

ABOUT THIS VOTER GUIDE

PRIMARY DAY IS JUNE 28

New Kings Democrats ("NKD") developed this voter guide to help inform Brooklynites about candidates who may be on their ballot in the June Democratic Primary, including candidates for Governor and Lieutenant Governor, for State Assembly seats in Brooklyn, and for the Brooklyn Democratic Party positions State Committee Member/District Leader.

This guide is for the races in the June 28, 2022 Primary. It does not cover County Committee candidates who are on the primary ballot — visit this page from RepYourBlock for information on those races.

The August Primary will include races for Federal Congress and State Senate and is not covered in this guide.

ABOUT NEW KINGS DEMOCRATS

NKD is a progressive, grassroots political organization committed to bringing transparency, accountability, and inclusionary democracy to the Brooklyn Democratic Party. Founded by veterans of the Obama campaign, it is a borough-wide political organization that helps people seeking to become more engaged in local politics, and hopes to nurture a new generation of elected Brooklyn Democratic leaders.

As of the date of publication, NKD has endorsed candidates in some of these races, and will explain why within this document.

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HOW TO VOTE

CONFIRM YOUR ELIGIBILITY AND WHERE TO VOTE

You must be registered as a Democrat to vote in the June 28 Democratic primary. Confirm if you are registered to vote and your party affiliation, if any, at www.nycvotersearch.com. If you are registered to vote, results will include your Assembly District and Election District. You can confirm your polling location by clicking "Poll Site Information" in the top-right corner of the screen. Go to findmypollsite. vote.nyc to view a sample ballot and your poll site locations and hours.

In Brooklyn, where many races will be won by Democrats, the Primary elections (plural!) on June 28 and August 23 are crucial elections for state and federal positions – so it is very important that you are registered as a Democrat and vote both times.

Important dates for primary election voters

- June 3 deadline to <u>register to vote</u> in the Primary Election
- June 13 deadline to request an <u>absentee ballot</u> for Primary Election
- June 18 early voting begins
- June 28 Primary Election and last day to postmark the primary election ballot, or deliver to Brooklyn Board of Elections (345 Adams Street) or your local polling site

BROOKLYN CAN'T WAIT

A PLAN FOR REFORM



Brooklyn Can't Wait is a partnership between organizations and candidates, all of which have agreed to this pledge to reform the Brooklyn Democratic Party, which is letting everyday Brooklynites down with its insider politics and lack of action to fight back against Republicans. Brooklyn Can't Wait was initiated as a project of New Kings Democrats and is a volunteer-powered campaign dedicated to electing new leadership in our local Party who will show up for all Brooklyn Democrats – not just Party insiders.

District Leaders, referred to as State Committee Members on the ballot, can change the Brooklyn Democratic Party – and every leader is up for election in June 2022. Brooklyn Can't Wait and the partner clubs behind it – New Kings Democrats, Lambda Independent Democrats, and Brooklyn Young Democrats – are

supporting <u>candidates</u> who are engaged, accessible, and committed to change. Together, we can create a Kings County Democratic Party that respects, empowers, and includes all Brooklynites.

What's wrong with the current Party leadership?

- Judges are chosen in backroom deals
- Party insiders shut out volunteers

The Brooklyn Can't Wait slate includes candidates from across Brooklyn who are committed to making the Brooklyn Democratic Party more accessible, accountable, and transparent. In the pages that follow, candidates endorsed by Brooklyn Can't Wait will be noted as such.

THE RACE FOR GOVERNOR

PRIMARY DAY: JUNE 28

In New York State, we elect Governors in the general election – but because Democrats typically win, the Democratic Party primary (the one on June 28) is the most important time to vote in this race.

Governor is the highest state office in New York and the head of the executive branch. The Governor is popularly elected to a four-year term. In the case of current New York State Governor Kathy Hochul, she assumed office after Andrew Cuomo <u>resigned</u> following multiple allegations of sexual harassment.

The primary responsibilities of the Governor are to enforce state laws, approve or veto bills passed by the legislature, convene the legislature, and grant pardons. Less officially, the Governor sets the tone for the state leadership's priorities.

In 2022, Democrats control the three offices of Governor, Secretary of State, and Attorney General. Democrats also control the Assembly and the Senate – the two houses of the state legislature. But because Democrats are typically in control, there is a spectrum of how progressive – or not – Democrats can be.

New York State is at a crossroads: The state legislature failed to pass reforms regarding public power and tenant protections, to name a few, in a state with rising inequality in healthcare, housing, safety, and more. New York is ready for progressive leadership, and the Governor's race is an important time to evaluate what you want to see out of someone holding this incredibly important position.

THE CANDIDATES FOR GOVERNOR

In the order in which they will appear on the ballot

TOM SUOZZI

CANDIDATE 1 OF 3

About the candidate: Tom Suozzi is a moderate Democrat. He is currently the U.S. representative for New York's 3rd district, which covers parts of Long Island and Queens, after first being elected in 2016. Previously, Rep. Suozzi was the county executive of Nassau County from 2002 and 2009, before which he was mayor of Long Island's Glen Cove. He previously ran unsuccessfully for governor against Eliot Spitzer in 2006.



What stands out about his platform: Not much. Rep. Suozzi's website does not outline his platform for the role of Governor and he did not respond to New Kings Democrats' invitation to participate in the endorsement process. He calls himself a "common sense Democrat." He has proposed increasing judges' power to jail individuals accused of low-level crimes, and programs to provide more funding to police. He has criticized Governor Hochul's rollbacks of bail reform as not going far enough (implying that he would favor more pretrial incarceration).

Rep. Suozzi is running alongside Diana Reyna, who is running for Lieutenant Governor.

THE CANDIDATES FOR GOVERNOR, continued

In the order in which they will appear on the ballot

KATHY HOCHUL, INCUMBENT

CANDIDATE 2 OF 3

About the candidate: Kathy Hochul is the current governor of New York State. She was elected as the Lieutenant Governor in 2014 and again in 2018, and ascended to the role of Governor in 2021 when Andrew Cuomo resigned. She is the state's first female governor. Prior to her tenure as Lieutenant Governor, Governor Hochul was a Congress Member, serving less than one term after winning a special election.



As Governor, Hochul approved a deal to have taxpayers finance \$850 million for a new Buffalo Bills stadium but committed just \$18.2 million in funding for the Gun Involved Violence Elimination initiative. She has promised to protect abortion rights and is prioritizing investing in schools and keeping communities safe.

Governor Hochul selected former State Senator Brian Benjamin as her Lieutenant Governor. On April 12, he resigned after being indicted on federal charges of bribery, conspiracy to commit wire fraud, and falsification of records, all of which allegedly took place while he was a State Senator, before joining the Governor in office. Governor Hochul then selected Congress Member Antonio Delgado to serve as Benjamin's replacement, abandoning his Democratic position in a key swing district. He is now running for Lieutenant Governor alongside Hochul in this primary.

What stands out about her platform: Governor Hochul has made women's rights a central feature of her platform.

JUMAANE WILLIAMS

CANDIDATE 3 OF 3

About the candidate: Jumaane Williams is the current Public Advocate for the City of New York and has been in the role since 2019, previously serving in the New York City Council in Brooklyn's 45th District from 2009-2019. Williams is a first-generation Brooklynite of Grenadian heritage. He has Tourette Syndrome and ADHD, and is an advocate for disability rights.

In 2018, Public Advocate Williams ran unsuccessfully for Lieutenant Governor, but captured much of the vote. His progressive campaign received more votes than any candidate of color in a statewide primary in history, receiving 47% of the vote. He was endorsed by U.S. Senator Bernie Sanders, *The New York Times*, and many grassroots organizations and leaders across the state.



Public Advocate Williams' running mate is Ana María Archila, who is running for Lieutenant Governor.

New Kings Democrats has endorsed Jumaane Williams in this race.

What stands out about his platform: Public Advocate Jumaane Williams believes in transformational change. New York State is suffering under the status quo, and Jumaane Williams is the only candidate who will bring real, progressive change. He will capitalize upon his citywide leadership role to immediately jump into action, and has convened a powerful breadth of diverse endorsers who will ensure that Williams is responsive to New Yorkers most in need. Jumaane is the candidate that won't cater to the billionaires who doubled their wealth during the pandemic while families and children went hungry. Instead, he will ensure housing and healthcare for all, support legislation that makes for a truly environmentally sustainable New York State, and will invest in young people and their futures.

THE RACE FOR LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR

PRIMARY DAY: JUNE 28

The Lieutenant Governor of New York is the second-highest ranking official in the state. It is a four-year term. The Lieutenant Governor is the president of the State Senate, and is responsible for serving as acting governor when the Governor is out of state or unable to perform their duties. The Lieutenant Governor becomes Governor in the event of the Governor's death, resignation, or removal from office due to impeachment.

With the history of problematic tenures of New York Governors, the Lieutenant Governor's race is keenly important – especially following the recent indictment of Kathy Hochul's first Lieutenant Governor, Brian Benjamin.

While some candidates have co-endorsed each other and are running together, they technically do not run as a ticket in New York State.

THE CANDIDATES FOR LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR

In the order in which they will appear on the ballot

ANA MARIA ARCHILA

CANDIDATE 1 OF 3

About the candidate: Ana María Archila co-founded and led several grassroots progressive organizations, including Make the Road New York and the Center for Popular Democracy. She has dedicated her life to fighting for the rights and dignity of working people, and has been a leader in New York and nationally in the fight for immigrant rights, worker justice, LGBTQ+ rights, and women's rights, for over two decades.

Remember when a woman confronted former Arizona Senator Jeff Flake just before the Senate Judiciary Committee's vote for Supreme Court then-nominee Brett Kavanagh, forcing Senators to reckon with their responsibility for allowing someone credibly accused of sexual assault to ascend to the Court? That woman was Ana María.



New Kings Democrats has endorsed Ana María Archila in this race.

What stands out about her platform: Ms. Archila has specific, focused ideas for transforming New York State to support working people, immigrant families, rural communities, and more. She is focused on housing, healthcare, and childcare, among other issues, and is approaching them as an organizer and activist. If elected, she'll be the first Latina and first queer person to hold the office, and will center the experiences of people who have been relegated to the margins. She wants the Lieutenant Governor's office to set an example of accountability.

Ms. Archila is running alongside Public Advocate Jumaane Williams.

DIANA REYNA

CANDIDATE 2 OF 3

About the candidate: Diana Reyna is a first-generation Dominican American, born and raised in Williamsburg, Brooklyn. Diana Reyna was formerly Brooklyn Deputy Borough President from 2014-2017 under then-Borough President Eric Adams. She served in the New York City Council representing Bushwick, Williamsburg, and Ridgewood. From 2000-2005, she was the female District Leader for Brooklyn's Assembly District 53. As of May 2022, Ms. Reyna owes \$138,658 to the New York City Campaign Finance Board due to outstanding repayments from her third City Council campaign in 2009.



What stands out about her platform: If elected, Ms. Reyna's top three priorities would be: fighting crime, lowering taxes, and helping children in troubled schools. While Ms. Reyna previously held fairly progressive views on topics like community engagement and development, her campaign views are more aligned with those of centrist Representative Suozzi, alongside whom she is running.

ANTONIO DELGADO

CANDIDATE 3 OF 3

About the candidate: Antonio Delgado was sworn in as Lieutenant Governor on May 25, 2022, after Governor Hochul's previous pick was indicted on corruption charges. He is a native New Yorker and a Harvard-educated lawyer. Mr. Delgado was elected to Congress as a Democrat in 2018 in the Hudson Valley. In becoming Lieutenant Governor, he leaves an open seat in Congress in a district that is known as a swing seat and had been held by a Republican until 2018. He voted to protect the right to an abortion even if the Supreme Court overturns Roe v. Wade.



What stands out about his platform: We don't know. Mr. Delgado's website does not include information about his vision or priorities for the role, and he did not participate in New Kings Democrats' endorsement process.

Mr. Delgado is running alongside Governor Hochul.

THE RACES FOR STATE ASSEMBLY

PRIMARY DAY: JUNE 28

The New York State Legislature is composed of two houses: the Senate and the Assembly. The Assembly is considered the lower chamber of the Legislature and currently has 150 seats. Each seat is up for election every two years. Members of the Assembly are responsible for drafting laws and establishing the state budget in conjunction with the Governor.

While Democrats control the Assembly (they currently hold 106 seats), that grasp is tenuous, and the Assembly failed to deliver on key progressive legislation this session. The time is right to elect forward-thinking Assembly Members who are responsive to the needs of the most vulnerable in their communities and who will ensure New York becomes a nation leader for climate activism.

This guide does not cover all 150 Assembly seats or their races. Rather, we have chosen to highlight specific races that will play a key role in both making the Assembly more progressive while also lifting up the Brooklyn Can't Wait campaign and candidates and reform-oriented Governor and Lieutenant Governor candidates.



EMILY GALLAGHER, INCUMBENT

CANDIDATE 1 OF 2



About the candidate: Assembly Member Emily Gallagher is in her first term in the Assembly and has already accomplished a lot: She helped pass a historic budget that raised taxes on the wealthy to secure the biggest state investment in public education in generations, and secured more than \$115 million for local parks and safe streets in North Brooklyn. Assembly Member Gallagher has delivered billions of dollars in relief to tenants, workers, and small business, and has centered working people in everything she does – as she has always been a laborer and organizer herself. In every topic, she is thoughtful and data-driven about environmental externalities, backing up her commitment to halting climate change with focused and timely legislation to help bring our state into the future in a responsible way.

New Kings Democrats has endorsed Emily Gallagher in this race.

What stands out about her platform: Assembly Member Gallagher is the clear progressive, unifying candidate in this race. She is driven by a simple but powerful mission: to create a New York where everyone has what they need to thrive. She has already introduced legislation – and will continue to do so – to protect workers, cut greenhouse gas emissions, audit tax giveaways to developers, improve pedestrian safety, reform prison oversight, and support neighbors struggling with substance use disorder. She embodies what we think of when we think of a kind, hard-working, boots-on-the-ground organizer, and she is the leader North Brooklyn needs - and that Brooklyn needs at the state level.

PADDY O'SULLIVAN

CANDIDATE 2 OF 2



About the candidate: Paddy O'Sullivan is a local firefighter in Williamsburg. He has lived in North Brooklyn for a little over a decade and has volunteered with local food banks and community programs. His top three issues are rent, small business revitalization, and climate change. His campaign has focused on his goal to fight for working-class New Yorkers in Albany.

What stands out about his platform: Assembly Member Gallagher is the clear progressive, unifying candidate in Paddy's platform is relatively progressive, but nothing really stands out. His own website states, "My agenda is shaped purely by the needs and wants of the people of our district and your feedback is crucial in helping to shape our legislative goals."

New Kings Democrats interviewed Paddy as part of our endorsement process, and while he is a kind person dedicated to his community, his lack of organizing or policymaking experience was apparent, and he failed to present a compelling argument for his candidacy – especially over a woman who has hit the ground running in Albany.



ERIK DILAN, INCUMBENT

CANDIDATE 1 OF 2



About the candidate: Assembly Member Dilan has been in the role since 2015. He represented the 37th City Council District from 2002 to 2014. While in the Council, Dilan was chair of the Housing & Buildings Committee. He refused to allow a bill to count all vacant properties in the city, which activists protested on behalf of unhoused New Yorkers. Dilan also illegally acquired a housing unit designated as affordable housing, for which he exceeded the allowable income to qualify. He was fined \$9,000 in 2015. Dilan is known for his connections to real estate developers and for being relatively absent in the district.

Importantly, Dilan is part of a political family in the district – and one that has retained power while doing little for the most underserved communities under the family's reign. His father, Martin Dilan, retired in 2001 from the City Council to run for the State Senate, which is when Erik Dilan ran for his father's seat.

What stands out about his platform: Not sure. Assembly Member Dilan does not have a website or online presence for his reelection. He did not respond to requests to participate in NKD's endorsement process.

SAMY NEMIR OLIVARES

CANDIDATE 2 OF 2



About the candidate: Samy Nemir Olivares is currently serving as District Leader for Assembly District 53. They co-founded Bushwick Ayuda Mutua, a volunteer-based grassroots networking group that helped feed thousands during the pandemic. They currently work as an advocate for the LGBTQ community which is reflected in their policy platform. According to their campaign, if elected, Nemir Olivares would be the first openly genderqueer legislator in the state and the first LGBTQ person of color to serve in the State Assembly.

New Kings Democrats has endorsed Samy Nemir Olivares in this race.

What stands out about their platform: Samy's campaign platform centers on housing justice, climate change, universal health care, and making CUNY tuition-free. Their healthcare platform stands out as some of the most progressive ideas amongst their colleagues, notably coverage for low income New Yorkers regardless of immigration status. In addition, their public safety platform highlights extensive progressive reforms. Samy also fought to tax the rich to fund the Excluded Workers Fund.

DISTRICT LEADERS

CALLED STATE COMMITTEE MEMBERS ON YOUR BALLOT

What is a District Leader?

District Leaders are elected, unpaid leaders of the Brooklyn Democratic Party. There are two District Leaders - one male, one female, though we hope this rule that reinforces the gender binary changes soon – per each of the 22 Assembly Districts in Brooklyn. Those 44 District Leaders together serve as the Party's Executive Committee.

Every District Leader seat is up for election every two years. On June 28, you can elect District Leaders that align with your values and want to make the Brooklyn Democratic Party more engaged, transparent, and inclusive.

On the primary ballot, district leaders are called State Committee members because they also serve on the New York Democratic Committee. See this visual explainer from NKD for more details.

What can District Leaders do?

District leaders play a major role in <u>choosing judges</u>, staffing the NYC Board of Elections, and writing the rules governing our local party. They also elect the <u>Party Chair</u> (aka Party Boss), who determines party priorities and spending.

Who should I vote for?

The process for electing District Leaders is opaque by design. NKD believes the Party should be informing Brooklynites of their choices on the ballot and that the Party should not be intervening in primaries to put its thumb on the scale for Party loyalists who aren't necessarily doing best by their communities. Please read this guide and learn about the candidates and their plans for the role so you can make the best choice for your community on June 28.

New Kings Democrats, in coalition with other political clubs, has endorsed the <u>Brooklyn Can't Wait</u> slate of candidates for District Leader. Read more about Brooklyn Can't Wait on <u>page 4</u>.

How do I know who's on the ballot? And what if there is no ballot order listed for my district? In each of the Assembly District overviews that follow, you will notice two things:

- In many Assembly Districts, there is no competition for District Leader so no name will appear on the ballot. This is just one way that incumbents retain power, typically to benefit the Party machine.
- The candidate names are not necessarily in alphabetical order. That's because the order of names is determined by lottery, which we have reflected in this guide.

In the pages that follow, we have highlighted only districts in which there is either a competitive primary in the Female race, one in the Male race, or one in both. If you don't see your Assembly District listed, that means you won't see District Leaders (aka State Committee members) on the ballot in June.

ASSEMBLY DISTRICT 43: DISTRICT LEADER RACES

The 43rd Assembly District covers Prospect Lefferts Gardens, Crown Heights, and East Flatbush.

FEMALE SEAT

SARANA PURCELL, INCUMBENT

Sarana Purcell was appointed to the role in 2021 by the Democratic Party boss. She does not support reform or engagement (outside of her base) and has not acted to convene the Assembly District Committee, which is the responsibility of the District Leaders in the district. She participated in NKD's endorsement process and here.

KELLAN CALDER,

ENDORSED BY NEW KINGS DEMOCRATS & BROOKLYN CAN'T WAIT



Kellan is committed to her community and wants to serve her neighbors. She believes that the district deserves better, more approachable, and transparent leadership — and she is ready to make that happen. This means that she will: work with local groups to make sure that their concerns are heard, help neighbors find more ways to become involved in their community, provide updates about the issues facing the community and ways those issues can be addressed, and make sure that voters have information about the judges on the ballot.

In her words: "District Leaders have the responsibility to positively influence policies at local levels that are in the best interest of our community. They should welcome participation and not maintain the practice of exclusionary politics. I envision the role as one that connects and unites our neighbors by doing outreach to bring them into the fold."

He has been unresponsive to residents and has not convened the Assembly District Committee, the responsibility of the District Leader.

ENDORSED BY NEW KINGS DEMOCRATS & BROOKLYN CAN'T WAIT



Akel is a tried-and-true organizer. He is an everyday Brooklynite who has lived in the 43rd Assembly District for over 20 years. He knows what it is like to work two jobs to make ends meet, and having to deal with issues such as renting from an exploitative landlord. He believes that change is needed in the Kings County Democratic Party and is running on a platform of reform that would promote transparency, accountability, and inclusion, as many have lost faith in those who are supposed to serve them.

Chris McCreight is the current District Leader in Assembly District 64 and was redistricted into the 46th, where he is running alongside progressive Assembly Member Mathylde Frontus and NKD-endorsed candidate Angela Kravtchenko. Chris is the Chief of Staff to Council Member Justin Brannan. He understands the challenges people face in southern Brooklyn.

NOAH WESTON (no longer running)

MALE SEAT

DAVID SCHWARTZ, INCUMBENT

David Schwartz is a young but longtime active Democrat who takes seriously his responsibility as both a District Leader and representative of Borough Park and Midwood. He engages with communities and leaders across Brooklyn, though the community he represents is fairly conservative. SUPREME COURT JUDICIAL CANDIDATES

In New York, judges are either elected or appointed to their positions, depending on the court. Civil Court, Surrogate Court, and Supreme Court candidates are elected. Unlike Civil Court and Surrogate Court, New York State (NYS) Supreme Court candidates do not appear on the Primary ballot. Instead, candidates for NYS Supreme Court appear on the general election ballot following a nominating convention.

Judicial candidates for the Supreme Court are nominated by the Brooklyn Democratic Party Executive Committee (there's those District Leaders again). Then, Judicial Delegates, selected by voters, attend a nominating convention to review and vote on the nominated judges to determine who will appear on your general election ballot.

JUDICIAL DELEGATES

In the Primary, Democratic voters elect a slate of Judicial Delegates (and Alternates) to represent their Assembly District. Although there are 22 Assembly Districts in Brooklyn, there will not be a slate in every district. Judicial Delegate candidates petition to be on the ballot, but only appear if there are more candidates than seats. At the Judicial Nominating Convention, elected delegates vote on which Democratic Party Judicial nominees will become candidates on the General Election ballot for any Supreme Court vacancies.

Traditionally, Judicial Delegates have only been able to "rubber stamp" nominees because the Democratic Party's Executive Committee only nominates the number of judges needed to fill vacancies. NKD believes electing Judicial Delegates can be an important power for voters! Supreme Court judges in New York can dramatically affect all of our lives. Normally, no one runs against the political appointees and their names for Judicial Delegates don't often appear on the ballot. You might not even know Supreme Court judges are being selected.
