Anabaptist World Sacred Endings, Beginnings

Akron Mennonite Church (AMC), an IPC Partner Congregation and trained green team through our Faithful Green Leaders Training Program, answered the call to care for Creation and transformed four acres of their church's property into a breathtaking nature preserve and memory garden.

AMC congregants, the community, and representatives from five sister congregations all came together to plant 450 trees and meadows of native grasses and flowers. The area will be an outdoor classroom for the Diamond Street Early Childhood Center, which serves more than 150 preschool students and the wider community.

The preserve's green burial is what makes the area truly exceptional as it is a testament to honoring both life and death. The first green burial at AMC made headlines, drawing

attention from Anabaptist World, a global independent journalistic ministry, and sparking wider conversations about the significance of embracing natural cycles of life and death. Green burials and AMC's project also became the subject of our October Learning Lab, which attracted 150 registrants.

Laudato Trees Planting Program Enlists Catholic Properties to Help Increase DC's Canopy

IPC is at the forefront of a collective effort to expand tree coverage in urban Maryland through our Trees for Sacred Places Program. With the dedication of volunteers such as Phil Downey, the lay-led "Laudato Trees" team, and a coalition of other organizations, 18 congregations have added trees to their grounds since the program's inception.

Our commitment goes beyond merely planting trees; it encompasses a comprehensive approach to fostering tree health and vitality. IPC hosted a Learning Lab showcasing experts from the One Water Partnership discussing what it truly takes to ensure a tree's long-term health and well-being. We also offer Action Kits to help green team leaders identify native

trees, learn how to plant trees, and lead educational and spiritual programs highlighting how crucial trees are to a healthy and thriving watershed.

Trees are invaluable allies in the climate change fight, capturing carbon, and cleansing the air, while providing habitat for hundreds of insects, birds, and mammals. Maryland's 5 Million Trees legislation is a vital response to the climate crisis, requiring the state to plant five million trees by 2030. IPC is fostering key partnerships with organizations and state agencies to channel funding and resources to congregations eager to plant trees and reforest their properties.

Over the past 10 years, IPC estimates that congregations have planted more than 20,000 trees across the Chesapeake Bay watershed.

Sherwood Episcopal Church Awarded \$1.7 Million Grant for Stormwater Management Project



Sherwood Episcopal Church's Fall Tree Giveaway

Sherwood Episcopal Church in Baltimore County was just awarded a \$1.7M grant from the Maryland Department of Natural Resources! This grant will be transformative in the community, and is an inspiring reminder of what is possible

when congregations are supported with resources and technical assistance. A grant of this magnitude is an incredible feat for a faith-based organization and underscores the role IPC plays in inspiring environmental stewardship. Through IPC's One Water Partnership program, Sherwood Episcopal Church was connected with strategic partners, including the Gunpowder Valley Conservancy and the Maryland Department of Natural Resources. This crucial network laid the foundation for their groundbreaking Clean Water Project — a shining example of what can be accomplished when faith and environmental stewardship converge.

This funding will help control stormwater runoff from Sherwood Hill, preventing erosion, protecting the safety of motorists and local businesses along York Road, and safeguarding the nearby drinking water supply from pollution. IPC will enrich the project by infusing it with a commitment to education and environmental awareness, helping to amplify the project's impact and broaden its reach.

Creation Care is an important pillar of the entire Episcopal Church's mission. We hope to serve as a beacon for faith-based organizations as well as the community as a whole and beyond.

Faith Lutheran Church Partners with Gunpowder Valley Conservancy on Green Projects

As a Partner Congregation of IPC, Faith Lutheran Church in Cockeysville has consistently championed green infrastructure projects to reduce their ecological footprint. In partnership with Gunpowder Valley Conservancy through IPC's One Water Partnership, Faith Lutheran installed a rain garden and micro-bioretention project; these

natural filters aid runoff absorption. Faith Lutheran's small but mighty green team is committed to Creation Care, undertaking around 30 projects in their time as a partner of IPC. In addition, Faith Lutheran has joined forces with Sherwood Episcopal Church and Bazil African Methodist Episcopal Church, forming the Beaverdam

green team to collaboratively reduce stormwater runoff in their community. Their green team's embodiment of these values serves as an inspiration and a reminder of the profound impact we can make when we come together in the spirit of shared responsibility.

Hats off to Watershed Champions and Flanigan Award Winners

IPC's Executive Director Jodi Rose was honored as the Maryland Watershed Champion by the Alliance for the Chesapeake Bay in September. Since Jodi was hired in 2013, IPC has flourished, expanding from just one person (her!) to a dedicated staff of 12, increasing our revenue tenfold, and establishing partnerships with hundreds of congregations. In the past year alone, IPC:

- Supported projects from over 80 congregations that treated 28 acres of faith-owned land to reduce stormwater and increase tree canopy.
- Welcomed 15 new partner congregations that signed the pledge.
- Trained 28 new green teams.
- Hired five new staff and reorganized staffing teams to accelerate impact and outcomes.

The board, led by Board Chair Tonya Sanders Thach, spearheaded an intense self-evaluation among board and staff of how to operationalize the principles of diversity, equity, inclusion, and justice in our strategic plan. The August board retreat focused entirely on this subject and we are developing DEIJ recommendations to ensure we are reaching those most oppressed by environmental racism.

Jodi's award as the Maryland Watershed Champion challenges us to continue pushing boundaries and striving for equity. It reminds us that, as a collective voice, we have the power to engage even more faith communities in environmental stewardship and make a lasting impact on the Chesapeake Bay watershed. Together, we're driving progress towards a more equitable future.
