Intent of the General Assembly that the DOJ maintain a record of the estimated time incurred representing each agency or department.

The Office may incur a temporary negative cash balance as long as there are receivables of equal or greater than the balance and the amount appropriated is no exceeded at the close of the fiscal year.

The DOJ may employ the 7 only if the DOJ receives sufficient federal money to maintain the positions. These positions may only be retained if the federal money is available.

The DOJ shall transfer at least \$150,000 from the victim compensation fund to the victim assistance grant program

Moneys appropriated for Victim Assistance Grants that are not spent at the end of the fiscal year, shall not revert to the general fund, but shall remain available for purposes designated until the close of the next fiscal year.

- 3. Each CBC shall provide alternatives to prison. The alternatives shall ensure public safety while providing maximum rehabilitation to the offender.

- 4. Office of drug control policy shall consider federal grants made to the DOC for the benefits of the eight judicial district departments of correctional services as local government grants.
- 5. DOC shall continue to contract with a judicial district department of correctional services to provide for the rental of electronic monitoring equipment, which shall be available state wide.
- 6. The public safety assessment shall not be used in pretrial hearings when determining whether to detain or release a defendant before trial, until the use of the assessment has been specifically authorized by the general assembly.

Section 6- Department of Corrections- Reallocation of Appropriations

The DOC may reallocate money appropriated as necessary to best fulfill the needs of the correctional institutions and the department. Reports must be provided to LSA, and DOM prior to the effective date of the revision or reallocation. Money cannot be appropriated for the purpose of eliminating any program.

Section 7- Intent Reports

Inmate labor may be used beginning July 1, 2023 to restore or preserve rural cemeteries and historical landmarks. Inmate labor may also be used to clean up roads, major water sources and other water sources around the state.

The DOC shall provide a yearly status report regarding private sector employment to LSA.

Section 8- Electronic Monitoring Report

The DOC shall submit a report on electronic monitoring to the general assembly addressing the numbers of people being monitored broken down by offenses committed.

<u>Section 9- State Agency Purchases from Prison Industries</u>

State agencies are encouraged to purchase products from Iowa State Industries. Bids shall be obtained from Iowa State industries for purchases of office furniture exceeding \$5,000.

Section 20- Cost-Compensation and Fees-Indigent Defense- Fees to Attorneys (815.7)

Raises the payment to public defenders for class "A" felonies to \$83 per hour, Class "B" felonies to \$78 per hour and all other cases to \$73 per hour.

This is an increase of \$5 per hour for pubic defenders.

<u>Section 21- Cost- Compensation and Fees- Indigent Defense- Travel Time for Attorney or Guardian Ad</u> <u>Litem (815.7A)</u>

- 1. An attorney, or guardian ad litem who travels outside their county when it is reasonable and necessary to do so to represent an indigent client shall be paid \$35 per hour for travel time (in addition to mileage). Compensation for travel for proceedings, other than a trial or other contested proceeding shall only be paid if the attorney or GAL files a motion for a remote hearing and the motion is denied. This section does not affect any allowable compensation for time spent traveling already compensated under other provisions of law.
- 2. Compensation for travel for an arraignment, pretrial conference, scheduling conference, or any other uncontested or nontestimonial judicial proceeding, when a remote hearing request was denied shall be paid for by the judicial branch.
- 3. County of domicile means the address the attorney or GAL has on file with the office of the state public defender.

Division III

Attorney General- Antitrust Fund- Consumer Education and Litigation Fund

Section 22- Consumer Education and Litigation Fund

Amends the 2021 acts, date change to extend the consumer education and litigation fund annual appropriation from 2023 to 2025.

Section 23- Department of Justice Litigation

Any moneys not appropriated from the antitrust fund or the consumer education and litigation fund are appropriated to the Department of Justice for salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous purposes. This applies to FY23 and FY24

<u>Section 24- Effective Date</u>

Section 23 is effective upon enactment

Section 25- Retroactive Applicability

Section 23 is retroactive

Division IV

Department of Corrections

Section 26- Department of Corrections- Director May Buy and Sell Real Estate- Options

When DOC property is sold, the money from the sale will be placed in a corrections capital reinvestment fund to be used by the DOC.

Money in the fund does not revert

Section 27- Transfer

Money in the general fund from the sale of DOC real estate that is available to the department will be transferred to the corrections capital reinvestment fund on June 30. 2023.

Section 28- Effective Date

This division is effective June 30, 2023

Division V

Iowa Law Enforcement Academy Study

<u>Section 29- Iowa Law Enforcement Academy Interim Study</u>

Creates an interim study for the Iowa Law Enforcement Academy.

The study will- review and evaluate basic training requirements, standards of physical, mental, educational and moral fitness, and consider the need for additional ILEA training schools.

Division VI

Human Trafficking Study

<u>Section 30- Human Trafficking Interim Study Committee</u>

Creates an interim study on human trafficking.

The study will- Identify current initiatives to eliminate human trafficking, identify services available, examine laws in other states focused on minor victims, recommend rehabilitation services for victims, create a procedure for law enforcement to follow with victims, investigate the efficacy of safe harbor laws, and identify funding needs.

Division VII

Directive- Department of Public Safety

<u>Section 31- Department of Public Safety- Peace Officers' Retirement, Accident, and Disability Systems</u>

Requires DPS to pay the peace officers retirement, accident, and disability system sufficient to fund the actuarial costs due to the MVE transfer.

<u>Section 32- Contingent Effective Date</u>

This division takes effect July 1, 2023, if SF 513 is enacted.
