All eligible candidates are invited to participate. Candidates for the same office are asked the same questions. Responses appear exactly as entered by the candidate through an online interface. Answers end when the pre-established 400-character limit is reached.




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POLLING PLACES AND VOTING DISTRICTS

District lines in Maryland have been revised as a result of the 2020 census. If you plan to vote in person on November 8, be sure to check your assigned polling place before you go to the polls. This information will appear on the sample ballot you receive from the Board of Elections. Your polling place, congressional, legislative, and councilmanic district numbers can also be found by entering your address in https:// voterservices.elections.maryland. gov/PollingPlaceSearch or vote411.org.

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PROTECT YOUR VOTE

Do not give your ballot to anyone who offers to collect ballots. Put it directly in a USPS mailbox or in a Board of Elections dropbox. You may also turn it in at a voting center or at the County Board of Elections office. Dropboxes will be available at voting centers from early October through Election Day. Lists of dropbox sites and early voting centers are in this Voters' Guide. Make sure your vote gets counted. Have it postmarked at the post office or drop it off yourself no later than 8 p.m. on November 8.

VOTER REGISTRATION FAOS

AM I REGISTERED TO VOTE?

In Maryland, registration is permanent as long as you continue to live in the state and keep your address current. To verify your status and your address, text VOTE to 77788, go to **voterservices.elections.maryland.gov/VoterSearch**, or call the Board of Elections at 410-222-6600.

When you register to vote or change your registration (name, address or party affiliation), the Board of Elections will mail you a Voter Notification Card. If you don't receive a card within three weeks or the information on the card is incorrect, contact the Board of Elections.

HOW AND WHEN CAN I REGISTER, CHANGE PARTY OR UPDATE MY ADDRESS?

For the November 8 general election, the deadline to register to vote or change your registration information online or by mail is Tuesday, October 18. Go to https://voterservices.elections.maryland.gov/OnlineVoterRegistration/InstructionsStep1 or text VOTE to 77788.

If you are eligible to vote, you may register in person at one of the Early Voting Centers or at the polling place assigned to your current address. Take your driver's license, state ID card or a utility bill or other mailing that verifies your name and address.

OPTIONS FOR VOTERS WITH DISABILITIES

Voters with disabilities may vote in person or by mail. Voting centers have ballot marking devices for use by voters who would have difficulty reading and marking a paper ballot. Maryland also offers internet delivery of mail-in ballots and an online ballot marking tool that is compatible with adaptive technology. The voter must print the downloaded ballot and return it by USPS mail, in a ballot dropbox, or at an early voting center, polling place or the Board of Elections office. INCARCERATED AND PAROLED VOTERS

Citizens who are incarcerated for a misdemeanor or while awaiting trial are eligible to register and vote. Individuals convicted of a felony may register and vote when they have completed their court-ordered sentence of imprisonment.

Incarcerated eligible voters are advised to register to vote using their permanent address and to request that a mail-in ballot be sent to the correctional facility. If the ballot is sent to their permanent address, it will need to be handdelivered to the correctional facility. Advocates should work with correctional supervisors to provide the eligible voter with applications for both voter registration and a mail-in ballot.

Candidates are listed in ballot order.

GOVERNOR/LT. GOVERNOR

Vote for 1 pair.

DUTIES: The Governor is the head of the executive branch and appoints the heads of statewide departments and judges in the state courts. The Governor proposes the annual operating and capital budgets to the legislature and may veto legislation passed by the legislature. The Lieutenant Governor assists the Governor and carries out specific duties assigned by the Governor. The Lieutenant Governor fills the office of Governor in case of death, resignation, or disability.

TERM: Four years. Limit of two consecutive terms.

SALARIES: Governor \$184,000, Lieutenant Governor \$165,000 as of January 23, 2023.

HOW ELECTED: Elected statewide as a team.

Hogan (R) has said I am the most qualified candidate to succeed him. Jerome Segal (D), a socialist, has said I possess the character we need in our next Governor. ECONOMIC INEQUITIES: Especially for disadvantaged communities, the state should expand opportunity for individuals and small businesses. School choice, affordable housing, and safe streets for individuals and their loved ones, along with transportation assistance. Relief from taxes and regulations for small businesses, including a "concierge" service to help Marylanders obtain the state and local permits they need.

PUBLIC SAFETY: To reduce crime, we must bring an end to the war on drugs. Just as the end of alcohol prohibition brought an end to the gangster violence of 100 years ago, so too the end of drug prohibition will bring an end to the gangster violence of today. As is already done for college education.

HEALTH CARE: Our most publicized and politicized health challenge has of course been COVID, to which elected Rs and Ds alike reacted with excessive contempt for clinical data, civic debate, and personal choice. Against which excesses, we need restraints on executive powers under future health emergencies. We also need action against the surge in opioid overdoses, offering services instead of indifference.

NATURAL RESOURCES: For the Bay, we must compel PA to meet its targets under the Blueprint for the Bay, so that MD and VA are no longer bearing the costs of fertilizer runoff from PA farms. For the climate, we must recognize per the UN panel's own science that we DO face a formidable challenge but we do not face an imminent catastrophe. So, we must avoid panic while moving to clean, reliable, affordable energy.

INFRASTRUCTURE: First, I must implore that we quit exaggerating our needs. The Rs and Ds in DC already have splurged on unnecessary and inflationary spending. Second, I commit to managing that which is coming from DC in a competent manner (unlike the Purple Line) while tending to environmental impact, for example avoiding miles of new concrete; for example promoting innovation for east-west Baltimore transit.

OTHER PRIORITIES: My priority is to restore civility and hope across Maryland. Which has almost nothing to do with policy positions... but has everything to do with possessing a character and advancing a philosophy devoted to respect for ALL people regardless of race, gender, sexuality, or politics. Which is who I myself am and what libertarianism is, as you can confirm for yourself by following my campaign.

ECONOMIC INEQUITIES: The state government should take the lead in redistributing wealth from the top one percent to those who created it by practical programs increasing home ownership such as all public housing becomes rent to own; free college and forgiveness of all public college student debt; free universal health care including elderly care that Social Security doesn't cover; and green jobs with training for all.

PUBLIC SAFETY: See 11 point plan, website: Re screening all MD police for psychological tolerance. 50 percent of police live in their work jurisdiction. Mental health officers as priority. Elevate violent offenders to nonviolent paths with proven life mapping program. Raise standard for acceptable force above legal minimum. Full funding for social workers. Local citizen oversight boards with investigative power.

EDUCATION: Implement the Kirwan Commission on Education, and transition to Montessori proven technique for higher achievement and emotional healing in early years. Free public college so all students know they have path to good paying jobs. High school academies with apprenticeships for locally needed skills for local community, partnering with unions and local businesses. Air conditioning, heat guaranteed!

HEALTH CARE: Our children's health epidemic of neurological disease of 1 in 8 children, vast racial discrepancies in health care, racialized rates of poverty that are stressors taking years off life expectancy, onslaught of toxic chemicals such as PFAS forever chemicals from firefighting and military facilities, glyphosate from food, mercury from coal plants each need a targeted program for a clean healthy MD. **NATURAL RESOURCES**: Climate change needs emergency transformation on scale of WWII economic mobilization. We can reverse climate change with immediate free solar panels from \$2.3 billion Rainy Day fund; super insulation of housing starting with public housing; absorb CO2 with switch to organic farming with full state support, reforestation of all state lands, public education on minimum mowing, and restoring the Bay.

INFRASTRUCTURE: Our 2022

Infrastructure grade of C from American Society of Engineers clearly indicates that maintenance and renovation of our bridges, roads, dams, wastewater and other components will be our focus, not massive growth. Temporary environmental impacts will be offset by the improved engineering design such as fish ladders. Our large reforestation and Chesapeake restoration programs will also help.

OTHER PRIORITIES: Democracy reform with Ranked Choice Voting aka True Majority Voting, citizens right to state wide referendum, remove seniority dominance in state legislature to allow equal powers to all elected representatives, public investment of tax revenues through a state Public Bank like ND, decentralization of power, local economic investment, small business priority. We never take corporate donations.

WORKING CLASS

NATURAL RESOURCES: If our natural resources were developed for the benefit of the entire population, rather than to boost the income of developers and agri-business, we would have more green spaces, a better quality of air, water and land and less global warming.

INFRASTRUCTURE: Some of the biggest infrastructure problems in Maryland are water and sewage. Working people would benefit from better roads, bridges, sewers, water and transportation systems, and so would the environment. But again, this requires a fight to redirect the wealth.

OTHER PRIORITIES: The working class has a potential that many workers don't realize. We do all the work of society, in offices, in manufacturing, in services. We have the potential to make huge changes because society could not run a single day without our work.

DUTIES: The Comptroller is the financial officer of Maryland. He or she is responsible for collecting, managing and planning for revenue to support the state budget. The Comptroller collects and administers Maryland taxes on income (both personal and corporate), retail sales, motor vehicle fuel, tobacco, beer, and wine and liquor, as well as estate taxes. The Comptroller serves on the Board of Public Works along with the Governor and the state Treasurer, who is appointed by the General Assembly. The Board of Public Works must

approve major contracts for the purchase of goods or service by any department of state government.

TERM: Four years. No term limit.

SALARY: \$150,000.

HOW ELECTED: Elected statewide.

ADMINISTRATION OF JUSTICE: As

Attorney General I will conduct a review of all facets of administration of the AG office to ensure that constitutionally authorized activities are appropriately prioritized and funded. I will discontinue activities that are outside of the jurisdictional authority of the office pursuant to Article V of the Constitution of Maryland

PUBLIC SAFETY: Violent crimes must be brought under control. As AG this would be a priority. Criminal or otherwise inappropriate conduct by police will be investigated fairly and transparently. Police have a difficult and dangerous job and as AG I would have open and established lines of communication with both police and community groups. **JUVENILE JUSTICE**: Efforts must continue to keep youths from entering the penal system. However, violent repeaters will be dealt with appropriately. I would also encourage the discontinuance of unrequested window cleaning of motor vehicles in Baltimore City and elsewhere.

CONSUMER PROTECTION: I believe that fraudulent activities should be investigated and prosecuted. However, I believe that it is the first priority of individuals to be careful and scrupulous in their business dealings

OTHER PRIORITIES: No governor or any bureaucrat has authority to make law, or declare that any order or edict has the "force of law" Any attempt to enact/enforce anything that violates the divinely given, constitutionally protected rights of people is worse than a nullity. No one, under any circumstance, has the authority to violate the constitution. There is no exception to this. It's a crime & must be prosecuted

NATURAL RESOURCES: Climate change and the effects on the costal regions in particular those on the Chesapeake Bay where land erosion will threaten homes and wildlife habitats. The worsening pollution and deterioration of the health of the bay will be a direct result of this continued loss of land to rising water levels.

PUBLIC SAFETY: Maryland Libertarians were heavily influential in the creation of the civilian oversight boards for police, and I support additional community involvement, as well as transparency measures such as bodycams. HEALTH: Ending the war on drugs is the greatest action we can take. Addiction and mental health issues eat into the state budget, and both problems remain underserved. Countries such as Portugal who focus on harm reduction see lower addiction rates and reduced spending.

NATURAL RESOURCES: 41% of all Maryland power production comes from nuclear, at our single site on Calvert Cliffs. This is the cleanest energy in Maryland, and if the additional reactor had been approved in 2011, we'd be at nearly 80%. We could have had cheaper nearly carbon free and pollutant free power for almost the entire state, but the legislature killed it with a \$880mil demand. I won't stop Maryland energy.

LOCAL PROJECTS: 1. Lower the Taxes. 2. End the mandates. 3. Fix the roads. These are our top issues locally. Beyond that, I will pursue my constituents priorities, not my own. Citizens have asked about inflation, unmaintained sidewalks, veteran care, children riding bikes on the roads, our local overdue library rebuild, and many other issues. All of these are valid concerns, and need remedy.

OTHER PRIORITIES: In every possible way, I aim to support individual freedom. I support your right to choose your own medical care without political intervention, your right to defend yourself and preserve your safety, your right to freedom of speech, religion, marriage, travel, to spend your money as you see fit. I'm not going to tell you how to live your life. The Constitution does not give me that authority.

QUALIFICATIONS: Advocating to the Board of Education, Maryland Senate, and on Capitol Hill has provided me with the experience needed to be a strong voice for District 33C. As part of a military family, I've lived in communities around the country and gained an appreciation for diversity and understanding differences of opinion. I will utilize all of my experiences as your Representative in Annapolis.

ECONOMIC INEQUITIES: We are fortunate in Maryland to have active nonprofits who can forecast the challenges in our communities and provide services for those most in need. State and local governments should support the missions of these groups and partner with them to provide necessary resources so they can serve our community. **PUBLIC SAFETY**: Though the General Assembly has focused on reforming policing, crime has been steadily rising in Maryland. We must shift focus to legislation that holds criminals accountable and return to a "Tough on Crime" philosophy. We should also bring police leaders, citizens, and legislators together to discuss challenges and implement best practices in policing to benefit both law enforcement and citizens.

EDUCATION: Covid restrictions had a negative impact on kids in both mental health and loss of learning. On recent MCAP tests, only 15% of kids showed competency in math and 31% in English. Schools need to partner with parents and teachers to provide resources to help children catch up. The focus on our schools also needs to be on teaching core subjects and challenging students to encourage academic growth.

HEALTH: Mental health is a significant health challenge for Marylanders, and leads to issues including drug and alcohol addictions, self-harm, eating disorders, and suicide. Mental health treatment needs to be easier to obtain, especially for youth, by encouraging more treatment providers to operate throughout Maryland and making treatment more affordable.

NATURAL RESOURCES: As the wife of an environmental scientist who works to protect the natural resources in Maryland, I treasure the beauty and uniqueness of our state. Growth and development are valuable and necessary, but we must ensure it is not at the cost of our irreplaceable natural resources or overtaxing our existing roads, schools, and other infrastructures.

LOCAL PROJECTS: A priority issue I have for my district is education, ensuring parental rights and involvement in schools, and helping children with learning losses they experienced due to school closures. Another vital concern is the proposed Bay Bridge extension and the cumbersome traffic within the Broadneck Peninsula caused by detours from the bridge.

OTHER PRIORITIES: Public safety and crime are an important issue, as we are beginning to see that no community is immune to the violence that is spreading into the suburbs. It is imperative we give our police the tools, resources, and support to combat violent offenders. Additionally, inflation and rising costs of necessities including food, gas, and taxes must be addressed to give Marylanders some relief.



DEMOCRATIC

QUALIFICATIONS: I have four years which I've used well to understand how to build consensus to move legislation. My 30 years in the arts and 20 years in arts education and admin has helped inform my ability to tackle big picture issues, to look for unintended consequences and impacts on a broad range of communities and to communicate complex issues & comprehensive policies in understandable, relatable ways.

ECONOMIC INEQUITIES: I believe in ensuring people have what they need when needed, but the pandemic has really demonstrated how quickly we falter without robust social safety nets. We've built an unsustainable gig economy significantly shrinking the middle class. With the pause it became clear that we couldn't fill low income positions if we didn't find ways to reduce cost of living and raise quality of life.

PUBLIC SAFETY: We took a good first step with the Police Reform Package and with the increased security for gun dealers to reduce smash and grab crimes, but crime reduction is not the same as enforcement. Part of reducing crime is holding violent criminals accountable, but also ensuring that communities have access to educational resources, Substance Use and mental health treatment, transit, and jobs.

EDUCATION: One primary focus for me is transportation because if the kids can't get to school nothing else matters. Passing and funding the Blueprint was an essential first step however we're going to need to invest in training and retention of our teachers. We need an expansion in arts and alternate learning styles education, and a renewed focus on diversified curriculum which meets students where they are.

HEALTH: Behavioral health care remains the single most challenging health issue in Maryland. Carve outs which resulted in a lack of mental, dental, and vision preventative care, and a patchwork of service providers has made access to care feel at times insurmountable. I have made behavioral health access for adolescents a primary focus. Passing the Mental Health Access Initiative was just the first step.

NATURAL RESOURCES: Sea level rise is the single greatest threat to Maryland. Though there are many issues which need to be addressed I have been focused on an important but obscure part of the law called Riparian Rights dating back to British Common Law and referring to mean high water line in shared shoreline because it defines who has responsibility for maintaining shoreline and waterways.

LOCAL PROJECTS: Rt 2, Rt 50 and the Bay Bridge—I have worked with SHA and the Toll authority to make sure the Western Shore has a seat at the table but I want to ensure that as we look at a replacement span we establish the Broadneck Peninsula as an impact zone. Unlike the Eastern Shore who do have commuters, we derived no benefit from the bridge, only pain and it's long past time we used revenue to reinvest.

OTHER PRIORITIES: I continue to focus on expanding behavioral health services and providers, and on ensuring transit options in Anne Arundel County, and to work for solutions to the traffic issues in my district. My priorities are suicide prevention, child care, reducing maternal mortality rates, education, protecting the rights of LGBTQ youth and adults, & protecting the reproductive rights of all Marylanders.

From building roads and improving buildings to navigating a small business through a pandemic and staffing challenges, I can offer experience and a "can do" attitude to get it done.

ELECTIONS: The democratic process empowers people to shape our collective futures. Participation is crucial for safe and free society. Council should address any voting or communication barriers that reduce participation. Leaders must promote open and civil discourse to encourage informed opinions and understanding. I oppose any initiative that adds partisan voting hurdles or reduces transparency.

This legislation would make it easier for non-wealthy candidates to run for office and ultimately create a more diverse council. It would also help restrain the influence of big money.

PUBLIC SAFETY: Prevention is the best way to reduce crime. This comes in several forms: ensuring that schools provide young people with the skills they need to find good paying jobs. We also need to ensure past offenders have pathways to jobs and independence. Recently, when the council created the county's police accountability system, I worked for transparency and diversity on the board.

NATURAL RESOURCES: I worked with my colleagues to pass one of the strongest forest conservation bills in the state. I also worked to pass another bill that will hold developers accountable for taking down large trees. In our recent Green Infrastructure Plan, I supported a goal of 30% of the county's land held in conservation, to be free from development.

HOUSING: Our county has a shortage of affordable housing. At the same time, we have conservation needs. The best way to balance these two is to encourage higher density and lower cost housing near transit hubs, sometimes called transit oriented development. This can help provide new housing while at the same time minimizing new traffic and providing access to the transit needed to reach employment.

TRANSPORTATION: I am thrilled to have worked with the county executive to bring a transit center to Annapolis mall and to make our county buses fare-free. I have also encouraged the Annapolis Mayor to go fare-free. Transit users tend to be our most economically disadvantaged residents. Removing fares removes an obstacle to employment. By encouraging transit use, we can also lessen our carbon footprint. **COMMUNITY RELATIONS**: I believe the best path to mutual respect and civility is talking with each other face to face. It is much harder to disregard the viewpoint of someone else when you know them and understand how the world looks from where they stand. I suspect the contentious topics we've had to address in the past few years—masks and re-openings for example—could be resolved more easily in person.

HOW ELECTED: Elected countywide. The state is divided into 8 Judicial Circuits. When there is a vacancy, the Governor appoints a person to fill the office from a list recommended by a judicial nominating commission. The nominating commission reviews each applicant's experience as an attorney before making recommendations to the Governor. Each newly appointed judge must stand for election at the first election that occurs at least one year after the vacancy happened. Sitting judges must also run for re-election after serving for 15 years. Attorneys who are members of the Maryland Bar may also run to challenge a newly appointed or sitting judge. All candidates run on both the Democratic and Republican primary ballots.

The Court, usually sitting in panels of three judges, decides if the trial judge followed the law and legal precedent. The Court is composed of 15 judges: eight at large and one each from seven appellate judicial districts.

SALARY: \$183,633

TERM: Ten years, no term limit. Mandatory retirement age of 70 years.

HOW ELECTED: When there is a vacancy on the Court of Special Appeals, the governor appoints a qualified person to fill the office, with the consent of the State Senate. Once appointed, the appellate judge holds the office until the first election that occurs at least one year after the vacancy happened. At that time, the judge runs for election for a ten-year term on their record (yes or no for continuance in office). No one is permitted to file against them. If the incumbent judge is approved, the judge faces another "retention election" every ten years to continue in office. If the incumbent judge is rejected by the voters, the post becomes vacant, and the governor makes a new appointment.

MOTIVATION: Family is most important to me. The Orphans' Court symbolizes "family legacy". In law, a legacy is something that someone gets by inheritance, or by a will. The Orphans' Court Judges are dedicated to the court to assure that the probate matters are dealt with expeditiously, fairly and effectively.

JUDICIAL PHILOSOPHY: For the Orphans' Court Judges to continue to hold unbiased formal hearings for family disputes, remains very respectful to the parties before them and remain completely neutral and fair throughout proceedings. All Judges are skilled in dealing with the emotions of grieving families. The Court will take the duties and responsibilities seriously and have the best interest for the citizens.

DEMOCRATIC

QUALIFICATIONS: I am a teacher and public servant hoping to serve the people of Anne Arundel County as a Judge on the Orphans' Court. I am a high school teacher at Bowie High School, teaching government, history, criminal justice, and sociology. I work to ensure that all students are prepared to be well-educated citizens upon graduation. In addition to working as a teacher, I serve as an advocate and organizer.

PRIORITIES: My goal, if elected, is to make the court accessible to all. I hope to collaborate with the other Judges on the court to offer additional times and a virtual option for court sessions to make it more accessible for working people. People are often coming to the court after the loss of a loved one and I will work to ensure the court is a place where all people are heard and respected.

COURT SYSTEM: As a Judge on the Orphans' Court, I wouldn't have the ability to influence the overall Judicial system. However, I am concerned that, in general, the court system is not consistently accessible and demands a great deal from those needing to participate in it. I want to expand the court's availability and ensure that all know they are welcomed. **MOTIVATION**: I understand the importance of our government institutions and the need to make them effective and accessible. I know that our society only functions when citizens serve the needs of the community. I saw a need for someone to run for this office and I felt it was important for me to step up to serve.

JUDICIAL PHILOSOPHY: As a Judge of the Orphans' Court, I wouldn't be interpreting many sections of the law that Maryland's District or Circuit Judges interpret. However, my philosophy will involve ensuring that all voices are heard and respected in the court, a cooperative relationship with my fellow judges, and an appreciation for the effects and consequences of our interpretations on families.

DEMOCRATIC

Vickie Gipson

QUALIFICATIONS: I am an incumbent judge with 3 years of experience as a judge of the Orphans' Court for Anne Arundel County.

PRIORITIES: My priorities are to support efforts to modernize the Court by developing a process for video and/or teleconferenced hearings as well as developing an active and engaging mediation program to help families retain generational wealth by facilitating the effective and expeditious resolution of disputes.

COURT SYSTEM: In my opinion and limiting my comments to Orphans' Court, the greatest challenge facing Orphans' Court is that each Orphans' Court jurisdiction is treated as an individual silo with no overarching guidance specifically directed to Orphans' Court. This left many Orphans' Courts with unanswered questions during the pandemic as Orphans Court was sometimes overlooked or left hanging on their own.

MOTIVATION: Going through a probate dispute can be very upsetting for the parties, especially where there is division in families. I am motivated by my desire to help guide parties through Orphans' Court litigation in a way that is healing and helps everyone retain their dignity and economic resources.

JUDICIAL PHILOSOPHY: My judicial philosophy is to make no assumptions, hear everyone out, encourage resolution among the Parties and to be fair!



DEMOCRATIC

QUALIFICATIONS: Member of the Maryland Bar; 40+ year career in finance

PRIORITIES: To ensure that everyone who appears before the Orphans' Court, whether or not represented by counsel, is treated fairly and equitably.

COURT SYSTEM: The salaries of the Orphans' Court judges are woeful, less than that of court clerks. This means you get judges who often hold other jobs, jobs where there is conflict of interest between their rulings and the goals of their side (or main) gigs. I'm comfortably retired so this isn't an issue for me. But it is for the integrity of the Court.

MOTIVATION: Desire to serve the community

JUDICIAL PHILOSOPHY: Treat everyone who comes before the court equitably and fairly.

SHERIFF

Vote for 1

DUTIES: The County Sheriff's office is responsible for enforcing writs of the court, maintaining county warrants, extraditing prisoners from foreign jurisdictions, transporting prisoners between holding facilities and the courts, and maintaining courtroom decorum. The Sheriff's Office also assists other law enforcement agencies as needed.

SALARY: \$133,000 (FY 2021).

TERM: Four years; no term limit.

HOW ELECTED: Elected countywide. To be eligible for the office of Sheriff, a person must be at least twenty-five years of age and must have been a County resident for at least five years immediately preceding election.

QUESTIONS

QUALIFICATIONS: How does your experience prepare you for the duties of this office?

PRIORITIES: What will be your goals and priorities during your term of office?

I will reduce domestic violence by continuing aid to victims throughout the complaint process. I will increase efficiency in the warrant process to reduce the backlog of warrants. MARYLAND QUESTION 1

Constitutional Amendment (Ch 82 of the 2021 Legislative Session)

Court of Appeals and Special Appeals—Renaming

Changes the names of Maryland's appellate courts from the Court of Appeals to the Supreme Court of Maryland and from the Court of Special Appeals to the Appellate Court of Maryland. Under the new law, judges serving on the Court of Appeals will be justices of the Supreme Court of Maryland and the Chief Judge of the Court of Appeals will be the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Maryland. (Amending Article II, Section 6, Article III, Sections 5, 30, and 52, Article IV, Sections 1, 3, 3A, 4B, 5A, 10, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 22 and 44E, Article V, Section 6, and Article XVII, Section 3 to the Maryland Constitution.)

Vote FOR or AGAINST the Constitutional amendment

CURRENT LAW: Under the Maryland Constitution, the highest court in Maryland is called the Court of Appeals, unlike many other states and the federal constitution, which refer to their highest court as the Supreme Court. Judges on the Court of Appeals are referred to as judges rather than justices, which is the title in states that call their highest court the Supreme Court. The Maryland Constitution also provides for a Court of Special Appeals, which hears most initial appeals from trial courts and whose decisions can be reviewed by the Court of Appeals if one of the parties appeals their decision.

PROPOSED CHANGE: The name of the highest court in Maryland would be changed from the Court of Appeals to the Supreme Court of Maryland and the judges on that court would be referred to as justices. The current name of the Court of Special Appeals would be changed to the Appellate Court of Maryland.

ORIGIN OF THE BALLOT

QUESTION: This amendment was proposed in a bill passed by the Maryland General Assembly (Senate Bill 666) in the 2021 session. The judges of the Court of Appeals proposed changing the name of their court to avoid confusion when their decisions are cited in arguments in lawsuits in other states. In most other states, a "court of appeals" is a mid-level appellate court rather than the highest court. Bills to make this change were considered in 2019 and 2020 before finally passing in 2021.

ARGUMENTS FOR THE AMENDMENT:

- ★ Decisions by a state's highest court are treated as more persuasive in arguments and a reference to the Supreme Court of Maryland would be readily understood as the final decision regarding Maryland law.
- ★ Decisions by the "Court of Appeals," the current name of the highest court in Maryland, might be misunderstood

as referring to a decision of a mid-level appellate court, instead of the highest court.

ARGUMENTS AGAINST THE AMENDMENT:

- ★ Legal research is a highly specialized field and lawyers reviewing decisions of courts in other states are presumed to understand which court is the highest court.
- ★ There would be administrative costs associated with changing the name of both courts, e.g., revising office letterhead, directory listings, etc.
- □ A Vote FOR Question 1 means the Maryland Constitution will be amended to change the name of the highest court from the Court of Appeals to the Supreme Court of Maryland and its judges will be called justices. The name of the Court of Special Appeals, the mid-level appellate court, will be changed to the Appellate Court of Maryland.
- □ A Vote AGAINST Question 1 means that the Constitution will not be amended and the names of the courts will continue to be the Court of Appeals and Court of Special Appeals.

MARYLAND QUESTION 2

Constitutional Amendment (Ch. 808 of 2021 Legislative Session)

Legislative Department—Eligibility to Serve as Senators and Delegates— Place of Abode

Adds to the eligibility requirements to serve as a senator or a delegate to the Maryland General Assembly by requiring a person to have maintained a primary place of abode in the district that the person has been chosen to represent. (Amending Article III, Section 9 to the Maryland Constitution)

Vote FOR or AGAINST the Constitutional amendment

CURRENT LAW: Under current law, to be eligible to serve as a state senator or delegate, a person must have a residence in the district that person represents for at least six months immediately preceding the date of the person's election. However, if the district has been established for less than six months prior to the date of election, they must have resided there as long as the district has been established. Residency can be established by maintaining a residence and staying there at least occasionally. **PROPOSED CHANGE**: The new law requires, beginning January 1, 2024, a state senator or delegate would be required to have both resided in and maintained a primary place of abode in the district for the same time periods as under current law. Primary abode means that they stay there the majority of the time.

ORIGIN OF THE BALLOT

QUESTION: The proposed change is a response to a decision by the Maryland Court of Appeals that a state senator had not abandoned his residence in a district because he had established a residence in another district where he often resided. Adding "primary place of abode" would prevent a legislator from claiming residence in a district based on merely owning or renting a place where they sometimes stayed.

ARGUMENTS FOR THE AMENDMENT:

To understand the needs of the people in a district, a legislator should live the majority of the time within the district. Merely owning a residence that they occasionally use should not qualify as living within the district.

ARGUMENTS AGAINST THE AMENDMENT:

The proposed change could lead to lawsuits over how frequently a person is actually living in a particular residence.

- □ A Vote FOR Question 2 means members of the Maryland House of Delegates and Senate will be required to maintain and live the majority of the time in a primary residence within the districts they are representing.
- □ A Vote AGAINST Question 2 means that the law will remain unchanged and a Delegate or Senator will be treated as residing within the district they represent so long as they own or rent a residence there and stay there at least occasionally.

MARYLAND QUESTION 3

Constitutional Amendment (Ch. 809 of the 2021 Legislative Session)

Civil Jury Trials

Authorizing the General Assembly to enact legislation that limits the right to a jury trial in a civil proceeding to those proceedings in which the amount in controversy exceeds \$25,000, excluding attorney's fees if attorney's fees are recoverable in the proceeding. (Amending Maryland Declaration of Rights-Articles 5(a) and 23)

Vote FOR or AGAINST the Constitutional amendment

CURRENT LAW: Currently, either party to a civil lawsuit can ask for a jury trial if more than \$15,000 in damages is being sought. Civil cases in which less than \$30,000 is being sought are filed in District Court and are usually decided by a District Court judge. If more than \$15,000 is being sought and one side requests a jury trial, the case is moved to the Circuit Court, where all jury trials take place. Which Court hears the case affects discovery—the right to require the other side to present evidence before the trial to assist in preparing arguments. District Courts allow less discovery than Circuit Courts.

PROPOSED CHANGE: In a civil case, the parties would have a right to a jury trial in Circuit Court only if the amount being sought was more than \$25,000 (raised from \$15,000). Any cases involving smaller amounts (\$25,000 or less) would be decided by a District Court judge without a jury.

ORIGIN OF THE BALLOT QUESTION:

Legislation to increase the amount required for a right to a jury trial was proposed in 2015, 2019, and 2020 but was not successful until the 2021 session of the General Assembly. The threshold was last increased in 2010, when it was raised to \$15,000.

ARGUMENTS FOR THE AMENDMENT:

- ★ Raising the dollar threshold for requesting a jury trial is necessary from time to time to keep up with rising costs.
- ★ Preparing a case for decision by a District Court judge is less expensive for plaintiffs (the party initiating the lawsuit) and defendants.
- ★ Jury trials take more time and require more court resources than non-jury trials, therefore, increasing the threshold for jury trials would save taxpayers money because there would be fewer jury trials.
- ★ More cases could be resolved quickly because a decision by a judge is less time consuming than a jury trial.

ARGUMENTS AGAINST THE AMENDMENT:

★ Limiting the right to a jury trial by raising the threshold to \$25,000 will be a disadvantage to defendants because more cases will be tried in the District Court, which has limited rights to discover evidence before trial.

- ★ The right to a jury trial is an important right that should not be limited more than necessary.
- ★ Concerns about the costs of discovery would be better addressed by reforming discovery rules rather than limiting the right to a jury trial.
- □ A Vote FOR Question 3 means the right to a jury trial in civil cases will be limited to those cases where more than \$25,000 is being sought.
- A Vote AGAINST Question 3 means that a plaintiff or defendant could demand a jury trial if more than \$15,000 is being sought.

MARYLAND QUESTION 4

Constitutional Amendment (Ch. 45 of the 2022 Legislative Session)

Cannabis—Legalization of Adult Use and Possession

Do you favor the legalization of the use of cannabis by an individual who is at least 21 years of age on or after July 1, 2023, in the State of Maryland? (Adding Article XX, Section 1 to the Maryland Constitution)

Vote FOR or AGAINST the Constitutional amendment

CURRENT LAW: Under current State law, possession of 10 grams (0.35 ounces) or more of marijuana is a misdemeanor, punishable by imprisonment for up to six months, a fine of up to \$1,000, or both. Possession of less than 10 grams of marijuana is a civil offense, punishable by a fine of up to \$100 for a first offense, \$250 for a second offense, and \$500 for a third or subsequent offense. Marijuana is listed on Schedule I under the federal Controlled Substances Act.

PROPOSED CHANGE: This constitutional amendment adds new Article XX "Cannabis" to the Maryland Constitution to provide that on or after July 1, 2023, an individual in the State who is at least 21 years old may legally use and possess cannabis (otherwise known as marijuana). This authorization also requires the General Assembly to pass legislation providing for the use, distribution, possession, regulation, and taxation of cannabis within Maryland.

ORIGIN OF THE BALLOT

QUESTION: The Legislature passed cannabis reform legislation (House Bill 837) in the 2022 legislative session. A few of the provisions related to studies, data collection, reports, and income tax subtraction modification have been enacted. Implementation of the more substantive provisions was left up to the voters to decide by this ballot question. If Question 4 is approved, this cannabis reform legislation will take effect.

ARGUMENTS FOR THE AMENDMENT:

- ★ Eighteen other jurisdictions, including Virginia and the District of Columbia, have legalized recreational cannabis use by adults.
- ★ Maryland has had a medical cannabis program since 2014.
- ★ About half of Maryland residents over the age of 18 admit to using marijuana at some point in their lives.
- ★ Black Marylanders are more than twice as likely to be arrested for cannabis possession than white Marylanders despite similar usage rates.
- ★ Cannabis possession accounted for 57% of drug related arrests in Maryland in 2020 creating a burden for law enforcement, the courts, and the correctional system.
- ★ Prior offenders will be able to clear their records of cannabis convictions, improving their access to jobs, education, and housing.

ARGUMENTS AGAINST THE AMENDMENT:

- ★ The amounts authorized in this legislation are significantly lower than the amounts found in the Maryland medical marijuana law, potentially creating confusion for the public.
- ★ The law does not eliminate the illegal buying and selling of cannabis products.
- ★ It does not regulate the safety of cannabis products in the market.
- ★ Use of high-potency concentrates of THC, the main active ingredient of cannabis, especially by those under the age of 21, has been linked to addiction, psychiatric disorders, and hospitalization.
- □ A Vote FOR Question 4 means beginning July 1, 2023, possession of up to 1.5 ounces (42.52 grams) and use of cannabis by adults over the age of 21 will be legal in Maryland.

□ A Vote AGAINST Question 4 means possession of 10 grams (0.35 ounces) or more of cannabis will continue to be a misdemeanor crime punishable by up to six months in jail.

MARYLAND QUESTION 5

Constitutional Amendment (Ch 539 of the 2022 Legislative Session— House Bill 868)

Circuit Court for Howard County— Judges Sitting as Orphans' Court

Repeals county elections of Howard County orphans' court judges and requires the Howard County Circuit Court judges to sit as the orphans' court for Howard County. The current law provides for the voters of Howard County to elect three orphans' court judges. Under the amended law, a party could no longer appeal a final judgment of the Howard County Orphans' Court to the Howard County Circuit Court and would instead take an appeal directly to the Court of Special Appeals. (Amending Article IV, Sections 20 and 40 to the Maryland Constitution)

Vote FOR or AGAINST the Constitutional amendment

CURRENT LAW: The Orphans' Court (similar to probate court in other states) supervises the property and finances of deceased residents. This includes the payment of debts, the distribution or transfer of property, and the guardianship of minor children and their property. It resolves disagreements and contested questions about an estate and also approves the payment of fees. Currently, the Maryland Constitution establishes an elected Orphans' Court of three judges in all counties, except in Harford and Montgomery counties, which chose to abolish their Orphans' Courts and have those cases heard in Circuit Court. Any citizen over the age of 18 who has lived in Howard County for at least one year may be elected a judge of the orphans' court. A dissatisfied party may appeal a decision of the orphans' court to the Circuit Court for Howard County.

PROPOSED CHANGE: This amendment would eliminate the election of orphans' court judges in Howard County and would instead require the Circuit Court judges to also serve as the Orphans' Court. If this amendment passes, a dissatisfied party wishing to appeal an Orphans' Court decision in Howard County would take the appeal directly to the Court of Special Appeals. This amendment must be approved by BOTH a majority of statewide voters and a majority of the voters in Howard County before it can take effect.

ORIGIN OF THE BALLOT

QUESTION: The Howard County Delegation requested the Amendment, which was then approved by the Maryland General Assembly as House Bill 868.

ARGUMENTS FOR THE AMENDMENT:

- ★ Moving the orphans' court function to the Circuit Court will result in the cases being heard by judges with a professional legal background and more closely align with the practice in most other jurisdictions. Only Maryland and Alabama currently allow non-lawyers to serve as elected judges in non-routine or contested probate matters. All other states require such judges to be lawyers admitted to the bar, as do Baltimore City, Baltimore County and Prince Georges' County.
- ★ The Circuit Court, sitting as an orphans' court, will be able to easily integrate the workload into its schedule and resolve the issues more efficiently. The Orphans' Court currently operates on a part-time basis, one day per week. The Circuit Court operates full-time, 5 days per week.
- ★ The Maryland State Bar Association and most of the judicial reform commissions that have considered the matter have recommended the abolition of the Orphans' Courts.

ARGUMENTS AGAINST THE AMENDMENT:


- ★ Much of the work of the Orphans' Courts consists of approving a variety of orders dealing with the administration of estates that may not require the expertise of an attorney.
- ★ More sweeping changes may make this amendment unnecessary. A 2021 Task Force to Study the Maryland Orphans' Courts made recommendations that are currently awaiting action by the Maryland General Assembly, and which would also require an amendment to the Maryland Constitution.

A Vote FOR Question 5 means Circuit Court Judges will serve as the Orphans' Court in Howard County.

□ A Vote AGAINST Question 5 means the Howard County Orphans' Court will continue to operate as it

Court will continue to operate as it has in the past, with elected lay judges serving on a part-time basis.





QUESTION A

To amend the Anne Arundel County Charter to require the Anne Arundel County Veterans Affairs Commission.

ORIGIN: Introduced by Councilmember Pruski. Resolution No. 64-21 passed unanimously January 18, 2022.

PRESENT PRACTICE: The Anne Arundel County Veterans Affairs Commission was established in 2006 by County Council ordinance. Its purpose, composition, powers and duties are currently enshrined in County Code, but it could be disbanded by a future County Council with only a majority vote.

PROPOSED CHANGE: The Veterans Affairs Commission would become one of five standing Special Commissions, Boards and Committees required by the County Charter, and any decision to disband the Commission in the future would require passage of a charter amendment, which must be approved by voters. County Council will retain the ability to revise the Commission's structure, purpose and authority through legislation.

ARGUMENTS FOR:

Anne Arundel County has the 2nd largest veteran population in Maryland. Codifying the Veterans' Affairs Commission in the County Charter demonstrates the County's commitment and support and leaves the decision to disband the Commission up to County voters.

ARGUMENTS AGAINST:

None identified.

- A Vote FOR the charter amendment would add a Charter requirement that the County have a Veterans Affairs Commission.
- A Vote AGAINST the charter amendment would mean that the Veterans Affairs Commission would not be required by the Charter.

QUESTION B

To amend the Anne Arundel County Charter to provide that no person elected or appointed to the office of County Councilmember may serve more than three full consecutive four-year terms.

ORIGIN: Submitted by the Anne Arundel County Charter Revision Commission. Resolution 18-22 introduced by Councilmember Volke passed July 5, 2022 by a vote of 6 in favor, 1 opposed.

PRESENT PRACTICE: County

Councilmembers may serve a maximum of two consecutive four-year terms. The term limit was added to the County Charter in 1992.

PROPOSED CHANGE: County

Councilmembers would be allowed to serve up to three full consecutive four-year terms.

ARGUMENTS FOR:

A limit of three full consecutive terms would be consistent with other jurisdictions. Of Maryland's Charter counties, Baltimore, Cecil, Dorchester, Harford, Talbot, and Wicomico have no term limits. Howard and Montgomery County have limits of three full terms or two full terms and part of a third term. Frederick County has a three-term limit. The only other Charter County with a two-term limit is Prince George's County. All terms for the Charter counties are four years.

ARGUMENTS AGAINST:

Increasing the term limit may impact the County pension system. Councilmembers participate in the County Employees' Retirement Plan, which requires ten years of service to be vested. Under the current two-term limit, a Councilmember would not become eligible for a pension benefit. If the term limit is increased, a Councilmember serving a third consecutive term would vest in the benefits of the retirement plan during their third term.

- A Vote FOR the charter amendment would allow a County Councilmember to serve three full consecutive fouryear terms.
- A Vote AGAINST the charter amendment would retain the current provision that a County Councilmember may serve two full consecutive fouryear terms.

QUESTION C

To amend the Anne Arundel County Charter to require that the compensation paid to each member of the County Council be paid after consideration of recommendations of the Salary Standard Commission that are approved by ordinance of the County Council.

ORIGIN: Submitted by the Anne Arundel County Charter Revision Commission. Resolution No. 19-22 introduced by Councilmembers Pruski and Lacey passed unanimously July 5, 2022.

PRESENT PRACTICE: The County Charter references an annual salary of \$2,100 for Councilmembers, as originally adopted in 1964. Consistent with state law enacted after that date, the County established a Salary Standard Commission to recommend compensation and allowances for members of the County Council. The Council may pass legislation to accept, reject or reduce the commission's recommendations for salaries and allowances, but it may not increase them.

PROPOSED CHANGE: The resolution would remove the reference to an outdated salary amount and replace it with language recognizing that the salary shall be set by County Council in accordance with recommendations of the Salary Standard Commission.

ARGUMENTS FOR:

This amendment would make the language in the County Charter consistent with present practice.

ARGUMENTS AGAINST:

None identified.

A Vote FOR the charter amendment would remove the reference to an obsolete salary amount and would substitute a reference to the current

procedure used by the County Council salaries to set salaries and allowances.

A Vote AGAINST the charter amendment would retain the reference to the obsolete salary amount.

QUESTION D

To amend the Anne Arundel County Charter to remove the requirement that copies of bills and notices of public hearings be posted on a bulletin board and to require that electronic copies of bills and notice of any public hearing be published to the County Council website and that printed copies of bills be made available to the public and press and that bills receive required publication.

ORIGIN: Submitted by the Anne Arundel County Charter Revision Commission. Resolution No. 21-22, introduced by Councilmembers Pruski and Lacey passed unanimously July 5, 2022.

PRESENT PRACTICE: The County Charter requires that the public be notified of newly introduced bills and hearing dates via posting of copies on an official bulletin board in a public place. In addition, it specifies only passed legislation in referring to bills that require publication.

PROPOSED CHANGE: The amendment replaces the requirement for a physical location where copies are publicly posted and allows posting on the County website, with print copies available upon request. It also clarifies that bills will be published when required by law, eliminating the reference to passed legislation only.

ARGUMENTS FOR:

The amendment would expand public access to proposed bills and notices of public hearings, which would be available online 24/7, and could reduce printing and administrative costs.

ARGUMENTS AGAINST:

The change may adversely impact residents who are accustomed to the bulletin board and lack computer access or skills, particularly seniors.

A Vote FOR the charter amendment

would update requirements for public notice of bills and notices by removing the requirement that copies of bills and notices of public hearings be posted on a bulletin board, and would require them to be posted on the County Council website and that paper copies of bills be available for the public and the press. It would also clarify the requirement that all bills receive publication required by law, including before passage by the County Council.

□ A Vote AGAINST the charter amendment would continue to only require that copies of bills and notices of public hearings be posted on a bulletin board, with additional copies available to the

public and the press. It would also continue to only reference other publication of bills after passage by the County Council.

QUESTION E

To amend the Anne Arundel County Charter to clarify the differences between the two types of emergency ordinances allowed under the Charter and the legislative procedure that applies to each.

ORIGIN: Submitted by the Anne Arundel County Charter Revision Commission. Resolution No. 22-22 introduced by Councilmembers Pruski and Lacey passed unanimously July 5, 2022.

PRESENT PRACTICE: Most ordinances passed by County Councel take effect 45 days after they become law. The County Charter references two different types of emergency ordinances which take effect from the day they become law. One type is enacted at an emergency session of the Council; the other is regularly-introduced legislation that is declared by Council to be "an emergency ordinance necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, safety and welfare." Because this has caused confusion in the past, both the Charter Revision Commission and the County Council identified a need to clarify the language in the Charter.

PROPOSED CHANGE: The amendment clearly defines the two types of emergency ordinances that take effect the day they become law.

ARGUMENTS FOR:

The amendment will alleviate future confusion about the two types of emergency ordinances, and the legislative procedures that apply to them.

ARGUMENTS AGAINST:

None identified.

- □ A Vote FOR the charter amendment would clarify the language relating to the two types of emergency ordinances already described in the Charter and would clarify when the two types are declared to be emergency ordinances and when they are effective.
- A Vote AGAINST the charter amendment would retain the current language relating to the two types of emergency ordinances.





QUESTION F

To amend the Anne Arundel County Charter to allow the County Council to assign additional functions, duties, and personnel to the County Auditor that are related to the finances and financial affairs of the County.

ORIGIN: Submitted by the Anne Arundel County Charter Revision Commission. Resolution No. 23-22 introduced by Councilmembers Pruski and Lacey passed unanimously July 5, 2022.

PRESENT PRACTICE: The Charter authorizes County Council to assign additional functions, duties and personnel to the County Auditor as long as they are consistent with the duties of the office.

PROPOSED CHANGE: The amendment would require that any additional functions, duties and personnel assigned to the County Auditor be related directly to the finances and financial affairs of the County.

ARGUMENTS FOR:

The Charter requires that the County Auditor be a CPA with a knowledge of governmental accounting and five years of related experience. The amendment would align the responsibilities of the Auditor with their qualifications and ensure that the Auditor exclusively oversaw the finances and financial affairs of the County.

ARGUMENTS AGAINST:

The amendment would restrict a power granted to the Council by the Charter.

A Vote FOR the charter amendment

would approve amending language in the Charter to clarify that additional functions, duties, and personnel assigned to the County Auditor by the County Council must be related to finances and financial affairs of the County.

□ A Vote AGAINST the charter amendment would retain the current language that states that the additional functions, duties, and personnel assigned to the County Auditor by the County Council must be consistent with the County Auditor's functions, duties, and personnel under the Charter.

QUESTION G

To amend the Anne Arundel County Charter to change the name of the Charter Revision Commission to the Redistricting and Charter Revision Commission and to amend the date by which a decennial Redistricting and Charter Revision Commission must be appointed by the County Council.

ORIGIN: Submitted by the Anne Arundel County Charter Revision Commission. Resolution 24-22 introduced by Councilmembers Pruski and Lacey passed unanimously June 5, 2022.

PRESENT PRACTICE: As stipulated in the Charter, County Council appoints a Charter Revision Commission every ten years. The purpose of the Commission is to conduct a comprehensive study of the Charter based on new U.S. census data, recommend changes, and ensure geographical equity in the County's councilmanic districts. The Charter currently states that Commissioners are to be appointed after publication of the U.S. decennial census. Because the release of the census data was delayed in 2020, the Commissioners were under time constraints to complete the redistricting process and had to extend their meeting schedule through May 2022.

PROPOSED CHANGE: The amendment changes the name to the Redistricting and Charter Revision Commission and revises the date of appointment to the first day of County Council's annual legislative session in the year of a U.S. census.

ARGUMENTS FOR:

Review of the Councilmanic districts is a major responsibility and the new name accurately reflects the full scope of the Commission's duties. Appointment of the Commissioners at the beginning of the annual legislative session will ensure the Commission has adequate time to hear from the public and complete their duties on schedule.

ARGUMENTS AGAINST:

None identified.

□ A Vote FOR the charter amendment would change the name of the Charter Revision Commission to the Redistricting and Charter Revision Commission. It would also change the date of appointment pf the Commission from at or before the first day of the annual legislative session of the County Council after publication of the data from the United States decennial census to the first day of the annual legislation session of the County Council in the year of each United States decennial census.

□ A Vote AGAINST the charter amendment would retain the name of the Charter Revision Commission and would retain the date of appointment of the Commission as at or before the first day of the annual legislative session of the County Council after publication of the data from the United States decennial census.

QUESTION H

To amend the Anne Arundel County Charter to be gender neutral consistent with changes recommended based on a review by the County Attorney.

ORIGIN: Submitted by the Anne Arundel Charter Revision Commission. Resolution No. 30-22 introduced by Councilmembers Pruski and Lacey passed unanimously on July 18, 2022.

PRESENT PRACTICE: Adopted in 1964, the County Charter is written according to the norms of its time and contains masculine or feminine references throughout.

PROPOSED CHANGE: The amendment would change singularly masculine or feminine references in the Charter to gender neutral in accordance with the recommendations of the County Attorney.

ARGUMENTS FOR:

This amendment would make the language of the Charter more inclusive and reflective of current practice.

ARGUMENTS AGAINST:

None identified.

- A Vote FOR the amendment would replace all singularly masculine or feminine references in the Charter to gender neutral references as recommended based on a review of the Charter by the County Attorney.
- □ A Vote AGAINST the amendment would retain all singularly masculine or feminine references in the Charter.


