IMPACT REPORT

THANKS TO YOUR SUPPORT, we have been able to advocate for **policies** that protect our communities and ecosystems, offer **free resources** to farmers about **organic food and farming**, host **educational workshops**, share resources and information in **3 languages**, install **native plants** and **pollinator habitats**, develop a **5 year strategic plan**, table at many **community events**, and expand our network of those who want to build a world free from reliance on toxic pesticides. Read on for more details on the projects that made this year great!



IN 2025, our **Healthy Food and Farms** program supported historically underserved producers in arid Eastern Oregon by conducting habitat assessments, developing customized plans, and completing on-the-ground habitat installations in challenging Great Basin conditions. The project focused on reducing barriers for Tribal producers, beginning farmers, and small-scale landowners. These sites used non-herbicide site preparation and maintenance methods improving the habitat for pollinators and other beneficial insects in landscapes with limited water and high invasive pressure.

Additionally, HFF created a two-part webinar series on Organic Wild Crop Harvest Certification, supporting land management professionals and individuals in becoming certified wild crop harvesters. These trainings equipped participants to pursue certification and promoted sustainable harvesting practices.



The **Healthy People and Communities** program produced 26 episodes of our Spanish-language radio show “Raíces Resilientes: Voces del Campo” (Resilient Roots: Voices from the fields), in 2025, covering topics like pesticide exposure, climate impacts and risks, environmental health, and workers rights.

HPC also continued to expand outreach and education efforts around nitrate contamination in groundwater. This initiative supported underserved rural families through in-person, culturally responsive education and testing support. We hosted conversations with local health authorities and experts on the Radio Show and offered support interpreting the Mayam Mam language to the Guatemalan community present at events.



NCAP's **Healthy Wildlife and Water** program advanced pesticide pollution prevention across Washington's Columbia River Basin through the Clean, Drain, Dry (CDD) campaign, an effort aimed at stopping the spread of aquatic invasive species and reducing reliance on toxic treatments like copper-based pesticides. Outreach strengthened awareness of aquatic invasive species prevention and non-toxic stewardship practices.

HWW also opposed SB 5915 this year, a bill that would have extended a hazardous chemical tax exemption, as well as successfully advocating for the passage of SB 5972, which bans the use of residential neonicotinoids, essential for reducing pesticide drift and runoff and protecting freshwater ecosystems. Additionally, NCAP made significant progress promoting farmworker health across Central Washington in 2025. Through health fairs and active partnerships with regional clinics, NCAP directly engaged over 220 community members and distributed materials focused on recognizing and preventing pesticide exposure.

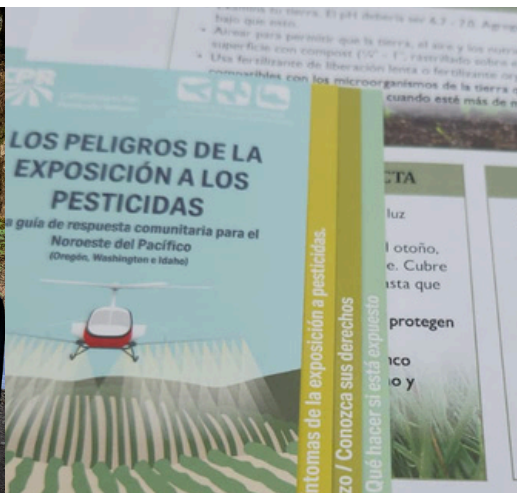
