January 14th Town/City Council Candidate Forum Successful

The MCGOP-sponsored non-partisan Council Candidate Forum on Saturday, January 14th turned out to be quite a success. The room was packed with voters with over 60 in attendance. Candidates for the city and town councils of Bloomington and Normal gave brief presentations in relation to their candidacy. All six candidates for the Town of Normal were present. Candidates from Bloomington Ward 1, Ward 2, Ward 4, Ward 6, and Ward 8 were present and spoke. Ward 1, Ward 2, and Ward 8 are unopposed. Ward 4 and Ward 6 are contested. Two candidates, Cody Hendricks, Ward 6 and John Dananberger, Ward 4, canceled at the last minute and failed to attend. Jordon Baker, Ward 6 and Steven Nalefski, Ward 4 were in attendance. It is surmised that attendance consisted of approximately 80% Republicans and 20% Democrats – not unexpected given that this was an MCGOP-sponsored event.

The event provided an opportunity to everyone to see what issues are and how the candidates agreed and disagreed on them. According to BLNNEWS editor Diane Benjamin, "There is a stark difference between the three (Mayor) Koos wants to see



elected as reliable YES votes, and the three who know they answer to the taxpayers."

During a discussion about debt of the Town of Normal, conservative candidate Karl Sila noted something to the effect that "It's nice Normal has a plan, but the real question is why a town of 50,000 people is \$100,000,000 debt." That's a good question, one that clearly had the attention of conservative candidates Stan Nord, who is seeking his second term on the council, and Mark Tiritilli who is seeking his fist. Also in attendance were Kathleen Lorenz who is seeking a third term on the council, Karyn Smith has filed for second term, and newcomer Andy Byars.

There are a host of issues that concern voters, but especially parents. Of course, out-of-control school district spending and real estate tax increases are also part of the equation.

Jonathan Butcher is the Will Skillman Fellow in Education at The Heritage Foundation. He is the author of Splintered: Critical Race Theory and the Progressive War on Truth (Bombardier Books, April 2022). He co-edited and wrote chapters in The Critical Classroom (The Heritage Foundation, 2022), discussing the racial prejudice that comes from the application of critical race theory in K-12 schools. In 2021, South Carolina Gov. Henry McMaster nominated Jonathan to serve on the board of the South Carolina Public Charter School District, a statewide charter school authorizer. He has researched and testified on education policy around the U.S. Enjoy the latest updates from the front line as Education Specialist Jonathan Butcher of the Heritage Foundation speaks on the issue of "Critical Race Theory" as it impacts our schools.

Featured Recipe – Sugar Cookies (Lofthouse style)



SERVES: 2 dozen	PREP TIME: 4 ½ hours	COOK TIME: 8 minutes
-----------------	----------------------	----------------------

INGREDIENTS			
Cookie dough:	Frosting:		
1 cup stick butter, softened	½ cup stick butter, softened		
1 cup heavy cream, room temp	½ cup solid vegetable shortening		
1 cup sugar	1 teaspoon vanilla extract		
2 teaspoons vanilla	4 cups sifted powdered sugar		
2 eggs, room temp	2 Tablespoons milk		
4 teaspoons baking powder			
4 cups flour			

DIRECTIONS

FOR THE COOKIES: Cream the butter until light and fluffy, about 3 minutes. Add the heavy cream, sugar, vanilla & eggs. Mix until combined. Add the baking powder and flour and mix well.

Shape the dough into a circle/ball & wrap in saran wrap. Cool in the fridge overnight or for several hours.

Pre-heat your oven to 350 degrees Fahrenheit. Roll out the dough on a floured surface. (I prefer them nice & thick about 1/2" but anywhere between 1/4" -1/2" is good.) Use a 3"- 3 1/2" circle cookie cutter. Place circles on a parchment lined cookie sheet. (These cookies spread a little while baking, so they don't do well when cut into other shapes)

Bake for 8-10 minutes (depending on the size of your circle) or until bottoms are a very light brown. Check at 8 minutes & DO NOT overcook or they will be dry. Take them out right when they are done and don't look wet on top.

For the Frosting: In a large bowl, cream butter and shortening with electric mixer. Add vanilla. Gradually add sugar, one cup at a time, beating well on medium speed. Scrape sides and bottom of bowl often. When all sugar has been mixed in, frosting will appear dry. Add milk and beat at medium speed until light and fluffy. *

Keep bowl covered with damp cloth until ready to use. For best results, keep icing bowl in refrigerator when not in use.

Once cookies are cool use piping bag, spatula, or knife to frost cookies.

*For frosting, if it is still too dry add a splash of milk until it is at the consistency you want. If it is too wet, then add spoonful of powdered sugar until you're happy with the consistency.
