#### Zone 0

Upon the recommendation of our <u>trees committee</u>, our representatives voted to join a Defensible Space Working Group led by Nurit Katz and Stephanie Landregan of UCLA to address <u>CAL FIRE's approach to Zone 0</u> (the first 5 feet <u>from your home</u>) in very high fire hazard severity zones, which is raising a range of concerns for people in Los Angeles, and endorse Dr Travis Longcore's proposed revisions to the draft regulations based on <u>this letter</u>. (Dr Longcore is also the president of the <u>Bel Air-Beverly Crest Neighborhood Council</u>.)

## Clean energy taking a hit...

Clean energy and the environment are taking hits left and right, and not just at the federal level through President Trump's "Big Beautiful Bill," which will end federal support for solar and wind power as well as electric vehicle tax credits. AB 306, which prevents cities and the state from updating building standards affecting residences until 2031, was also passed recently. Apparently, Assembly Speaker Robert Rivas, who championed the bill, cited journalist Ezra Klein's book Abundance, which discusses the need to eliminate regulations in order to promote housing, as a source of inspiration. # ...including South Coast AQMD board vote to continue using gas

The South Coast AQMD board voted to reject an already significantly weakened plan to phase out gas water heaters and furnaces. Learn more <a href="here">here</a>. And learn about the Trump administration's role <a href="here">here</a>.

The gas industry promoted a huge misinformation campaign, so the AQMD published this fact sheet. We do not yet know what effect this will have on the *Go Zero* electrification incentive program we discussed in March, which

would have been funded by these rules. We are told this effort will not be revisited by the board this year.

# Big changes coming to CEQA

On a related note, Governor Newsom signed into law two controversial bills significantly weakening CEQA, California's landmark law designed to protect the environment. The bills focus on providing CEQA exemptions for infill development in California's urban areas, but questions remain about exactly how far these exemptions go and what they risk overlooking. Proponents argue that these changes are needed to address California's housing crisis and promote more sustainable, denser communities. However, the broader exemptions for advanced manufacturing facilities and the lack of protections for sensitive and endangered species worry a coalition of environmental groups in the state.
