OUR PURPOSE

The International Federation for Emergency Medicine (IFEM) is a global membership-based organization. Our purpose is to promote access to, and lead the development of, the highest quality of emergency medical care for all people.

IFEM is committed to achieving universal access to high quality emergency medical care, through education and standards, supporting growth of the specialty of emergency medicine in every country, and strong advocacy with governments, global health organizations, and communities.

Over the past three decades we have grown to include Members from all regions of the world, with more than 70 emergency medicine societies and organizations.

Our Members range from those with highly developed emergency care systems, to those in various stages of development, or just starting out.

Our Member organizations are comprised of clinicians and researchers, academics and administrators, and experts in all facets of emergency care, in all environments, for all ages and types of patients. These individuals work as volunteers for IFEM, dedicated to sharing their expertise, time and commitment to make a positive impact on emergency medical care for all people and communities.

IFEM's strong networks and collegial membership provides us with unique insight and reach into health systems globally with the ability to rapidly harness expertise and draw global teams together to work on any project or emergency medical care challenge.

THE IMPORTANCE OF EMERGENCY CARE

When someone suffers an injury or a sudden illness - an emergency - at home, work or leisure, their initial health outcome relies on an integrated approach to recognition and treatment.

Quality emergency medical care prevents or reduces the otherwise devastating impacts of road trauma, sepsis, stroke, heart attack, acute complications of pregnancy and childbirth, and many childhood infections.

Over half the deaths in low and middle-income countries could be avoided by effective immediate interventions on scene, organized and safe transport to a hospital with an emergency care unit; followed by a skilled assessment, stabilization, and diagnosis.

THE IMPORTANCE OF EMERGENCY CARE TO **GLOBAL HEALTH SYSTEMS**

Well organized emergency care is recognized as among the most costeffective public health interventions. This is as true on a daily basis as well as in times of disaster or pandemic. Quite simply, effective emergency care delivered by properly trained staff saves lives, improves the effectiveness of other parts of the health system, and reduces costs across all settings of high, middle, and low-income countries.

Recognizing this importance to strong health systems, the WHO in its 2007 World Health Assembly (WHA) Resolution 60.22 'Health Systems: Emergency Care Systems' called for all countries to develop effective emergency care systems. More recently in 2019, WHA 72.16 'Emergency care systems for universal health coverage: ensuring timely care for the acutely ill and injured' placed Emergency Medicine as a core specialty within any healthcare system.

IFEM'S ROLE IN ADVANCING EMERGENCY **HEALTHCARE SYSTEMS**

Emergency Physicians and other emergency medical care workers are integral to building emergency healthcare systems. IFEM provides a global community of practice and shared expertise developed by emergency physicians from all regions of the world. In this regard, IFEM is the sole provider of professional development and expertise in emergency medicine at a global level. IFEM has a strong advocacy role with governments, global health organizations and communities.

President's Report

IFEM celebrated a milestone birthday in October 2021, which was the 30th anniversary of the signing of its Charter, and formation as an organization dedicated to fostering the development of the specialty of emergency medicine, friendship and exchange of ideas, and global high quality emergency medical care. Since that time, IFEM has faced various challenges, but none more demanding than during the past 12 months.

The convergence of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, impacting within the IFEM office on staff, and revenue generation, and within our membership on every aspect of emergency medical care, and the unlucky coincidence in timing with the resignation of key staff members during the year, has increased internal challenges in supporting IFEM's growing activities and meeting the expectations of our many stakeholders. As we all know with challenge comes opportunity, an imperative to rapidly adapt, explore options and adjust course. This is where my and the Board's energy has been directed for much of this year. As the President who has held this amazing position during the pandemic - a time when late night zoom became a way of life, events were canceled or virtual, and the anticipated opportunities to travel widely visiting members had vanished - naturally, attention to optimizing IFEM's direction and performance singularly became a large part of my focus.

So let me touch on just some areas of progress made towards increasing the value of IFEM to members and wider stakeholders, improving financial sustainability, enhancing diversity and inclusion and improving communications. With the biennial renewal of IFEM Committees last year, there was a large improvement in representation of members from all regions of the world, an increase in female committee members from 22-33%, and many younger physicians participating for the first time in IFEM groups. There has been a similar trend in membership of special interest groups. Our desire to be a truly diverse and inclusive organization representing our members is increasingly being realised, and there is much in progress with better support and mentorship opportunities under development. With the incoming Board standing for election shortly, it has been wonderful to receive nominations from so many highly skilled and experienced emergency physicians, from all parts of the world, prepared to commit to many hours of work in support of the organization. That so many Board positions are strongly contested speaks to increasingly engaged members who recognize the potential of IFEM.

A survey of IFEM members and stakeholders was conducted in late 2021, in four languages, and widely distributed through IFEM's communication channels. Respondents from 56 countries, comprising 40% HIC and 60% LMIC from all regions of the world, provided an assessment of how IFEM

understood their challenges and was addressing its remit. Encouragingly, IFEM had improved in leading collaboration and networking necessary to establish universal equality in service and care, promoting the creation and growth of the specialty of emergency medicine in every country, promoting at an international level, interchange, understanding and co-operation among physicians practicing emergency medicine and being recognized as the international voice for quality emergency medical care. There was more effort required in advancing the growth of highquality emergency medical care through education and standards and increasing our understanding of challenges specific to emergency care in LMIC. Having said that, respondents from LMIC felt that IFEM enabled them to perform better in their roles, and overall, IFEM is viewed more favorably in the 2021 findings compared to 2019. The results of the survey and the many suggestions from respondents are being used by IFEM's leadership and many groups to inform activities for the coming year.

During the past year an assessment of the Board performance and capacity was done as part of ongoing governance review and improvement, and development of better financial sustainability. A need to further develop capacity and enablers including office capability; partnerships; financial strategy; brand; communications; and relationships was identified not unexpectedly, and work in these areas continues.

IFEM has increased advocacy activities during the past year, with ongoing advocacy in support of the safety of the healthcare workforce and healthcare facilities in regions of conflict, and specifically in support of our colleagues in Myanmar and Ukraine, with a joint statement being published in the Lancet. Increasing engagement with members through new member initiatives, online events and joint advocacy initiatives has also been a focus. This year, rapid innovation and the first wholly virtual ICEM took place, with thanks to our hosts at ESEM, and in a couple of weeks I hope to see you in Melbourne or virtually at the first hybrid ICEM in Melbourne with our hosts at ACEM. IFEM's partnership with the WHO is continuing to develop and strengthen and I was pleased to be able to attend the WHO Academy in April with members of the WHO IFEM Taskforce.

The amount and breadth of work produced by all who work within IFEM, is evident in reading this Annual Report. I thank everyone who contributes so much to IFEM and the improvement of global emergency care. I'd like to thank the volunteers who support us from outside the world of emergency care as your commitment and support to our work is invaluable.

This is my last report as President, it has been an incredible experience, and I thank you all for your support during the past 2 years.

As I try to reflect on some of the positives that the pandemic has brought, easy access to meetings over the internet has brought us together without the money and time needed to travel. We are willing to join in at antisocial times of the day (after all, we do that for a living). Our online events schedule has continued, and the ease with which we all now navigate the software means that we have been able to offer education at very low cost to all countries. In the last year we delivered four "Around The World" events. Our IFEM membership survey tells us that you want more online education. We achieved > 1,500 registrations from 50+ countries. Our speakers included worldclass experts, learner feedback from each event was extremely positive and I certainly learned a lot.

Our new Events Taskforce chaired by Dr Janet Lin, is planning many more events. Stay tuned for new dates later this year.

In other news, I am delighted to announce a new mentorship program for IFEM. I am grateful to InPD (a UK-based company) who have provided induction sessions free of charge on the value of mentorship for organizations. We are busy making plans for a proper scheme for those joining IFEM groups and projects (on an opt-in basis, of course). In fact we will encourage "reverse mentorship" which will team up people new to IFEM with more experienced people, each learning from the other in a supportive relationship.

I was personally very excited to see Australian travel restrictions open up two months ago and I can't wait to meet some of you at ICEM 2022 in Melbourne. It will be nice to meet away from a computer screen and to talk, free of an agenda. The conference promises to be a fantastically rich program, both scientific and social. For those of us fortunate enough to travel - see you there!

Vice President's Report

DOES THE WORLD NEED IFEM?

The past years have been the worst of times, but perhaps they will also prove to have been the best of times. The last several years have been some of the worst in our lives - as physicians, as care-givers, as team-mates, as family members, and perhaps as human beings - but perhaps they will prove to be a turning point as well. Perhaps these past years have shined a giant spotlight on our emergency care system, on the whole health care system, and on our society in general, and have revealed its true, sorry, dilapidated, anemic condition. Emergency care systems are the caring, cupped hands catching and caressing all of our comrades and colleagues, and all of their critical conditions that have fallen through the cracks of our healthcare system, through the cracks of our economic and political system, and through the cracks in our medical, existential and spiritual philosophies. Emergency care systems exist for people who need help—who need help now, who needed help in the past, and who need help in the future – and who are not being helped by the existing system with all its cracks, gaps and inadequacies. Perhaps these past years will finally show everyone outside of the emergency care system what we have known all along--that people all over the world need help now - right now - and that we need to establish, build, support and develop a way to provide that help now - right now. Perhaps these past years will show everyone that emergency care systems are needed in every city, in every country, on every continent around the world. Perhaps these last several years will be the bottom from which we will rebound - upward, stronger, wiser and better. This is the role that emergency care systems provide, and this is the reason that the world needs the IFEM.

The International Federation for Emergency Medicine is now entering its 4th decade, and remains dedicated to creating a world where all people, in all countries, have access to high quality emergency medical care. I am proud to have spent over 20 years working with IFEM, with my colleagues old and new, with my friends old and young, in countries rich and poor, and in all the many and magnificent ways that we as a global community have learned about building and strengthening emergency care systems, one after the other after the other. The role of the regional representative is to facilitate a two-way exchange of information between the region which they represent at IFEM. Opportunities for collaboration and information-sharing should be proactively sought.

Unfortunately, the world has still been under the threat of COVID-19 during the past year. The physical exchange activity and bilateral cooperation work was limited as many conferences and symposiums were canceled or held virtually. However, as the Asia Regional Representative, I strive to maintain a good relationship with other Asian countries and stay in touch with them from time to time.

Since 2018, the Emergency Medicine Residents Forum has been held during the Annual Conference in Taiwan and Hong Kong alternatively. The exchange forum is intended for residents to share their expertise, exchange experience, and build up a network. Last year, we invited emergency physicians from Singapore to join us for the first time. The topic was chosen via a poll on social media. The presenters introduced the importance and challenges of the topic in their countries, followed by a panel discussion led by chairs from the participating countries. Singapore, Hong Kong, and Taiwan share similar and also unique geographic and cultural features, the various viewpoints greatly inspired and widened our horizons of emergency medicine. It would be great to invite more Asian countries and IFEM member societies to join gradually in the future. Relationships between people of different generations and countries can mean that information is shared both ways.

There were other virtual academic and exchange activities undergoing among Asian countries during the past year as well, either organized by ASEM (Asian Society for Emergency Medicine) or jointly organized by Hong Kong College of Emergency Medicine (HKCEM), the Asian Association for Emergency Medical Services (AAEMS), Hong Kong Society for Emergency Medicine & Surgery (HKSEMS), the Society for Emergency Medicine in Singapore (SEMS), Asia Pacific Association for Medical Toxicology (APAMT), and Taiwan Society of Emergency Medicine (TSEM). I look forward to building more connections with countries in Western Asia next year and continuously acting as a bridge between IFEM and Asia countries to promote the goals of IFEM.



Board Regional Representative - Europe

The past year has been tumultuous in so many ways in Europe. Emergency physicians have been at the forefront of continuing to battle against the COVID-19 pandemic and that tide is steadily turning thanks to the excellence of vaccination programmes. What must not be forgotten, is the continuing inequality of access to vaccines in Low and Middle Income Countries and the work that must be done to correct that.

Of greater concern to us more recently has been the appalling war in Ukraine, the largest conflict in Europe since World War II. We have all been in awe of the bravery of the Ukrainian people in fighting against such awful Russian aggression. The targeted attack on a large number of health care facilities in particular as well as the emerging evidence of war crimes has been met with widespread condemnation.

I was really pleased to see the letter in the Lancet by our President Professor Sally McCarthy and international colleagues expressing our solidarity in this regard. Along with colleagues in EuSEM we continue to find ways to help support Ukrainian healthcare workers and pray for a rapid end to the conflict.

The past year has also seen some great achievements in Europe. I was delighted to represent IFEM by attending and participating in the first face to face EuSEM Congress in October 2021 in Lisbon since the pandemic began. It was a great success and our hosts put on a fantastic show with almost 1,700 delegates - no mean feat at that time! During that time I and our President Elect Dr Ffion Davies also met with the Executive members of EuSEM to discuss ongoing relationships between IFEM and EuSEM.

I was also very pleased to lead a one day Leadership Workshop at the Congress with an international faculty which continues a tradition that has been going for over 5 years. Based upon that success, I have been negotiating with EuSEM to help produce a more comprehensive blended leadership programme for the next Congress in Berlin later this year. Whilst I had hoped we might engineer a joint approach this is not now feasible but I very much hope that we will find a way to collaborate on this in the future with IFEM.

Finally, as you will know this is the end of my second term as the Board Chair for Europe and I will be stepping down in June 2022. Some of you will also know that I have been working with various colleagues in South Asia over the past decade to better support emergency care development. To this end, we have recently formed the South Asian Collaborative for Emergency Medicine (SACEM) and I am privileged to have been asked to Chair that group. SACEM has received strong support and endorsement from the Asian Society for EM (ASEM) and a paper will be coming to the IFEM Board to seek the same from IFEM. We as SACEM look forward to working closely with and for ASEM and IFEM in order to improve emergency healthcare for South Asia – home to 1 in 5 people on the planet!

So, to end, I wanted to thank the IFEM Assembly for the opportunity to serve on the Board over the past 4 years. It has been a huge honor and I have learnt so much in the role. Much more perhaps than I have been able to give back. I have no doubt we will continue to work together in different ways in what is the very best job in the world helping to improve emergency care on our all too fragile planet!

Board Regional Representative - Africa

The past year has been interesting for the African continent as COVID-19 pandemic has brought to the fore front the relevance of quality emergency care in our health systems. This spotlight has optimised by the formulation of a collaborative partnership between AFEM and WHO Africa region to strengthen COVID pandemic response activities by magnifying the role out of the WHO Basic Emergency Care (BEC) Course on the African Continent. To date the initiative has produced 44 BEC providers, 35 provisional facilitators and 14 registered facilitators in 6 countries (Gambia, Sierra Leone, Liberia, Nigeria, Ghana, and Kenya).

Our ability to influence emergency care standards in the Francophone and Portuguese speaking countries has improved as the relevant working groups continue to translate AFEM handbook and Rapid Assessment Protocols. The AFEM curriculum and presentation bank will also be translated.

As Emergency Medicine becomes more recognised on our continent, engagement of trainees in the African Emergency Care system is important. The Doctors in Emergency Medicine and Leadership Training in Africa (DELTA) chapter remains active since its establishment in April 2015. It provides a platform for EM specialty trainees to improve their training, support emergency care development contextually and build lifelong partnerships with colleagues on the continent. Currently the chapter includes trainees in residency programs from Egypt, Ethiopia, Ghana Malawi, Mozambique, Rwanda, Uganda, and Sudan. Other participants have been from DRC, Chad, Angola, Somalia and Mali.

It has been a delight to witness the strong buy in from medical student on 11th November 2021 at AfCEM2020 result in the formation of the AFEM student council led by a vibrant leadership team – Mohamed Hussein from Egypt, Adebisi Adeyeye from Nigeria and Jonathan Kajjimu from Uganda – in a defined organizational structure (figure 1). The purpose of the council is to bridge the gap that exists in the realm of student support or advice and exposure to emergency medicine. They are active on social media pages – facebook (@ studentcouncilafem) and twitter (@student_afem). Their goals are to:

- Expose African Medical Students to the concept of Emergency Medicine correctly as early as possible in their training and career
- 2. Cultivate emerging leadership potential
- Create a network and community of likeminded and EM passion driven students
- 4. Empower youth leaders to contribute to collaborative development efforts

Current activities have been

- Delivery of virtual EM educational sessions with local and external faculty
- Speaking at EM student events:
 - African perspective shared on the International Emergency Medicine project
 - Participation in 2021 Congress for the national society of EM in Brazil.
- Writing about student involvement in EM training on the African Continent. Blog has been published on iEM platform; Research articles published in SAEM and AfJEM.

The African Journal of Emergency Medicine (AfJEM) received its first impact factor as 1.37 in June 2021- joining 32 of the 90 globally registered Emergency Medicine journals. An appreciative salutation is extended to the editorial team. The journal continues to provide a platform for African researchers and collaborators to showcase their work while providing relevant educational material to its readership.

The 6th AfCEM is scheduled for 16th to 18th November 2022 in Accra Ghana. The theme is "The role of Emergency Medicine in achieving universal health care: Research, Education and Clinical Care". Call for abstracts deadline is 30th June 2022 will be extended based on numbers received. More details on website: https://www.afcem2022.org





CLINICAL PRACTICE COMMITTEE

The role of the Clinical Practice Committee (CPC) is to work with the other committees of the board to develop and provide educational and teaching material about clinical areas of practice in emergency medicine to the international community. It develops and distributes guidance, position statements, educational resources, and standards documents for provision of care in the clinical areas of paediatric, geriatric, and psychiatric care; trauma and critical care; disaster medicine and public health; and ultrasound use in the emergency department. These range from mission statements, to benchmarking documents, curricula for specialist areas of practice, internationally accepted standards of care, fellowship opportunities and systematic literature reviews.

Smart Objective

To ensure Special Interest Groups (SIGs) are active and engaged in IFEM goals

Performance in 2021-22

Most SIGs have remained remarkably active through the year with good engagement with their own membership. Board reviews of the Trauma, Critical Care, and Geriatric EM SIGs demonstrated productivity and commitment to IFEM goals. After formal Board review, the Triage and Public Health SIGs were disbanded due to inactivity.

To promote and coordinate contributions by all SIGs to annual ICEM planning.

Involvement with the ICEM 2022 Local Organizing Committee was strong and productive. Most of the seven SIGs have contributed to the conference programme with pre-conference courses organized by each of the Ultrasound, Pediatrics, Critical Care, Geriatric EM, and Disaster Medicine SIGs. There have been opportunities for different SIGs to work together especially in the preparation for both the live and virtual educational marketplaces.

CLINICAL PRACTICE COMMITTEE CONTINUED

Smart Objective

To contribute to web-based educational events as a dissemination and marketing strategy for IFEM.

To enhance connections between the SIGs and between the Clinical Practice Committee and the other committees.

To create more content for the SIG web pages on the IFEM website and to contribute content on a regular basis to the IFEM newsletter.

Performance in 2021-22

Members of the SIGs have contributed as organizers and presenters in several of the IFEM Virtual Learning Events. Plans are underway for several SIGs to prepare smaller events for more focused audiences in the next year – Ultrasound, Critical Care, Paediatric and Geriatric EM.

This has predominantly occurred between SIGs working together on ICEM presentations, for example Ultrasound in Paediatric EM or Geriatric Trauma; and a presentation on delirium for one of the virtual learning events.

Website content continues to grow and will be enhanced and facilitated by the upgrade of the IFEM website.

- Guidelines and criteria for review of content shared or developed by industry are underway for CPD certificate granting.
- c. The possibility of developing a process to grant international credits for IFEM events and conferences is being actively explored. We may be unable to meet the stringent requirements for some member countries and have these attainable in all sites for ICEM conferences. Should this prove to be the case, we may elect to certify only the electronic events provided by IFEM.

Pre or post conference events

The CPD committee is working to develop pre or post conference events. These events will include "bucket-list" type locations and activities and include CPD in either an area of focus at the cutting edge in EM globally or broader topics such as research, education, leadership or diversity, equity, and inclusion.

CORE CURRICULUM AND EDUCATION COMMITTEE

Following the challenges posed by the pandemic and faced by our committee members in 2020, 2021 proved to be another year full of ups and downs for all our members. Our members representing all six IFEM regions continued to work on several projects as part of IFEM's vision to create value, enhance diversity and improve communications with its members:

- 1. The work on the IFEM accreditation framework is led by Dr Andrew Singer. Revisions to the final draft of the accreditation framework is complete, and it is anticipated that a final manuscript will be presented to the Board for approval by September 2022.
- 2. The revision of the IFEM undergraduate medical education curriculum is being led by Drs Alper Cevik and Elif Cakal with support from the UME Curriculum Task Force. The Delphi consensus process to identify essential curricular outcomes entered its final stages in April 2022. It is anticipated that the final curriculum will be presented to the Board for approval by November 2022.
- 3. Work has commenced on several new projects including revision of the IFEM GME curriculum using Entrustable Professional Activities to define the outcomes of training for specialists in Emergency Medicine (led by Dr David Teng), creation of leadership development courses aimed at EM leaders at different stages of their careers (led by Drs Bret Nicks, Janis Tupesis and Janet Lin) and medical education primers for resource limited settings (led by Dr Abraham Wai).
- 4. Production of a series of virtual "Emergency Medicine Perspectives of Students Around the World" sessions, aimed to better understand the emergency medicine experiences and educational needs of medical students. This well attended series was co-produced by students from all IFEM regions and the International Emergency Medicine Education Project (iEM) team led by Drs Elif Cakal, Alper Cevik and James Kwan.
- 5. Organization of a pre-conference Medical Student Summit (led by Drs Elif Cakal, Erin Simon) with representation from students from all IFEM regions, Global Emergency Medicine Education session (led by Drs James Kwan and Alper Cevik) and IFEM Research Primer Meet the Authors session (led by Dr Erin Simon) in collaboration with IFEM Research Committee at ICEM 2022.

This year, we have welcomed new membership to the Committee. The review continues, with recent revisions to the Bylaws. At the request of the Board, a proposal to improve diversity amongst the leadership was developed with advice on the creation of Vice Chair positions for every standing Committee, Special Interest Group and Taskforce, and their future eligibility for other leadership positions within IFEM. There has also been the development of revised and additional positions on the Board. There has also been supervision for the election of a new Board.

Ongoing work will include revised governance arrangements, such as the creation of an Advisory Board, and further review of the Constitution and Bylaws. The Committee looks forward to another year of working with the IFEM Board, Assembly, Standing Committees and SIGs.

Role of the Research Committee:

- Consider the merit of research proposals and collaborations that are submitted to IFEM for endorsement.
- Explore and potentially develop global research collaborations to further emergency care internationally.
- Act as a resource for IFEM to develop a research agenda and assist in prioritization of research internationally.
- Act as a resource of research training and scholarship for the international research community.

The Research Committee has greatly expanded and has representation that better reflects the diversity of our global Emergency Medicine Community. The main focus has been on developing teaching modules to provide early career researchers with an introduction to key topics from senior faculty. This builds on the Research Primers published in the African Journal of Emergency Medicine. These topics will also be published through the IFEM website and added to our library of resources for researchers. We have developed a suite of materials and identified an expert faculty to deliver a research workshop at ICEM 2022 and have updated the Policies and Guidelines governed by the Research Committee.

Smart Objective

Develop a suite of introductory research topics available to early career researchers.

Performance 2021/22

Suitable topics for early career researchers were identified by the Committee. Individual members have prepared materials that are incorporated into a suite of videos. These videos have gone through post production and will be uploaded to the Research Committee Resource library.

The initial selection of topics was based on utility and availability of faculty. Further topics may be added once an assessment of the initial offerings has been undertaken.

RESEARCH COMMITTEE CONTINUED

Smart Objective

Performance 2021/22

Deliver a Research Workshop at ICEM 2022.

Key materials have been developed and faculty provided. This Workshop had been planned as a face-to-face or hybrid workshop. But due to resource limitations will now be provided as only a virtual workshop.

The Specialty Implementation Committee (SIC) aims to fulfill the broad goals of IFEM, which are 'to promote access to, and lead the development of, the highest quality of emergency medical care for all people. The general purpose of the SIC is to assist countries in which emergency medicine is developing towards specialty status. The specific objectives of the committee are:

- To develop reference materials relevant and a list of appropriate consultants to help develop the speciality of emergency medicine in countries where the speciality is yet to mature.
- To be responsible for drafting responses to specific requests by physicians for speciality development assistance.

This year the SIC welcomed new members that are the most diverse group to date. We will present a panel on various challenges and lessons learned in creating Sustainable Working Conditions for EM at ICEM 2022 in Melbourne. The SIC has also successfully launched the new Trainees SIG, chaired by Dr Keihan Golshani. The Trainees SIG is currently seeking additional members including trainees and those interested in education of EM trainees across the globe. Finally, the SIC hosted new member webinars to introduce IFEM resources and worked with the IFEM Secretariat and IFEM leadership to update monitoring and evaluation documents for SIGs and Taskforces.

SPECIALTY IMPLEMENTATION COMMITTEE CONTINUED

Smart Objective

To educate and inform stakeholders on best practice emergency care provision with practical implementation strategy for advocacy for the specialty.

Performance 2021/22

- Development and delivery of IFEM New Member Orientation webinars and information series.
- Advocacy literature review commenced for our planned advocacy primer, but tabled due to COVID19 obligations.
- 3. Planned to present advocacy topics in ICEM and other international conferences, however these topics were not selected at ICEM 2022.
- 4. Short course team to be established late 2022, together with timeline and deliverables in preparation for creating an advocacy short course that can be used as free/for profit satellite sessions at ICEM conferences.

To Develop a Trainee Special Interest Group or other mechanism of ongoing EM Trainee engagement with the SIC, and with IFEM.

To create SIC linkages with other IFEM groups to align efforts for shared objectives.

Proposal approved and Trainee SIG established. The SIG is focused on growing its membership and planning for its first education event, as well as working on networking with other SIGs and committees to establish shared objectives and products.

A sustainable working conditions checklist has been developed and piloted. The checklist forms the basis of a SIC IFEM member survey of current working conditions and challenges in developed and developing EM systems. Regional reviews have occurred. The survey findings will be presented at ICEM 2023.

The SIC will continue to engage with SIGs to discover common goals and identify strategies to work together where appropriate, including virtual event collaboration.

BEHAVIOURAL EMERGENCIES SPECIAL INTEREST GROUP

The Behavioral Emergencies Special Interest Group (BESIG) is an international collaboration of people interested in promoting the high-quality care of people requiring emergency care who have a behavioral emergency or co-morbidity.

Role of the Critical Care in Emergency Medicine Special Interest Group:

The aim of the Critical Care in Emergency Medicine Special Interest Group is to examine and enhance the continuum of care from the recognition of critical illness to management and stabilization throughout the health care system. To achieve that aim, we bring together physicians interested in the development and improvement of care for the critically ill in both resource-rich and resource-poor settings.

Objectives of the group:

- To provide a forum for networking among clinicians, educators, and researchers interested in further development of the intersection between Critical Care and Emergency Medicine.
- To partner together to contribute to improving care for the critically ill in health care systems, especially in low resource settings, in order to improve the chain of survival.
- To collaborate to help identify the greatest barriers to creation or improvement of critical care emergency medicine around the world.
- To contribute to globally accessible critical care emergency medicine education that is open access and easily available in hard-to-reach places.
- To promote and collaborate research amongst individuals with interests in critical care emergency medicine and global health care development.

Group achievements

- 1. Our collaborative work "White Paper on Early Critical Care Services in Low Resource Settings" was published in Annals of Global Health in November 2021.
- Protocol for the ongoing systematic review "Critical care service delivery across healthcare systems in low-income and low-middle-income countries" was published on BMJ Open in August 2021.
- 3. We continue to hold quarterly meetings which feature guest speakers from our group discussing topics such as essential emergency and critical care, COVID-19 patient care in African ICUs, and infectious disease case discussion in Ethiopia. Sessions for connection and discussion are included in each meeting.
- 4. We have planned talk sessions at SAEM 2022. We will also contribute to panel discussions and multiple virtual Marketplace stalls for focused topics at ICEM 2022.

Determine the percentages of women invited speakers and members of the organizing committee at ICEM.

ICEM guidelines were updated in April 2019 to require that the local organizing committee "should ensure that there is diversity of speakers, track chairs and conference organizers with no fewer than 40% from either gender."

At the last three, pre-pandemic ICEMs (Cape Town, Mexico City, and Seoul), women comprised 25% (range 8-42.9%) of organizing committees, 31% (range 30-33.3%) of plenary speakers, and 20.3% (range 18.8-21.6%) of invited speakers. This data was presented at ICEM 2021 in Dubai by Gayle Galletta.

ICEM 21 and 22 will be analyzed and compared to data before the guideline was updated.

Develop papers, reports and publications which highlight the GSISIG and serve as reference and recommendations.

The GSISIG's first white paper has been written and forwarded to the IFEM Board for approval in advance of ICEM 22. Once approved, we will submit the white paper for publication and create a one page policy statement.

In many countries, on all continents, older people are the fastest growing demographic segment in the population. In all countries older patients are among the most complex, most vulnerable, and most resource-intensive of all emergency department patients. There is a growing awareness that care of older emergency department patients represents an identifiable sub-specialty within the practice of emergency medicine. GEMSIG brings together clinicians, researchers, and educators who have a specific focus on improving care of older emergency department patients.

The Group promotes Geriatric Emergency Medicine through:

- Sharing best practices by identifying, developing and disseminating guidelines and standards pertaining to Geriatric Emergency Medicine.
- Developing globally relevant education and training opportunities.
- Promoting research in Geriatric Emergency Medicine.
- Supporting service development in Geriatric Emergency Medicine globally (including in the developing world).
- Advocating for older people and their requirements from the Emergency Services.

The last 12 months has been a monumental year once more for older people around the globe, with the COVID-19 pandemic continuing. Its impact on older people and the wider community will not be clearly understood for many years to come, increased mortality and morbidity, increased isolation and social dislocation, dying separated from family and friends. In many ways, this has helped GEMSIG to focus on the unique needs of this vulnerable population as many of us see the impact in our clinical work as well as at home and in the community.

GERIATRIC EMERGENCY MEDICINE SPECIAL INTEREST GROUP CONTINUED

GEMSIG now has over 145 members, representing all regions of the globe. We have introduced regional chairs into our executive which is helping us have a closer understanding of advances in GEM as well as provide support that is unique to each region. Both Singapore and Malaysia have now both formed GEM committees with increased recognition of the needs of older people in Emergency Departments.

ICEM 2022 planning is well underway with an all day virtual workshop on geriatric trauma with support from some of our other IFEM SIG committees as well as other clinicians with expertise in geriatric trauma. Along with a track and the marketplace, we are looking forward to seeing some of our international colleagues face to face in Melbourne.

Our newsletter is gaining momentum, and has been a great vehicle to hear about new models of care that we can all adapt in our own countries and settings.

An increased number of IFEM member organizations have Geriatric EM SIGs or Clinical Practice Committees. We used current membership from each of the regions (NA, Latin America and Caribbean, Europe, Africa, Asia, Australia/NZ) to build out to other countries. Currently we have a list of 14 country organizations that have GEM SIGs. We plan to measure this every two years. This year GEMSIG reached 145 members from 38 countries. This will be achieved through representation at national level organizations of speakers and presenters and collaborators in research or education projects, plus the development of webinars on core topics within Geri EM practice and strategies for developing Geri Eds

- @EMGeriPearls is a new twitter account hosted by GEM organizations around the world. It has 1300 followers with lots of interesting and accessible education resources.
- The European Taskforce on GEM has produced 8 posters with clinical recommendations on important GEM topics and published them in European Geriatric Medicine

The objective of the Informatics Special Interest Group is to advance the education and development of informatics in the field of emergency medicine. In high-income countries, this takes the form of involving EM physicians in the design and development of Electronic Medical Records (EMR) to improve usability and efficiency, development and use of datasets for quality improvement and research, and new applications of computing to improve EM care. In middle- and lower-income countries this involves the development and implementation of innovative, cost effective, and culturally appropriate solutions to improve EM care. This SIG is in its growth phase, and we are actively recruiting members from all representative IFEM members.

In the last 12 months, the informatics SIG presented one session at ICEM 2021. We are due to present a session at ICEM 2022 as well as a session in the virtual marketplace.

Role of the New and Advanced Technologies Special Interest Group:

The New and Advanced Technologies Special Interest Group (NATSIG) is designed to become a panel of Emergency Physicians providing insight on new technology in Emergency Medicine to IFEM. It aims to harness global experience in various technologies to achieve cost effective improvements in patient care and reduce the duplication and inefficiencies of providing that care by harnessing technology.

Over the past 12 months NATSIG has developed the following projects:

VITA PROJECT (VISIONARY INDUSTRY TECHNOLOGY AWARD PROJECT)

The goal of this project is to have one competition during an Emergency Medicine Conference (Annual ICEM Conference, National EM Conference, or other EM conferences) where companies sign up to win an award for best new technology related to emergency medicine - Visionary Industry Technology Award (VITA) Project. It is one of the ways IFEM hopes to increase its interaction with industry as well as improve emergency medical care globally.

SMART ED GLOBAL NETWORK PROGRAM

This is a new NATSIG project where a single hospital or free-standing ED can join a global network for free to get access to the experts in the field of technology application in emergency medicine and share scientific information with other network members. As a member of the network, individual EDs will have access to the expert counseling on the development of a particular ED within the aspect of technology innovation and smart technology application. This will also allow EDs to share information on how to improve ED technologically in line with IFEM recommendation through the network.


COMPREHENSIVE TECHNOLOGY ASSESSMENT TOOL ON NEW AND ADVANCED TECHNOLOGY

Role of the Paediatric Emergency Medicine Special Interest Group:

The Paediatric Emergency Medicine Special Interest Group (PEMSIG) is an international collaboration of people interested in promoting excellence in paediatric emergency care by providing a forum to share information on a variety of issues in regard to PEM (clinical, educational, practice/management, guidelines, research). Its vision is to create an environment within the international emergency care community that promotes the sharing of information that leads to improved emergency care of children across the globe.

Updated PEMSIG Strategic Objectives

- Provide a forum for networking between individuals with an interest in PEM, including related topics such as models of care, clinical standards, research, and educational support through teaching activities and curricular development.
- To maintain and promote an advisory document for international minimum standards of care for children in emergency departments, across the entire scope of practice and to promote these standards, including guideline documents if appropriate.
- To work collaboratively with other SIG's in order to develop documents to support the expansion of
 paediatric emergency related knowledge across a continuum of emergency medicine care, and by
 doing this, make recommendations to IFEM in regard to how it can support and impact the future of
 paediatric emergency care development and practice globally.

Activities and achievements over the past 12 months

As this is my first annual report as chair, I firstly want to thank Dr Camilo Gutierrez for holding the chair role the past three years. We in PEMSIG congratulate him on his IFEM award last year, and appreciate his ongoing contribution to current PEMSIG activities.

The pandemic and consequent lack of ability to network face to face has proved challenging. However, challenges provide opportunities, and this year has resulted in a restructure of our SIG so that it can better deliver our current and future SMART goals. Our Terms of Reference has been revised and accepted by the IFEM Board and now includes trainees and nurse practitioners into our membership.

PAEDIATRIC EMERGENCY MEDICINE SPECIAL INTEREST GROUP CONTINUED

We have slimmed and trimmed our executive, making it easier for more members to be involved in smaller short term projects, hoping this will lead to better engagement within our refreshed membership (a total of 114 including 14 new members from several countries previously not represented in our SIG).

With the end of travel restrictions in sight, and the ongoing brilliance of video conferencing software, we look forward to a bright future where our global members can connect particularly in Melbourne this year and Amsterdam next year and provide resources and expertise to others wishing to optimize paediatric emergency care in their health systems. We are also looking forward to strengthening other PEM networks, such as the Paediatric Emergency Research Network (PERN), and networks in Europe, Asia, and Latin America.

Role of the Quality and Safety Special Interest Group:

The Quality and Safety Special Interest Group (QSSIG) exists to provide a forum to share information on a variety of issues in regard to Quality Management and Patient Safety and to make recommendations to IFEM regarding the future directions of Quality and Safety in Emergency Medicine.

Functions of the Group:

- Provide a forum for networking and the exchange of information and views between individuals with a particular interest in quality in emergency medicine.
- To foster collaboration between individuals with an interest in quality and safety in emergency medicine with a view to the identification of tools for improving patient safety in emergency departments, as well as support for improving education of staff and standards of practice within the emergency department, for use by IFEM members.
- To promote enhancement of patient safety and quality management amongst emergency physicians.

Objectives of the Group:

- To maintain the currency and relevance of the recently reviewed Quality Framework document.
- To promote the quality framework standards, including guideline documents or a tool kit to assist in a practical approach for the implementation of the framework across a broad spectrum and settings where emergency medicine is practiced.
- To identify outstanding issues of concern in regard to patient safety and quality management in the global emergency medicine community.
- To assimilate useful quality and safety resources for clinical indicators, guidelines and practice change.
- To make recommendations to IFEM in regard to the future of emergency medicine practice with regards to quality and safety.

As we gradually emerge from the COVID-19 crisis and try to "return towards" normal, relying on vaccinations, past illness and the evolution of the virus, the Quality and Safety SIG has been able to focus on its key goal of embedding quality care into emergency medicine settings.

QUALITY AND SAFETY SPECIAL INTEREST GROUP CONTINUED

Discussion has been had of the impact of the virus on work flows, adaptations and general staff and patient safety in the workplace. Audit and quality focused meetings have returned in many settings and a review/refresh of the Quality Framework to representatives' settings, is also being undertaken.

We have held regular virtual meetings and administrative topics including a review of the SIG's Terms of Reference has been undertaken. Many of us are looking forward to meeting face to face for the first time in Melbourne in June.

While our ability to support ICEM 2021 was disappointingly limited in spite of the SIG's willingness to partake, I am pleased that for ICEM 2022 we will be contributing a pre-conference workshop (3.5 hours) and a concurrent session (90 minutes) with 15 speakers from 9 nations, including emerging emergency settings. The workshop is focussed on helping to teach various aspects of emergency medicine quality activities at both a departmental and individual level and the concurrent session discusses quality activities from four different continents.

After three years as Chair and the kind support of Vice Chair, Dr Saravana Kumar, I will be stepping down as Chair at the Melbourne meeting where I hope to introduce the new leadership team for the SIG. Thank you to those who have actively supported the SIG and who do their best to improve quality and safety in emergency settings.

Smart Objective

Performance in 2021/22

Run a session and/or workshop at each ICEM meeting.

For ICEM 2022, the SIG will be running a 3.5 hour workshop and 90 minute concurrent session with 15 speakers from 9 nations, including emerging emergency settings. The workshop is focused on helping to teach various aspects of emergency medicine quality activities at both a departmental and individual level and includes several small group breakout periods and the concurrent session discusses quality activities from four different continents. This will be an ongoing aim for the SIG as well as potentially contributing in other forums.

Exchange of ideas and the promotion of quality improvement and transformation in departments at all stages of development of emergency medicine settings.

Regular meetings of interested people who can promote and share information about activities in their environment and can offer advice as to how to promote and adapt similar projects in other settings.

Further development of the toolkit which needs to be pertinent to all levels of emergency medicine settings.

The toolkit has been used. For example in India, the Society for Emergency Medicine adapted points from the IFEM framework for its Accreditation Standards (Quality Accreditation Institute India) and Australasia has recently reviewed its Australasian College for Emergency Medicine Quality framework. Hopefully other nations will reference the Framework document in the development of their Quality Standards and reviews.

TRAUMA SPECIAL INTEREST GROUP

According to the WHO report published in 2021 on injuries and violence, unintentional and violence-related injury results in the deaths of 4.4 million people around the world each year and constitute nearly 8% of all deaths. About 90% of injury-related deaths occur in low- and middle-income countries.

Over 1 million deaths per year are due to road traffic crashes and tens of millions more people suffer non-fatal injuries each year which lead to emergency department attendance and hospitalizations.

Across the world, death rates due to injury are disproportionately higher in low-income countries than in high-income countries. There has also been an increase in the amount of armed conflict in low-income countries which has resulted in the deaths and serious injuries in many adults and children. These countries have the least amount of trained staff and resources to manage these injuries.

The IFEM Trauma SIG has contributed to education sessions in trauma care in partnership with WHO for doctors in zones of conflict in the Eastern Mediterranean region via the WHO Trauma Operational and Advisory Team (TOpAT) and the feedback has been very positive. The TSIG was also part of a group of trauma clinicians who facilitated the provision of trauma educational material to Ukrainian doctors in the recent conflict zone with Russia.

The Trauma SIG also contributed to concurrent Trauma related sessions at the ICEM 2021 Virtual meeting in Dubai and will also contribute two concurrent sessions in the upcoming ICEM 2022 in Melbourne. We welcome our new members from Turkey and India and we look forward to the diversity of experience they bring to the group and we are confident they will add to the ability of the TSIG to continue its global educational and advocacy role for trauma care.

EVENTS TASKFORCE

Since formalizing the Events Taskforce, we have convened a representative group divided into four key sub-work groups to further define and determine structure and feasibility of a Virtual Learning Series as part of the educational portfolio of IFEM. These four groups comprise: 1) operational 2) finance, 3) marketing, and 4) analysis. We have completed 7 IFEM Virtual Learning Series Events in 2021-2022. We have solidified the structure for "Around the World" events which highlight key emergency conditions and concepts with an intent to provide a comparative perspective of practice and situational considerations around the world. These have been well received. We are working to create shorter education offerings in response to expressed needs and requests of membership and continue to deliberate on how to sustain and add value for the hosting of these types of events. To that end, we are piloting an around the world event and considering a proposal for a future model to ensure strategic marketing, reach, and relevance with The Association Specialists (TAS), an association management company.

Objectives of the Portuguese Translation Taskforce:

- Translate IFEM resources, newsletters and website into Portuguese and facilitate dissemination of the translated materials to emergency medicine educators and providers in Portuguese-speaking countries.
- Translate the World Health Organization (WHO) Emergency Care Toolkit into Portuguese and facilitate dissemination of the translated materials to emergency medicine educators and providers in Portuguese-speaking countries.
- Support WHO or IFEM member emergency care trainings in Portuguese speaking countries, including COVID-19 trainings.
- Support WHO or IFEM led health system planning exercises in Portuguese speaking countries, such as the Emergency Care System Assessment.
- Cultivate a collaborative community of IFEM members dedicated to advancing emergency care in Portuguese-speaking countries.

The creation of the Portuguese Translation Task Force (PTTF) reflects IFEM's recognition of the importance of providing the information and resources that the Board, Committees, Taskforces and Special Interest Groups develop in Portuguese, to ensure effective communication and increased engagement and participation with Portuguese speaking countries and professional societies.

The PTTF has remained active during the global pandemic, recruiting new members, expanding capacity to translate IFEM materials, and continuing to support the World Health Organization's efforts to develop emergency care by translating key tools and providing ongoing support to implementation efforts. One recent example is the PTTF's review of the Interagency Integrated Triage Tool and the open-access course "Clinical Management of COVID-19: Initial approach to the acutely ill patient." This coming year, PTTF has invited IFEM leadership to attend an important national conference in Brazil, to increase participation and the knowledge of IFEM amongst Portuguese speaking emergency specialists.
