The Order of the IFEM, also known as the Fellowship of the IFEM (FIFEM), was created in 1999 and is awarded to individuals who have demonstrated an extensive and continuous commitment to the specialty of Emergency Medicine in their own country as well as having made significant contributions to supporting the development and advancement of IFEM. Criteria used to consider a nomination include serving in a leadership role within IFEM, active involvement in the planning of ICEM, or recognition of an exceptional individual who has contributed to international Emergency Medicine in another way.

The Fellowship awards are presented at each ICEM. As the membership of IFEM grows, so do the number of recipients of this award. Thus far, more than one hundred individuals have been recognized for the Order of the IFEM.

The IFEM Humanitarian Award was first presented at the ICEM in Australia in 2004. The award recognizes an individual or organization that has conducted work related to international emergency medicine which has led to major humanitarian or public health benefits or positive effects.

In 2013 IFEM created the Gautam Bodiwala Lifetime Leadership Achievement Award as its highest form of recognition. The purpose of the Award is to recognize an individual who has demonstrated an extensive and continuous commitment to the International Federation for Emergency Medicine resulting in significant contributions to the development and advancement of the IFEM in addition to extensive and continuous commitment to the specialty of emergency medicine in their own country.

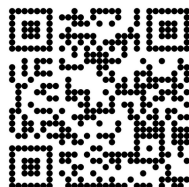

Citation for Dr Georgina Phillips

If one's commitment to advocacy for equity in global emergency care (GEC) could be measured, no-one would score more highly than Dr Georgina Phillips. Georgina equals advocacy for equity in health systems; she has dedicated her life to working to improve access to emergency care for vulnerable people and groups of people, in her own community, her primary workplace, across Australia and, indeed, globally.

Georgina completed her medical degree at the University of Melbourne in Australia, then completed her specialisation as an emergency physician two decades ago, and is near completion of an impactful PhD exploring the lessons for emergency care leadership, mentorship and system-strengthening across the Pacific Island countries and beyond. Her humanitarian work began early with periods as a medical student, junior doctor and emergency medicine trainee in Kiribati, Fiji and Papua New Guinea.

Now, after leading multiple emergency care programs over many years across the Pacific, there would be no emergency care doctor currently in the Pacific Islands who has not been positively touched by the impact of Georgina, either through working alongside her, or by virtue of her collaborative work to increase the capacity of the emergency care system in their individual regions, including in Kiribati, Fiji, Papua New Guinea, the Solomon Islands and Timor Leste.

In Papua New Guinea, Georgina led the establishment of a Visiting Lecturer Program, bringing together senior emergency trainees from Australia and Aotearoa New Zealand with the emergency department doctors and nurses in Madang. In Timor Leste, and then in the Solomon Islands, Georgina has led government-funded formal emergency care system needs assessments, delivering reports that have informed and driven subsequent long-standing programs for emergency care system-building.

In Fiji, in 2018, Georgina co-led a Pacific-wide regional consensus activity to establish the status and priorities for emergency care system development across the region. This activity, again, has driven subsequent progress in emergency care system development.

Georgina's advocacy immediately following the 2021 military coup in Myanmar has been exemplary and unwilting. Having established strong professional relationships with emergency care stakeholders across Myanmar over a decade of work, including regular project- and examination-related in-country visits, Georgina rapidly assembled key local and international partners (e.g. ACEM, IFEM, the Lancet) to generate a series of outputs, strongly, clearly and persistently articulating and addressing the clear threats to the delivery of emergency care, and directly to emergency care workers, in Myanmar.

Georgina's commitment to equity in access to quality emergency care is not limited to partners outside her home country; it begins very much at home. Her work at St Vincent's Hospital in Melbourne, including for the emergency care of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, and for people experiencing homelessness, stands as a clear demonstration that her advocacy, integrity, consistency and humanitarian principles are pervasive to all contexts, both far away and close to home. This marks a high level of humanitarianism, one that is not limited by boundaries. Similarly, Georgina's international humanitarian work is not limited to when she can be in the country; her schedule of on-line meetings and communications with emergency care stakeholders and colleagues across the region further demonstrates an unwavering commitment to sustainability in emergency care.

In the midst of being a pillar of international humanitarian advocacy over decades, Georgina continues to be a GEC leader through her participation in the work of relevant committees and events.

Georgina has been a longstanding member of the ACEM GEC Committee, including being its Chair, after years of active International Emergency Medicine Special Interest Group work.

She was an inaugural awardee of the ACEM International Development Grant and has sponsored and hosted multiple awardees for the ACEM International Scholarship, in addition to warmly welcoming many regional colleagues to her own home when they have visited Melbourne, Australia, for various emergency care-related Workshops. Georgina has been a longstanding member of the ACEM Foundation, strongly advocating for equity in emergency care. Georgina is a regular invited speaker and faculty for GEC events, including for the annual Alfred-Monash GEC Symposium and Workshop, for which she was a member of the inaugural faculty, and in 2019, Georgina delivered the esteemed Tom Hamilton oration at ACEM's Annual Scientific Meeting in Hobart. Among Georgina's numerous formal career accolades, she was awarded by ACEM, both the 2020 and 2021 GEC Research Award plus the 2021 Distinguished Service Award, the latter recognising Georgina's significant high-level service to emergency care capacity development at an exceptional level over a long period of time.

Georgina holds academic positions at both Monash and Melbourne Universities and has published widely on emergency care systems, including leadership, mentorship, needs assessments and priorities. She is one of the inaugural faculty for the Alfred- Monash Capacity-Building in GEC Course. Georgina also serves as a Trustee of the Primary Trauma Care Foundation, is a member of the Committee of Management of the St Vincent's Pacific Health Fund and a co-editor of the GEC section for the Emergency Medicine Australasia journal. In the absence of a measure for advocacy, the driving force for equity in GEC, Georgina Phillips is the benchmark without peer. There is no-one more deserving of the prestigious IFEM Humanitarian Award.

Citation for Roger Dickerson

Roger Dickerson is a Specialist Emergency Physician and Intensivist currently practicing in the Western Cape Province of South Africa and has served as the President of the College of Emergency Medicine of South Africa (from 2011 to 2017) and the President of the Emergency Medicine Society of South Africa (from 2016-2019).

Dr Dickerson completed his undergraduate studies at the University of the Witwatersrand, and after graduating in 1998, went on to complete the Diploma in Primary Emergency Care of the College of Emergency Medicine of South Africa and the Diploma in Anaesthesia of the College of Anaesthetists of South Africa in 2001.

He was admitted to the Specialist Register of the Health Professions Council of South Africa as a Specialist Emergency Physician in 2007 and went on to pursue a Sub-Specialty Fellowship in Critical Care. In 2010, Roger became the first Emergency Physician in South Africa to be admitted to a Sub-Specialty Register – after successfully completing the Certificate in Critical Care of the Colleges of Medicine of South Africa as the top candidate.

In 2011, Roger was promoted to the position of Adjunct Professor of Emergency Medicine in the School of Clinical Medicine of the University of the Witwatersrand and, at the time, was the youngest individual to achieve this honour. Prof Dickerson moved to the Western Cape in 2014 and was appointed as a Senior Lecturer in the Division of Emergency Medicine at the University of Cape Town.

Roger has successfully supervised numerous masters students across multiple clinical disciplines at both the University of the Witwatersrand and the University of Cape Town, and has contributed to the development of Emergency Medicine through various articles and textbook chapters in the fields of Emergency Medicine and Critical Care and as an Associate Editor for the African Journal of Emergency Medicine.

Dr Dickerson was elected to the Council of the College of Emergency Medicine of South Africa in 2008 and has served as the Secretary (from 2008 to 2011), the President (from 2011 to 2017), and as the Immediate Past President (from 2017 to 2020). As a member of Senate of the Colleges of Medicine of South Africa and the Examinations and Credentials Committee for the same period, Roger has not only contributed to the improvement of training and assessment in Emergency Medicine, but across all specialties and subspecialties. Roger has served as examiner, convenor, and moderator of all examinations offered by the College of Emergency Medicine of South Africa. Additionally, he has remarkably served as an examiner, convenor or moderator across thirteen different examinations across nine different Constituent Colleges of the Colleges of Medicine of South Africa.

Dr Dickerson has been a member of the Emergency Medicine Society of South Africa from its inception and served on the Executive Committee from 2011 to date. Roger served as Vice-President (from 2011 to 2016), as President (from 2016 to 2019), and as Immediate Past President (from 2019 to 2022). He has – and continues to – champion the priorities of Emergency Medicine nationally. His contributions were recognized by the Emergency Medicine Society of South Africa in awarding him the Order of the Emergency Medicine Society of South Africa in 2019.

Roger served as a Board Member of the African Federation for Emergency Medicine from 2016 to 2019, and as a full voting member of the International Federation for Emergency Medicine in his capacity of President of the Emergency Medicine Society of South Africa from 2016 to 2019. In these roles, he has championed the development of Emergency Medicine in under-developed environments through partnerships with the University of Botswana and the University of Sydney. Roger is a much-sought-after speaker at local and international conferences – particularly for his knowledge, wit, and skill as an educator.

Citation for Professor Lim Swee Han

Professor Lim Swee Han is a Senior Consultant from the Department of Emergency Medicine (DEM) at Singapore General Hospital (SGH). Formerly, he was Head of Department from 2003 to 2009 during the SARS crisis. His main research interest lies in emergency cardiac care, resuscitation (CPR training) and cardiac markers. He has authored/co-authored more than 100 papers in international journals. He was instrumental in the establishment of chest pain short stay protocol with the use of troponin (later hs troponin T) in Singapore. He was the founding Honorary Secretary, Resuscitation Council of Asia (RCA), 2005 to 2011. He co-led RCA to join International Liaison Committee on Resuscitation (ILCOR) in 2006. He became the Chairman of RCA from 2011 to 2016 and Hon Treasurer from 2016. He was the Treasurer of ILCOR 2011-2017.

He served with distinction as President of our Society for Emergency Medicine in Singapore from 2012 to 2021. He is also the founding Hon Secretary College of Emergency Physicians, Academy of Medicine Singapore since 2015. He contributed significantly to Singapore's hosting of ICEM 2010 – the first time ICEM was held in Asia as the Hon Secretary of ICEM 2010. He served as Board member representing Asia Region and Continuing Professional Development Committee member of IFEM from 2016 to 2018.

Prof Lim is a dedicated and committed clinician educator. Among his many achievements, he was a Member Specialist Training Committee (EM), Specialist Accreditation Board, MOH, and was also an examiner of the exit exam for Emergency Medicine and part of the examination subcommittee under the Residency Review Committee, (EM) MOH, 2008-2015. He was appointed Professor at Duke-NUS Medical School in 2018 and as an Adjunct Professor at Yong Loo Lin School of Medicine in 2019. As Associate Designated Institutional Official (ADIO) SGH in 2019, he was Co-Chairman of the SGH Performance Review Subcommittee (PRS) overseeing the training performance of the PGY1s .

Citation for Dr Fergal Hickey

Dr Hickey qualified from University College, Dublin in 1985, trained in Emergency Medicine at Leicester and was appointed Consultant in EM in Sligo University Hospital in Ireland in April 1995, a position he held up to his recent retirement. He holds the FRCS, Diploma in Anaesthesia, FRCSEd (A&E), FRCEM and Diploma in Leadership & Quality in Healthcare. He was awarded the FIFEM in June 2012.

At the time of appointment, Irish EM was in its infancy with a small number of Consultants working single-handedly. Over his tenure he has overseen staffing increase to 5 Consultants & 16 junior doctors. His ED initiated an Advanced Nurse Practitioner programme; became a sentinel site for POCUS; appointed the first Consultant in Paediatric EM outside the Dublin Paediatric hospitals; became the sole site hosting all the relevant resuscitation training courses and became a well-regarded training site on the national EM training schemes. He currently directs the ACLS, ATLS and APLS Provider Courses hosted in Sligo.

He has always been an advocate of the global development of EM and sought to strengthen the ties between the Irish Association for Emergency Medicine (IAEM) and the Royal College of Emergency Medicine, European Society for Emergency Medicine and International Federation for Emergency Medicine (IFEM). He has had multiple roles within IFEM. These include chairing sessions, being an invited speaker and being Workshop Faculty at multiple ICEMs. He chaired the Local Organising Committee for the ICEM 2012 Dublin Meeting. He was Member-at-large on the Board of IFEM in the lead up to ICEM2012. Of note, both the number of abstracts received and the number of attendees exceeded all previous ICEMs. Uniquely, the conference was opened by the President of Ireland and is the only ICEM to be opened by a Head of State. To date, IAEM remains the smallest organisation to have hosted an ICEM.

Having being a member of the IFEM CPD Committee since 2012, he was appointed Chair in 2014 and served until 2018. During that period, criteria awarding an ICEM conference were updated; a process put in place for ICEM to endorse educational events and the first ICEM Symposia took place. Dr Hickey was a member of the Venue Selection Committee deciding the venues for the 2014, 2016 and 2018 ICEMs and subsequently chaired the Committees deciding the venues for the 2019, 2020, 2021, 2022, 2023 and 2024 ICEMs. He served on the Oversight Liaison Committees for ICEMs in 2019, 2020, 2023 and chairs the 2024 committee. On a number of occasions he has been a member of the group who consider and score applicants for IFEM's various awards. He has served as Irish representative on the IFEM Assembly from 2005 to 2022 inclusive having been nominated by the two succeeding IAEM Presidents to represent them during their terms.

Dr Hickey has been a member of the Irish Association for Emergency Medicine since its inception and uniquely has been elected President on three occasions. He has provided inspirational leadership in advancing the development of EM in Ireland with IAEM now the go-to organisation for all matters relating to EM in Ireland by media and politicians alike. He is widely recognised by the general public as the voice of EM nationally. He was a founding member of the Working Group of the National Emergency Medicine Programme that produced a blueprint for the future development of EM in Ireland.

Dr Hickey has been an Instructor in the Resuscitation Programmes relevant to EM for many years. He is National Director for the ATLS programme in Ireland. His particular interest in trauma has resulted in him being appointed a member of the National Trauma Programme Oversight Committee tasked with the design and implementation of the National Trauma System for Ireland.

Since taking up post in 1995, he has been a trainer and mentor to both junior and senior trainees in EM, many of whom have gone on to become Consultants in the specialty and cite him as the reason for their choice.
