Letter from the Executive Director Big Things Coming in 2023!



Where we've been is amazing, and where we're going is extraordinary. Since the Humane Society of Ventura County was founded in 1932, the dedicated volunteers and staff have made a tremendous impact. The animals saved, education offered, animals treated and cared for, cases of abuse and neglect responded to, and more, all add up to an immeasurable positive difference made in your backyard, the county, the region, and even the nation.

And because of you, we're on the verge of much more. In 2023, through strategic planning and increased capacity, we will be increasing animals adopted while also decreasing their average length of stay. We will be expanding our staff by bringing in a Finance Director and adding an adoption counselor and kennel staff. Our development team will be implementing a brand new annual fund plan, introducing a business supporter membership program, and building a new grants calendar. We will roll out a new foster program with a dedicated staff partner for fosters and increase our volunteer base. Additionally, Summer of 2023 will see brand new summer programs in Ojai and surrounding communities. These programs will be for the general public and include things like "Your First Year With Puppy" for people considering adopting a pup, "Rattlesnake Aversion", and more.

Recently, HSVC welcomed a new Humane Investigations Director, Kendra King, who has stepped into the position from her Sr. Humane Officer role. We're proud to have our Media and Marketing Manager Amy King now in a role that increases HSVC's reach and creates additional marketing initiatives to support the annual fund development plan. Steve McCurry is now our Community Development Manager, and his experience in stewarding and cultivating vital relationships will be

put to greater use as he works with new Director of Development Amber Landis to make sure our business engagement is meaningful to our stakeholders. We are thrilled to welcome Jennifer Grimm to the HSVC as our new Volunteer Coordinator. Her 17+ years of experience in animal welfare will surely help us reach our goals in the coming year.

The enthusiasm of the staff is contagious, and it's an honor to create these visions alongside them, and an honor to be helping create the conditions necessary for them to thrive. The support of the Board and the volunteers in all of our endeavors is priceless, and we couldn't do any of it without them. Finally, it's with a heavy heart we say goodbye to Volunteer Ambassador Laurie Adams. Laurie's dedication and love for HSVC was clear and she will be greatly missed.

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
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Hello HSVC Neighbors!

Humane Education youth programs have recently been updated to include an early elementary program for the K-2 audience. I am pleased to announce that after two years of planning, designing, and curating research and after many hours of professional development, Imagining Compassionate Animal Neighborhood (ICAN) made its debut at Richard Bard Elementary School. The new program invites students to interact with a humane educator in a classroom setting. The program focuses on animal storytelling, writing, movement, and creates opportunities for students to imagine a compassionate animal neighborhood where people come together to help the animals in their communities. In the Fall of 2022, Ms. Katya Acuna's 2nd-grade class

started this ICAN journey by first participating in a humane educator-led presentation called, "Pet Care and Responsibility". This type of presentation gives students a glimpse into learning about the different ways people can care for animal companions. She later requested ICAN to be part of her dual immersion language curriculum. And I couldn't have been more excited to answer the call.

Part of HSVC's youth program goals is to learn more about what resources teachers need and what ways humane education programming can help to engage youth to learn about how to create more compassionate loving neigh-

borhoods and communities. As a humane educator, I have a passion for helping animals and I want to partner with more schools and teachers that may be interested in enriching their literacy, writing, storytelling, or social studies curriculum with an animal and a movement twist. Clinic Corner

HSVC Partnerships Help Grow the Future of our Veterinary Community

There is a staffing crisis in the veterinary field. It started well before COVID, but the stress of curb-side appointments, quarantine requirements, and an influx of new clients acquiring pets during the pandemic caused many to leave the profession. When Ventura College shared they were starting a Registered Veterinary Technician (RVT) Certification program, our veterinary community rejoiced! RVTs are like nurse practitioners; they receive advanced training, pass a difficult board exam, and can then legally perform many tasks delegated by the veterinarian that an unlicensed technician can't. Before VC college started its program, the closest colleges with RVT programs were over two hours away.

Despite COVID setbacks and construction delays, VC's RVT program achieved accreditation and was set to graduate their first set of students last month. However, their on-site teaching lab was still under construction and their students needed hands-on experience. HSVC stepped in and hosted their senior students on three separate days. They practiced IV catheter placement, calculating drug dosages, medication administration, anesthesia, surgery prep, and more. It was fun to have the energetic students in our clinic, and we even got interviewed by NPR! HSVC will continue our partnership with the VC program

in the clinic and with other shelter resources. We will continue letting students "borrow" our friendly adult cats for animal handling classes and having an animal behavior experts demonstrate proper canine handling techniques and behavior at our shelter.

This year, we're extending our community partnerships to the Charter College Veterinary Assistant Program and Ventura County Office of Education Community Classroom Internship Program. The latter is a program for high school students to gain experience in the veterinary field. We are excited to help the next generation with a passion for helping pets and their community do what they love. For more information about the VC College RVT program, visit www.venturacollege.edu.



He would frequently volunteer at the shelter helping with gardening, handyman work, and sorting walnuts that were donated to us from a local ranch for a fundraising event. Don was such a supportive and sweet person, always cheering on the staff and volunteers. He helped create a large fundraising event: Cats in the Canyon and Hounds in the Hollow, which ran for several years and raised some much-needed funding for HSVC. It was that commitment to helping animals in need that prompted an invitation to become a member of HSVC's Board of Directors, which Don proudly served on for over 15 years.

"Don was an amazing volunteer and Board member. He would spend hours on site helping out gardening and sorting walnuts that were donated for us to sell. Anything that needed to get done, Don was happy to lend a hand," said Interim Shelter Director Arlene MacSween.

The HSVC is also mourning the loss of another beloved member of our team, volunteer Animal Ambassador Laurie Adams. Laurie passed away peacefully on February 2nd, 2023, at the age of 70 from complications caused by cryptococcal meningitis. A longtime educator and lover of the outdoors, Laurie began her journey with the HSVC after retiring from teaching first grade in 2018. She had a special place in her heart for "underdogs", which led her to begin volunteering with the HSVC. Her passion for helping these special animals also led her to welcome a new addition into her family, 3-year-old Beau, whom she fell in love with during her time volunteering at the shelter. She and her husband Roger frequently took Beau and their other four-legged son, Luke, on crosscountry adventures (pictured below).

After several years as a volunteer, Laurie was promoted to the role of an Animal Ambassador. She, along with her fellow Animal Ambassadors, enjoyed taking dogs for pack walks, attending offsite events, and hosting play dates with dogs in our agility yard. Laurie was also one of the first members of HSVC's Emergency Response Team, a special group of volunteers who assist the shelter during emergencies.

Laurie also deeply cared for our kennel staff. She always made sure they felt supported, valued, and appreciated. "Laurie was an all emcompassing volunteer. She always tried to work with the dogs that were having the hardest time at the shelter. She was supportive not only of the animals, but also of the kennel staff and was always there to offer emotional support during tough times. She was such a sweet person and will be very missed down in the kennel," said Kennel Attendant Jessica Tucker.

Laurie was the friendliest person
that once you met her, you were friends
for life. She was the biggest advocate for
dogs. Always putting their best interest first.
She would do whatever it took to find the
right home and the right adopter for the
right dog. She cared for every dog at
the shelter like it was her own.



Kendra King has stepped into the role of Humane Investigations Director and will continue to use all that she learned working with Jeff. She has already begun by leading the HSVC Investigations Department as we take on new cases and answer calls around the County, and she will soon be building out a revised cross-agency disaster plan designed to meet the needs of the community and region in any kind of disaster/emergency scenario. Kendra has been in touch with the City Manager for the City of Ojai, and we have spoken with the Mayor and the Chief of Police to schedule visits and discuss effective cross-agency and governmental communications.



Department of Investigations Announces New Leadership Thank You, Jeff Hoffman and Congratulations, Kendra King!

Kendra joined the HSVC staff in January 2014 as an adoption counselor. After studying criminal justice and anthropology at Ventura College, she began extensive training to become a Humane Officer, completing the Animal Law Enforcement Academy at the San Diego Humane in October 2015. Kendra was officially sworn in as a Humane Officer in July 2016 at the Ventura County Courthouse. Since then, she's completed many courses on California animal laws, investigation techniques, disaster response, and animal abuse and neglect. In March 2020, King used her experience in disaster preparedness to form the shelter's Emergency



Response Team (E.R.T.), composed of a group of dedicated volunteers that provide support at the shelter during times of emergency. Kendra was also recognized for her accomplishments and excellent leadership skills as a Humane Officer and was promoted to Senior Humane Officer in June of 2021.

In addition to new leadership, the Investigations department also added two new officers-in-training. A. Derringer and R. Gonzalez have demonstrated the values, drive, and passion that is so important to Humane Investigations. We look forward to nurturing their careers and watching them grow. Humane Officer J. Utter has been serving our community since 2021. Her exemplary skills and attitude are a huge asset to the Investigations department. In 2022, the Humane Society of Ventura County was fortunate to be among the recipients of the Ventura County Community Foundation's Animal Welfare Fund Grant. Since 1987, VCCF has been at the forefront of connecting philanthropic resources with community needs. VCCF understands how important the services HSVC and other animal welfare organizations provide to the residents of Ventura County. As we move into the Spring of 2023, we've put VCCF's funding to work at the shelter and throughout Ventura County. With the generous funding, we've been able to:

- Maintain and grow our Pet Food Pantry, which serves all of Ventura County
- Purchase two new Kohler Natural Gas Generators to keep HSVC operational during disasters
- Replace outdated computer servers, hardware, and wi-fi equipment
- Purchase state-of-the-art equipment for our onsite Spay and Neuter Clinic
- Provide free HSVC Cares vaccination events to communities across Ventura County
- Collaborate with animal welfare organizations to create a stronger community

We rely solely on the generosity of our donors and supporters such as VCCF to continue providing our vital services to those in need.
