IV. Other Business

Bentonne Snay & Jane Moscowitz

- Update on Dems Messaging Task Force and DEC Communications Committee
 - The task force has met every other Saturday and a few times in between; the members have attended trainings on messaging conducted by several groups; we encourage everyone to support Democratic candidates early; we'll have some tangibles by mid-March, which will be shared via our social media
- Florida Legislative Update and Action Needed
 - There is a slew of pending legislation all of which is likely to pass which trample on Democratic values; we need to contact our Republican representatives
 - Bills to keep discussions about racism out of school; anti-solar provisions; to allow health care providers to not pay for services they disagree with on moral grounds; anti-speech restrictions on congregating around police activity; to prohibit local minimum wage ordinances; no mentioning of gender in public schools; bills to prohibit substantive constitutional amendments; 15 week prohibition on abortion; voter suppression measures including establishing voter police and complicating voter by mail registration
- V. Speaker Presentations and Q & A Intros & Moderation by Jane Moscowitz
 - Jane A Torres, Blue Wave Coalition Hispanic Outreach Team Leader and Democratic Messaging Task
 Force Co-Leader
 - 68.7% of Miami-Dade voters did not vote in the 2020 election; if only 2.5% of MDC Hispanic Dems voted we would have retained both House seats
 - Jane's groups designed a questionnaire to drill down on (1) local and national issues of importance; (2) reasons for non-voting; (3) what would encourage Dem participation in 2022
 - Selected two precincts in each congressional district to distribute the questionnaire, which was distributed last Summer; the precincts were selected for economic diversity
 - The most important local issue was cost of housing, education, and safety
 - The most important national issue was access to health care, climate change, and immigration far beyond

- 46% of respondents stated they did not vote although it appears that many more did not vote
- Actionable Messaging Takeaways:
 - 1. Hispanics believe in the American Dream. We need to stress Democrats policies which encourage self-reliance and economic empowerment
 - 2. Reclaim Freedom Family, Fairness, Future, Freedom; we need to emphasize secure voting, fair pay for work, clean water and air, access to quality healthcare, and that Democrats are the party of working families, but using the four "F" themes
- **Dr Eduardo Gamarra**, FIU Professor of Politics and International Relations and Director of the Latino Public Opinion Forum
 - Dr. Gamarra shared the results of his multi-year polling-based studies to discern the political attitudes and political behavior of South Florida Hispanic groups
 - Historically US policy towards Cuba drove Cuban voters' decision-making; there was a shift in 2008 and a significant downward trend in that correlation by 2016; by 2016 only 8% of Cuban origin respondents in 2016 stated that was a strong fact; the Republicans realized with Romney's defeat in 2012 that they needed to broaden their messaging beyond foreign policy to retain the Hispanic vote; in 2017 there was a rapid rise in the correlation between U.S. policy towards Cuba and voting behavior; this coincides with Trumpism
 - In 2016 and beyond the same question was asked of Colombians, Venezuelans,
 Nicaraguans, and Puerto Ricans; 60% of Venezuelans stated US policy has a significant impact on they decide to vote
 - The recent uprisings in Cuba have resulted in Cuban voters solidifying their voting preferences based on US policy towards Cuba
 - Colombian attitudes mirror those of the Cuban community; the Colombian electorate is growing more conservative; more Colombians voted for Trump than Venezuelans, almost along the same lines as Cuban Americans
 - Margins are very slim in Miami-Dade County and Florida. Take away: Cuban American voters cannot be ignored; the Puerto Rican vote presents a real opportunity for Democrats in Florida, though more voted for Trump than expected, but they are not committed Republicans
