, and leaders of tomorrow; I am also proud that the Milk Club shared and supported our vision with consequential endorsements and support.

And we need housing that will not contribute to environmental degradation, traffic gridlock and most importantly, displacement. While I think there are many beneficial elements to SB 9 and SB 10, these bills need to be improved by bolder proposals to create affordable housing, to require that housing is near transit or supports transit improvements and most of all that these bills do not become legal cover for mass displacement of low-income families. We have seen the terrible history of “redevelopment” in San Francisco which became an excuse for removing communities of color. Giving private developers a virtual blank check to build in low income communities without the consent of those communities is dangerous – and we should amend both of those bills to make them work as intended.
