It has been a great honor serving all of Ventura County and beyond. My career started as a volunteer at the Humane Society. After one year, I became a desk clerk, then an Office Manager and Dog Trainer. I was then transferred to the position of State Humane Officer investigating cases of cruelty and neglect to animals. From 1985 until October 21st, 2022, I held the position of Shelter Director serving all of Ventura County.

I have had an incredible journey working with the best of the best. To my mentor who trained me until her retirement, Joyce George, I will be forever grateful. To Board President, Cyndy Treutelaar, now retired, you have helped me tremendously. Thank you to Assistant Shelter Director, Arlene MacSween, for the past 20 years. We have been through it all and laughed and cried together.

I would also like to honor my staff. These men and women work so hard to care for the animals that are abused or no longer wanted. I can't tell you how much you all mean to me. You are truly the heroes and best people I have had the honor to work with. We have worked so hard together, sometimes living at the shelter for weeks during disasters, rescuing animals from fires, floods, and earthquakes. We saved so many lives. It's hard to believe it has been close to 20 years since I graduated from Veterinary School at the University of Illinois. When I graduated vet school, most students had performed exactly four surgeries: 1 dog and 1 cat spay, and 1 dog and 1 cat neuter. To say I needed more experience would be an understatement! I volunteered at many shelters and outreach organizations during my 4th year to improve my skills. After a decade in private practice, I found shelter medicine is my passion. Keeping up with changes in the profession is not only required but also essential. So, when an organization known as Neighborhood Cats put out a veterinary scholarship to attend the ASPCA Spay/Neuter advanced training clinic in Ashville, North Carolina, I thought it would be a great opportunity to refresh my skills and techniques.

Most people know of the ASPCA (American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals) as a rescue organization, but they also do a significant amount of research and training in spay/neuter techniques to improve safety, tissue handling, and patient outcomes for veterinarians doing High Quality, High Volume Spay/Neuter Surgery (HQHVSN). The primary goal of HQHVSN organizations is to reduce pet overpopulation through spay and neuter. The HSVC spay/neuter clinic does, on average, 15 surgeries a day in a 3-hour

time frame. That is the typical number of surgeries most full-service clinics do in a week! To complete those surgeries, the clinic and I staff must be efficient, conscientious of staff and patient safety, and work well as a team. I am happy to say that my time at the ASPCA gave me more confidence in new techniques and my skills as a surgeon, as well as new medication applications and techniques for our technicians to bring back to HSVC. I also enjoyed exploring beautiful Ashville after my time at the clinic each day.

I am extremely grateful to the Neighborhood Cats Organization for awarding me this opportunity and to the ASPCA for being so welcoming, especially during COVID. The Humane Society of Ventura County is saddened to announce the passing of beloved shelter mascot, Maso, who crossed the rainbow bridge on September 29th, 2022. Many would recognize Maso as one of our longtime four-legged greeters in the office at the shelter. His large size and even larger heart will be greatly missed by our staff, volunteers, and visitors of the shelter.

Eleven-year-old Maso began his journey with the HSVC when he was adopted by a sweet couple in 2014. When his owner tragically passed away seven years later, the large German Shepherd was returned to the shelter to find a new forever home. Shelter Director Jolene Hoffman and Director of Investigations Jeff Hoffman instantly knew Maso was meant for their family and brought him home the same day he was returned. He was happily greeted by his two new siblings and fellow HSVC alums, Parker and Cooper.

"Maso loved going to work at the HSVC. Every morning Maso would chill on the drive to work, he knew exactly when we turned down Bryant St. He would sit up and talk to us then lean his head forward to get a good look at what was going on at the shelter. Once there, he would wait for us to unlock the door while pushing his head against it to open it for us. He made sure he was always

the first one inside, always looking out for us, then he would go to his bed and lay down for his 'shift' at the shelter,"

said Assistant Shelter Director Arlene MacSween of the sweet pup. As shelter mascot, Maso often starred in social media posts and photoshoot opportunities on behalf of the shelter. He was always a good sport, no matter how ridiculous the outfit our staff made him wear. Maso also had a fascination with the young puppies and kittens who came through the shelter. His "motherly instincts" always came out any time a small animal was in the office.

From the entire HSVC community, we will all dearly miss Maso's friendly personality, quirky playfulness, and loving nature. Rest in peace, sweet boy!

HSVC Hosts 2nd Annual Event at Ojai Valley Brewery







The HSVC is excited to share that Shyann and Cowboy have found their forever home together with Beverlee! We could not be happier for them! Our Humane Officers brought Cowboy and Shyann to the HSVC during separate abuse and neglect cases. Shyann, a 25-year-old miniature horse, arrived in mid-December with severely overgrown hooves and in need of immediate care. Cowboy, a 25-year-old pony, arrived in mid-August with several other animals also in need of immediate vet care. Thanks to Dr. April Armstrong, Farrier Stacy Hyatt, and our dedicated shelter staff, both Shyann and Cowboy were able to make a full recovery and find their happily ever after with Beverlee!

On Friday, September 30th, HSVC received a call from long-time supporter and animal advocate Beverlee McGrath inquiring about Shyann and Cowboy. After hearing their story, Beverlee quickly decided she wanted to make the two petite horses a part of her family. HSVC Equine Specialist Christina Malleck and Senior Humane Officer King arranged to transport the two miniature horses to Beverlee's farm on October 1st.



#### Donate Used Vehicles to Benefit Animals in Need!


Do you have a vehicle you would like to donate to help animals in need? The Humane Society of Ventura County accepts most used automobiles, trailers, RVs, boats, motorcycles, and other motor vehicles as a tax-deductible donation. After passing a safety check and smog test, donated vehicles will be sold to benefit the animals at the HSVC!

"We have been doing this program for decades and have raised a significant amount of funds for the shelter over the years," said Jeff Kroll, who has been running the program since 2003. To date, we have processed over 500 used vehicles with proceeds benefiting the shelter and its animals.

We encourage those interested in donating a how the donation progressive vehicle to benefit our shelter to do so before HSVC reserves the right December 31st of this tax year. Donors can write or vehicle at any time.

off the sale price of the vehicle after it is sold. If the car or truck sells after December 31st, donors can still write off the selling price, but it will have to be on the following year's tax return.

Any donation accepted after inspection by Jeff Kroll receives a receipt from HSVC that allows a \$500 credit on your taxes. However, if the donated vehicle sells for more than \$500, you may write off the higher amount. Please note the HSVC reserves the right to decline any car, truck, or vehicle at any time.
