
Hotwells & Cliftonwood Community Association

Local Climate & Nature News

Connected Actions, Sustainable Neighbourhoods- next steps for our community

Our community Climate Action work is supported by the Bristol Climate and Nature Partnership

We are declaring an Urban Nature Reserve!

Inspired by and in collaboration with our neighbours in BS3 we are combining with Greater Bedminster Urban Nature Reserve and declaring **Hotwells, Harbourside and Cliftonwood an Urban Nature Reserve**. The upside is that we don't need permission or money to do this. It's a community-led initiative aiming to:

Identify the wild creatures and plants of the neighbourhood- anyone can
do this using <u>iNaturalist</u>, a simple app, or old fashioned lists and photos or even
sketches.

- **Audit, map and improve wildlife habitats** parks, gardens, streets, verges, schools grounds, the harbour, the river banks are all homes to wildlife. What can we do to improve their habitats?
- Help animals to move about in search of food, shelter and mates; help pollinators move around the area- the river and the harbour are large scale wildlife corridors, what can we do to improve them? How can we increase biodiversity and links to neighbouring areas?

What's A Nature Reserve? Written by My Wild Bedminster

Most traditional nature reserves are 'somewhere else' with few human inhabitants. They are usually designated from above by international agencies or national and local governments. 'Urban' or 'Community' Nature Reserves are proclaimed from below by people wishing to protect local wildlife. The aim is not so much to protect rare species and more to prevent common species from becoming rare. 'At some point, will the only place that you will see a robin be on a Christmas card?' Unlike traditional nature reserves they cannot usually offer legal protections, but nor do they require a steady income stream to make them function. They rely upon local people caring enough and working together to make their neighbourhoods as wildlife friendly as possible.

The Greater Bedminster Urban Nature Reserve and Totterdown Urban Nature Reserve are early examples of this approach in Bristol. Eventually, we hope that all of Bristol and its hinterlands will be covered by community/urban nature reserves in collaboration with the few top-down official nature reserves supported from taxation.

Volunteers at the Cumberland Piazza

We continue to apply the aims of an **Urban Nature Reserve** to the community-led garden at the Cumberland Piazza. In September and October we welcomed groups from DEFRA and the Environment Agency to help with tidying up tired planters and adding to our rockery. We'd like to thank them and plan to welcome more volunteers to the Piazza in the Spring. We always welcome local involvement. You can find out about this community project in detail here.



More Trees and Reed Beds

In other news, we understand that the council are keen to create more reedbeds and plant more trees around the harbour- We will ensure that we keep conversations open with our Hotwells and Harbourside Councillor to ensure that we are involved and consulted.

Baltic Wharf Caravan Park: End of an era, but the watch continues

The years-long fight to save Baltic Wharf Caravan Park, the last green space on Bristol's Harbour, has ended. On 13 October 2025, dozens of mature trees were destroyed as groundwork began on the controversial new residential development of 166 flats, which will take its place. The new development, which the developers are calling 'Baltic Wharf', will be built alongside and share a name with the existing Baltic Wharf development, part of the Harbour community for over four decades and home to over 200 residents.

Many questions remain about the undervaluation of the land, the absence of a biodiversity restoration plan, and the impact on community, heritage, and flood risk. Campaigners are keeping a close eye on the developers' promise to deliver 40% affordable housing, after councillors voted in July 2025 to waive their legal obligation to do so. Although Goram Homes and Hills Residential say they will honour that pledge, it will be up to Bristol's councillors and the citizens they represent to make sure the loss of this valuable asset can lead to some benefit for Bristolians.

Baltic Wharf may have lost its trees, but the community's determination to seek accountability and fairness for the Harbour's future remains as strong as ever.

Bristol anti-racism statement

H&CCA is a signatory to the Bristol anti-racism statement reproduced below, with thanks to our friends at Playing Out. You can see the full list of signatories at https://forms.gle/AyHa8Jx88xhk8Giz6 and the same form can be used to add new signatories.

As Bristol organisations, groups and representatives, we firmly support the <u>Black</u> <u>Southwest Network's</u> call "to take a stand against racism in all its forms, overt and structural, and to act with courage in the face of hate".

In the past month, a <u>9-year-old girl</u> and a <u>3-year-old child</u> have been the target of violent and hate-fuelled racist attacks in our region's streets and public spaces. Far-right graffiti was sprayed outside a primary school.

Due to incidents like these and the growing visibility of the far-right, many Black and Racially Minoritised people are now "frightened to leave the house, fearful of prejudice and hostility from strangers, neighbours, and even members of their local communities - both offline and online" (BSWN).

We stand together against racism in all its forms. Everyone, of all ages and backgrounds, should feel safe and welcome in their communities.

We urge all Bristolians to come together, find common ground, celebrate our city's diversity, reject hate and look out for each other.

As BSWN say, "True unity comes not from denying difference, but from recognising our shared humanity and working together to dismantle the barriers that continue to hold so many back".

Volunteers Needed! Help Keep Our Streets Clean

Back in 2021, H&CCA helped a group of local residents form a *Street Cleaning Team* to tackle graffiti in our neighbourhoods. Working alongside Bristol City Council, the team removes or paints over smaller graffiti tags found on street furniture — while Bristol Waste focuses on larger tags in public areas.

Team members receive full training from the City Council's Neighbourhood Services team on how to use cleaning equipment safely. Their efforts focus on cleaning street signs, parking meters, utility boxes, and lamp posts, as well as painting over tagging that can't be removed by chemicals.

New Landlords for The Lion

In September, The Lion in Cliftonwood opened its doors again with Flick (Richard) and the team behind the Hope & Anchor responsible for making it roar again. In between all the busy duties of getting the pub up and running again, Flick gave us some time to answer a few questions.

How did you get started running pubs?

I first got into hospitality when I was a teenager. Doing glass collection, then just starting working my way up to eventually opening a restaurant called 99 queens then having the Hope and Anchor and now the Lion, (my whole adult career has been hospitality).

You took on The Lion a few months ago, what attracted you to the pub?

Myself and Adrian want to start building our portfolio of pubs and we saw The Lion was up on full term tenants. So we came checked it out, both fell in love with its uniqueness and thought we could deffo try and make this pub good again, especially as its got such a good rep from previous years.

You've been researching the history of The Lion, what's been the most interesting thing you have discovered so far?

The pub was built in the late 1700's, first publican registered was 1862 Samual Simms. There was a cider bar in front of us that they used to have "moments" in the street as this was an ale house. Things like that make me love pubs and buildings more. (I am still trying to find out more).

From your point of view, what makes a great community pub?

Working with the locals, keeping everyone updated and listening. Obviously we can't do everything that pleases everyone, we are a business that has to make money too. So it's just being open and transparent and I think that's what makes a good community pub work.

What's happening right now?

Irene Correia, Wildlife Champions Project Manager at Avon Wildlife Trust, has been in touch to share information of their new **Wildlife Champions Programme (2025–2028)**, with thanks to funding from the National Lottery Community Fund. Irene says:

Over the past couple of years, we have been supporting residents across 12 postcodes in creating their vision for nature where they live, including setting up and running community gardens, nature festivals, community nature reserves, litter picks, guided walks, foraging and cooking events, and many other initiatives. An update on Jacob's Wells Baths

Jude Hutchen, Heritage Project Manager at Trinity Community Arts, kindly spoke at our AGM in July and has now been in touch with an invitation to join a community consultation for the next phase of work at Jacob's Wells Baths. We are sharing the information here in case you have not heard about it already.

Jude says:

We have reached a crucial stage in the development of this multi-purpose community, arts and heritage hub in Hotwells – and would like to involve you in imagining its future.

Jacob's Wells Baths has a rich history, from 19th-century public baths to community dance centre from mid 1980s until 2016, when, due to extensive disrepair, the building was closed. In 2023 local residents, dance community and civic activists succeeded in securing a Community Asset Transfer under Trinity's guardianship. So far Trinity has raised over £2.5 million to repair the building and continues to generate more. The ambition, dependent on funding, is for the centre to be re-opened at the end of 2028.

We can now offer an exciting opportunity to share your vision for how the building will be used in the future. We invite you to attend a consultation sessions led by Ph3 Architects and Placed creative engagement organisation. The sessions will be held at Jacobs Wells Baths, will last 2.5 hours (with a tour of the building beforehand) and include plenty of refreshments.

As this is a live building site with uneven floors and non ramped entrances, we are unfortunately unable to provide wheelchair access at this stage. If we can accommodate you in another way please get in touch.

Transition Hotwells, Cliftonwood and Clifton

Thanks to the on-going work of the Transition Hotwells, Cliftonwood and Clifton, we have been alerted to the announcement of a planned new law to ban fracking, permanently. A blog post in which Ellen Gibson reflects on key lessons from the long fight to ban fracking in the UK can be accessed here.

In addition, the Transition team has shared some information from Bristol-based Thrive Renewables about growing renewable energy production:

'Net zero is facing some of its fiercest attacks in decades. We're being bombarded with misinformation about the cost of net zero and political calls to "scrap" decarbonisation efforts.

However, without new renewables UK will continue to import billions of pounds worth of gas to meet the rising demand for electricity, priced on volatile international markets, leaving consumers exposed to unnecessarily high prices, while renewables provide homegrown, low cost energy source. Wind and solar already supply more than half of the UK's electricity needs, with wind generating around 30% of total.

Gas resources will not be sufficient to meet rapidly increasing electricity demand. In the coming decade, without new renewables, UK would need to more than double gas imports. There is no credible way the UK could source this through additional North Sea extraction. Even if every potential North Sea discovery was brought into production, the estimate is that this would only be sufficient to meet between 5% and 10% of the country's electricity demand by the early 2030s.'

Bristol Harbour Authority have been in touch to raise awareness of opportunities to lease waterfront premises around Bristol Harbour, whether starting something new or expanding an existing business. Keeping out the damp

Retrofit West CIC, a charity created by the Centre for Sustainable Energy, aims to support people and organisations across the UK to tackle the climate emergency and end the suffering caused by cold homes. Bristol Co-Living Supplementary Planning Document - Public Consultation

The Planning Services team at Bristol City Council are asking for your views on new draft planning guidance relating to Co-Living. The draft Bristol Co-living Supplementary Planning Document provides further guidance on the implementation of a range of existing and new local plan policies that are relevant to the development of co-living accommodation.

The document in question is addressing aims to achieve mixed, balanced and inclusive communities that provide a range of good quality accommodation with high living standards, accessibility and amenity for future residents. It will be used alongside relevant local plan policies to determine all applications for purpose-built co-living accommodation (including conversions of existing buildings). The document will become an important material consideration in the planning decision-making process.
