Former member of Illinois House of Representatives Jeanne Ives (44<sup>th</sup> District, 2013-2018) gave a super-charged talk to about 60 members of McLean County Republicans in Bloomington on August 22nd. Her focus was on the activities of the Democrat party in Illinois and what Republicans can do to turn the state red. She rallied the troops to take the next crucial steps in the process.

Ives pointed out how radical Illinois Democrats have become and how this state has become "crazy," even in relation to other liberal-progressive states such as New York and California. She described the Democrat modus operandi by stating, "This is the place where bad ideas become law, where the legislature takes away your rights and forces you to go to court to take them back."

She pointed out that only by informing the voters about what's *really* happening can Republicans expect to make a change.

"We win by informing people about what's going on. Democrats never tell the whole story. For instance, they tell you that they support schools but will not tell you that they also support multi-gender bathrooms," she noted. "The better informed the public, the better we will do in future elections." She went on to say, "Politics matters! We are here because we care about our community and our nation... We have to win elections. We have an important mission."

Ms. Ives then pointed out specific cases where Democrats in Illinois have worked to usurp the rights of the people. She pointed out SB 1909 – the Deceptive Practices Act that operates against pro-life pregnancy centers. "This bill is not needed and is not even constitutional." She spoke about the Doxing Act (HB 2954) recently passed into law. This "incredibly aggressive bill" is designed to mute freedom of speech. "No other state has such a law." Ives also pointed out the BIPA (Biometric Information Privacy Act) and noted that it, too, needs to be changed. She pointed out that the SAFE-T Act, with its no-cash bail, is another radical piece of legislation that no other state has. Ultimately, Ives said she must conclude that "Illinois is not a moderate state." She pointed out that Rep. Lance Yednock, a Democrat (76<sup>th</sup> District, Ottawa), is "leaving the Illinois legislature because he sees the Democrat Party as being too radicle."

During a Q&A session, Jeanne pointed out that the only way Republicans will make a difference in Illinois is by the hard work of precinct committee persons, block captains, and interested others. "We must call, email, knock, and text" to let conservative and persuadable voters know what's going on and get out the vote. "We must make it easy to vote. We must turn out the voters. We must encourage citizens to sign up for permanent vote-by-mail and promote early voting. We must ask for their vote." At the same time, she pointed out that we must build personal networks and get our conservative friends to vote and for them to encourage their conservative friends to vote. Ives was featured as a special speaker event for new and potential dues-paying members of the MCGOP.

## McLean GOP Leaders Attend SURUS Summit

Five leaders from the McLean County Republicans attended a conference sponsored by SURUS Illinois on August 16th. SURUS Illinois is a political operative of entrepreneurs, former candidates, political staffers, and passionate conservatives who envision an Illinois in which a motivated and galvanized citizenry is the most potent political force. Their stated mission is to turn Illinois Red. They believe they can do so by reaching a "victory number" of 562,399 votes. The hope is to develop a healthy political ecosystem that works daily to change the hearts and minds of pursuable voters.

Attending on behalf of the McLean County Republicans were Dennis Grundler, Chair; Joanne Knipmeyer, Project Manager; Connie Beard, Fundraising Manager; Carl Wenning, Communications Manager; and Kim Miller, Election Operations Manager. Each individual is charged with filing particular aspects of the SURUS battle plan.

According to Election Operations Chair Kim Miller, "I am working with a dedicated committee, and we are actively working to find conservative precinct committeemen and candidates to run for the local county board elections and also people to run for statewide offices. Our PCs are meeting monthly and gaining momentum to achieve our county victory number of 6,654." The victory number is the additional votes needed to turn Illinois Red.

During the morning session, Barrett Davies, co-founder of SURUS, encouraged and challenged participants. He indicated that conservatives must all work together on the SURUS battle plan. He said it is possible to return Illinois to its conservative roots by doing so. Former gubernatorial candidate Jesse Sullivan from Petersburg also spoke. He challenged attendees to remember why we are involved in politics in Illinois and urged us not to compromise on our personal beliefs.

The afternoon consisted of breakout sessions where participants were segregated by party assignment. "In the breakout session I attended," noted Miller, "I gained valuable ideas on effectively recruiting candidates from political veteran Dan Patlak. Dan serves with Illinois Policy Institute. I am looking forward to implementing the ideas Dan shared."

"One of the speakers said that many people choose to get involved with politics when policy intersects with their personal lives. I know that was true for me," said Miller. "For most of my life, I voted conservatively but was never personally involved beyond that. When Illinois legalized full-term abortion, policy intersected with my life, and I could no longer remain silent." Miller has been working closely with McLean County Republicans for over a year. She noted, "I have met many wonderful like-minded people, and we believe that the direction of Illinois can be turned around, but it will take all of us working together."

Miller continued, "I want the voters of McLean County to know that I have found that there are very diverse strong opinions among Republicans, but we have key things we generally agree on. Republicans believe in the Constitution. Freedom of religion and a belief in God is crucial for a

strong nation. The right to bear arms is non-negotiable. We believe in the sanctity of all human life. Republicans support laws and policies that support strong traditional family values. We believe capitalism creates a strong economy. We want lower taxes. We want less federal control because we believe most decisions affecting our lives should be made at the local level. We believe in a strong military. We also welcome and believe in legal immigration."

The SURUS Summit was held in Petersburg, Illinois.

# **Consider Becoming a Precinct Committeeperson**

Precinct Committeepersons (PCs) are the backbone of any political party. Precinct Committeepersons impact every level of government, from local school boards to who sleeps in the White House. McLean County is in great need of grass-roots political leaders who can serve in this capacity. These individuals should not be confused with election judges or poll watchers, for which there is also a great need to ensure election integrity.

Each precinct constitutes a legislative district with approximately the same number of voters. Earlier this year, there were 121 precincts in McLean County, and only 70 Republican precinct chairperson positions were filled, or just over 57%. With the 20 new precincts established by the McLean County Board earlier this year due to population growth and redistribution, the number of precincts is now 141. With 70 existing PCs, only 47% of all 141 Republican precincts now have chairpersons.

The MCGOP Election Operations team is busy gearing up for the next election cycle and is working diligently to get PC in all precincts, "It is important we have volunteers willing to join us," according to MCGOP-SURUS Project Manager Joanne Knipmeyer. She continued, "We need precinct committeepersons and also block captains. Block captains are volunteers who can assist their precinct committeeman by helping communicate with their neighbors about the upcoming election."

Knipmeyer further noted, "For those desiring our conservative values to remain and our County Board to be fiscally responsible, we need your help. Every precinct committeeman, every volunteer, and every vote will matter in this upcoming election." McLean County Republicans are happy to connect you so you can volunteer.







Becoming a precinct committeeperson is one of the most fulfilling methods to contribute to the Republican Party. These dedicated volunteers are the vital link between the party and Republican voters within their local community. Through their diligent efforts, they possess the potential to sway the outcome of closely contested elections. Additionally, in cases where no committeeperson currently serves in a precinct, they may receive an appointment by the party's Chairman.

The responsibilities of precinct committeepersons span a broad spectrum, encompassing tasks such as aiding Republican candidates in securing petition signatures and actively participating in voter mobilization during the general election. The role of a precinct committeeperson holds significant influence.

The selection of precinct committeepersons occurs biennially during the primary election. The prerequisites are straightforward: committeepersons must be U.S. citizens, aged 18 or older, and registered voters within the respective precinct. Aspiring candidates for committeeperson positions must complete and submit a statement of candidacy, a loyalty oath, and a petition before the stipulated deadline for the primary election.

People were open to joining various membership categories with defined benefits packages.



# Featured Recipe - BAKLAVA

(Yields: 48 wedges; Total Time: 1 hour)

Editor's note: This is my recipe for Baklava. It has gone through many refinements over the years. I have perfected this recipe following my first encounter with Baklava over 50 years ago. The recipe makes the best Baklava I have ever had, including a halfcentury of sampling Baklava in Europe and the Middle East, where I have traveled 15 times. [CJW, Communications Mgr.]

#### INGREDIENTS

Pastry:	Honey Syrup:	
½ lb. of unsalted butter	1 lemon	
1 lb. phyllo sheets	1 c. granulated sugar	
10 oz. chopped walnuts	1 c. water	
6 oz. chopped almonds	2 two-inch pieces of stick cinnamon	
½ c. granulated sugar	5-7 whole cloves	
¾ tsp. ground cinnamon	1/2-3/4 c. honey (to taste	
1/8 tsp. ground clove		

#### DIRECTIONS

Pastry:

Mix the walnuts, almonds, sugar, cinnamon, and clove in a small bowl. Brush a 9" x 13" rimmed cookie sheet with some ted butter. Place 3-4 phyllo sheets on the cookie sheet. Brush with butter and top with the nut mixture. Top with 2-3 more sheets of phyllo, brush with butter, and top with the nut mixture. Continue until the nut mixture is used up, reserving 3-4 sheets of phyllo for the top. Butter the top layer. Cut the top layers of the phyllo with a sharp knife, producing about 24 diamonds. Bake at 325 degrees Fahrenheit for 50 minutes or until the top layer turns crispy and golden brown. Remove from the oven and, with a sharp knife, cut through the remaining layers of the pastry, using the top layer as a guide. Immediately pour the cool syrup over the pastry, allowing both to continue cooling. Cover and let stand overnight.

Honey Syrup: Remove the thin yellow skin from the lemon and set aside. Squeeze 1½ teaspoons of lemon juice from the lemon and set aside. Combine the lemon peel, sugar, water, cinnamon sticks, and cloves in a heavy saucepan. Bring to a

> boil, lower the heat to a simmer, and continue cooking without stirring for 25 minutes. Remove from heat. Stir in honey and lemon juice. Set aside to cool.
