SF 558 agreement proposes to appropriates a total of \$43,544,227 from the General Fund and 1,593.95 FTEs to the Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship (IDALS), the Department of Natural Resources (DNR); and select areas in Board of Regents for Fiscal Year 2022 (FY 2022). This is an increase of \$1.6-million above the estimated FY 2023.

The major changes to the bill are:

### **IDALS General Fund Changes--**

- An increase of general fund appropriation for IDALS administration of \$250,00 above FY 2023 for an estimated 2+ FTEs additional meat and poultry and motor fuel pump inspectors.
- An increase of \$250,000 for IDALS Foreign Animal Disease (FAD) program operation for a total of \$1-million general fund amount.
- A new general fund line item of \$250,000 for FAD euthanasia equipment
- A new general fund line item of \$250,000 for FAD vaccine development assistance (to an lowa company that develop livestock and animal vaccines).
- A new \$750,000 appropriation to the Iowa Dairy Innovation fund contingent on enactment of HF 700 (or its successor or Senate companion) that creates both the Diary Innovation fund and Dairy Innovation program.
- An increase general fund line for Agricultural Education from \$25,000 to \$75,000.
- The South Iowa Development and Conservation appropriation is reduced from \$250,000 to \$150,000.

### **Regents General Fund Changes--**

- An increase general fund line for Farmers with Disabilities from \$180,000 to \$230,000.
- An increase of 21,000 to the lowa Livestock Health Advisory Committee (from \$170,390 to \$191,390)

### Session Law/Miscellaneous Provisions—

- Provides nonreversion language to unspent FY-2023 IDALS Value Added Grant program to allow the moneys to spent per IDALS plan over 18-month period.
- Reallocate \$120,000 from the Iowa Nutrient Management Fund to ISU Veterinary Diagnostic laboratory operations.
- Allows the use of \$1-million of unencumbered REAP open space funds for state park maintenance, repairs, operations or development.

# **Code Changes--**

- Amends Section 455E.11, subsection 2, paragraph a, Code 2023, to require at least \$500,000 or one-third, whichever is higher of the 35% of Ag Groundwater Fund Allocation (on average \$1.5 to \$1.8-million) for the Iowa Nutrient Research Center (INRC) to be deposited into the water quality initiative fund for purposes of supporting water quality practices.
- Amends Section 455B.145, subsection 1, paragraph a, Code 2023, to strike the words-'or more strict' from that sentence in regards to the air quality standards that local entities may enforce through their DNR delegated authority to administer clean air regulations and programs.
- Strikes Section 466B.47, subsection 4, Code 2023 that directs INRC to facilitate collaboration with other Board of Regent Institution's institutes, centers or departments.
- Strikes Section 465A.1, subsection 2, paragraph b, Code 2023, that is an out-of-date 1987 legislated goal of 10% of lowal and area to be state open space by calendar year 2000.

# Status Quo Funding Provisions:

### **DNR Funding—**

(no changes)

A status quo budget at last year cumulative general fund appropriation levels (\$14,932,293) for DNR
operations, DNR Floodplains, DNR Forest health, and DNR State Parks special appropriations. There is a

reduction of \$173,768 compared to FY 2023 to DNR Administration/Operations due to restructuring the Office of the Chief Information Officer's (OCIO) Cybersecurity Office from fee-based funding to a General Fund appropriation recommended by the Governor and this line is at the Governor's levels.

### **Environment First Fund Allocations—**

(no changes)

- SF 558 appropriates and allocates \$42-million of Environment First funds to the IDALS, DNR, and the Iowa Geological Survey at the State University of Iowa.
- This is the same amount and the same allocations as in FY 2023, and at the Governors recommendation.
- All internal allocations are the same as in FY 2021, FY 2022, and FY 2023 and at the Governor's levels.

### Fish & Game Protection Fund Appropriations—

(no changes)

- The SF 558 appropriates \$48, 397,337 to the Fisheries and Wildlife Bureaus of DNR from the Fish and Game Protection Fund;
- This is the same amount and the same allocations as in FY 2023 and at the Governors level.

#### **Groundwater Protection Fund—**

(no changes)

- SF 558 appropriates ~\$3.5 million from the Groundwater Protection Fund to DNR:
- This is no change compared to FY 2023 and at the Governor's recommended funding level.

- a within line-item allocation of \$325,000 to the Iowa State University Midwest Grape and Wine Industry which is the same as last year and the Governor's recommendation.
- A new within allocation of \$250,000 for (~2) additional meat/poultry and fuel inspectors.
- This section also specifies up to 397.0-full time equivalents (FTEs) for IDALS operations which is 2 more than current year.

The amount is at the Governor's FY 2024 recommendation.

- The section additionally contains intent language specifying that DNR is to allocate at least 50-FTEs for seasonal park upkeep and sanitary efforts and requires a quarterly report on DNR expenditures that supports the departmental administration, regulation and programs.
- This section also specifies up to 1145.95.-full time equivalents for DNR which is the same as last year, which is the same number of FTEs as enacted last year.

Same amount as the current year and same intent language.

- \$8,325,000 for the Soil Conservation Cost Share Programs. Maintains current level of funding. \*This allocation is split by within-line-item distributions of:

Section 22 appropriates \$2,375,000 of Environment First Funds for the Water Quality Initiative. This is in addition to \$8.2-million in RIIF moneys provided by the RIFF budget bill and the two functions together maintains the current effort. The intent language allows the use of up to 10% of funds from implementation and administration expenses. This is the same amount as FY 2023 and the Governor's level.

- This section includes intent language concerning the use of these funds for watersheds generally and regional watersheds as designated by the Soil Conservation division and high-priority watersheds identified by the Water Resources Coordinating Council. The water quality practices shall be as described in the lowa Nutrient Reduction Strategy and IDALS shall implement demonstration projects which include collaborative participation and for purposes to educate other persons about the feasibility and value of establishing similar practices.
- This section further includes the reference to confidentiality provisions as modified in prior legislation.
   Intent language was modified by SF 510 from 2018 session that allowed 'edge-of-field' practices to be cost-shared at a higher rate than 50%.

### SECTION 24--Reallocates \$1-Million of REAP Open Space Fund Moneys

Section 24 allows DNR to use up to \$1-million of REAP open space allocation for DNR State Park maintenance repairs, development or operation for FY-2024. This language is similar to what was in the last year's appropriation bill.

### SECTION 25-Repeal of Past-Dated Goal of 10% State Open Space by Calendar Year 2000

Section 25 repeals Section 465A.1, subsection 2, paragraph b, Code 2023, that is a 1987 legislated goal of 10% of lowa land area to be state open space by calendar

# **Amendment Analysis**

**H 1336**, by Scheetz, proposed to increase the Environment First Fund appropriation to REAP from \$12-million to \$20-million. Since the amendment didn't address the cap of \$42-million available EFF already allocated to other purposes in this bill, the consequence would have either trigger a Governor item veto, or a proration of appropriated items from the EFF that would have reduced all EFF allocations by 16%. H 1336 **LOST** on a record roll-call vote of 34-aye to 61-nay.

**H 1328** by Rep. Isenhart, proposes to create new Code provisions establishing a 'Driftless Area Development and Conservation Authority' and 'Driftless Area Development and Conservation Fund'. This proposed program would create an authority that involves Allamakee, Clayton, Dubuque, Delaware, Fayette, Jackson and Winneshiek counties to develop and coordinate plans for projects related to natural resources, rural development and infrastructure problems of that area and this entity would administer the related fund to address these purposes and objectives. The fund is to be created in the state treasury and funds appropriated to the authority. The fund could accept state or local moneys and gift, bequests from public and private sources. H 1328 was **WITHDRAWN**.

**H 1335**, by Isenhart, proposes to create session law to direct the Governor, various state agencies (including health and Human Services) to apply for and secure any available federal funds that may be available from the federal inflation reduction act or the federal Infrastructure Investment and Jobs act. The amendment further authorized the Legislative Council to waive any statutory requirement during the legislative interim and required DNR to report to the Governor and General Assembly by June 30, 2023 any statutory changes and nonfederal financial resources that may be needed to access the available federal funding. H 1335 was **RULED NOT GERMANE** to the bill.
