The 2nd National Indigenous Carbon Forum Program is shaping up to be truly extraordinary. From across Australia, we will present updates on the State of the Indigenous Carbon Industry, the Carbon Market, Carbon Methods and future opportunities.

The event will take the following format:

Day One, Indigenous only Forum Tuesday, May 16

Limited to First Nations people, ICIN member organisations and Indigenous organisations in person only, providing a safe space for discussion of issues facing Indigenous landholders in the carbon industry and the Indigenous carbon industry as a whole.

Day Two, Plenary + Workshops Wednesday May 17

A showcase of Indigenous carbon projects and important discussions with corporates and governments about key policy issues impacting the industry.

Day Three, Plenary + Workshops Thursday, May 18

Focused workshops on specific issues, and opportunities for networking and relationship-building, a key focus of the ICIN.

&& While carbon projects offer significant opportunities, without proper consultation and appropriate checks and balances, and a commitment to seeking ongoing free, prior and informed consent, there is a risk of third-party projects contributing to the disempowerment of Indigenous people.

We need industry and policy-makers actively working to protect native title rights and interests, and ensuring access to these economic opportunities for Traditional Owners – in method development, consent considerations, and pricing discussions – to put Traditional Owners in the driving seat.

THE OPPORTUNITY

There are currently 31 Indigenous-owned savanna fire management projects, as well as several Indigenous-owned human-induced regeneration carbon projects registered in Australia through the Federal Government's Emissions Reduction Fund.

ICIN is working with its members, research partners, governments and the Clean Energy Regulator to support co-design of new carbon methods that will widen opportunities for Indigenous groups seeking to participate in the carbon market.

It also seeks to raise awareness of opportunities for Indigenous groups in the carbon industry, and to this end has published an Indigenous Carbon Projects Guide.

The National Indigenous Carbon Forum attracts:

 An estimated 500 National Indigenous Carbon Forum attendees, including Indigenous rangers and land managers, scientists, policymakers and carbon market specialists.



MISSION, PURPOSE & VALUES

Mission

To promote and facilitate an active, innovative, and Indigenous led carbon industry supporting healthy country and better livelihoods for Indigenous people.

Purpose

To support Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples through the advancement of the Indigenous carbon industry in Australia, and the advancement of education, social or public welfare, culture and the enhancement of the natural environment in connection with the Indigenous carbon industry.

The company aims to achieve the purpose(s) by:

- 1. Enabling and empowering Indigenous people to benefit from Australian carbon markets.
- 2. Working towards an Indigenous-led carbon industry supporting the advancements and aspirations of Indigenous people across Australia through:
 - Promoting Indigenous leadership and empowering Indigenous voices to be represented and Indigenous knowledges, practices and perspectives are represented in the Australian carbon industry
 - Advocating for an Australian carbon industry that is accessible to Indigenous people, protects and strengthens Indigenous rights, delivers benefits to Indigenous communities, and supports healthy country outcomes
 - Ensuring the interests of the Indigenous carbon industry are represented in public decision-making processes
 - Promoting best practice standards for Indigenous engagement in the Australian carbon industry, enabling fair business agreements and Indigenous empowerment
 - Building, promoting, and strengthening the reputation of Indigenous carbon credits in Australia and internationally.
- 3. Supporting an active network of Indigenous carbon businesses, organisations and groups engaged in the Australian carbon industry through:
 - · Building the capacity of Indigenous people to engage in the Australian carbon industry
 - Supporting the growth of Indigenous Producers and Indigenous Proponents benefiting from the Australian carbon industry.
- 4. Disseminating information, research, policy and market updates and news about and for the Indigenous carbon industry.

Values

- Strategic and Focused: Our purpose is clear and connected to our actions.
- Genuine, Indigenous-led, accessible and member-driven: We work together to support each other from the ground up, by ensuring decision-making is driven by our members.
- Empowering and Inclusive: We support more Indigenous voices to be heard and seek to maximise benefits to Indigenous communities by enabling greater Indigenous engagement in the carbon industry.

- Respectful: We acknowledge that we all come from different places, yet we seek common ground where we find it. We respect local cultural protocols and are mindful that our industry is grounded in thousands of years of traditional knowledge and practices.
