After deep reflection we found even stronger resolve to work harder than ever with our sisters and movements around the world to resist. It was this that inspired the theme of our 2017 conference, A Global Feminist Resistance: the Evolution and Revolution— Adapting to Survive Thrive! We only had to look at the bold grassroots women activists gathering around us in Germany to know that collective action and strong feminist movements will always be the way forward. We saw this in Berlin, where we went to conduct media training for talented women activists working in Syria. We saw this on our #WomenLandPeace fact-finding delegation to Honduras and Guatemala, where we were awed by the bravery of women land and human rights defenders carrying out their work despite threats against their lives. And we saw this in our 2017 Sister-to-Sister participants — all passionate young women, eager to catalyze change in their communities and beyond.

Across the globe this year, women once again rose up to challenge and subvert misogyny, climate destruction and violence with resilience, creativity, and collective action. This was a year of significant losses and tremendous gains, of struggle and of hope — always in the pursuit of peace, justice & equality.

2017 Highlights at a Glance

Women's Movement Building

The year began in resistance as the Nobel Women's Initiative staff and laureates joined millions of women worldwide in taking to the streets for the Women's March to stand against misogyny and fascism.

In May, the Nobel Women's Initiative hosted our 6th biennial conference in Germany for 50 women activists from across movements and around the world — A Global Feminist Resistance: The evolution & revolution —Adapting to survive thrive!

Women's Influence Over Public Policy

In April, Nobel laureate Leymah Gbowee and Iraqi activist Yanar Mohammed met with Canadian Prime Minister, Justin Trudeau to advocate for increased funding to grassroots women's organizations and movements who are making bold change.

Nobel Women's Initiative and The MATCH International Women's Fund advocated for the Canadian government to ensure funding goes directly to women's organizations and movements at the grassroots level. In June, the Canadian government announced its Feminist International Assistance Policy, pledging \$150 million to women's organizations in the Global South — one of the single largest investments of its kind to date from any country, and a historic moment.

Nobel Women's Initiative and the MATCH International Women's Fund hosted Dr.

Musimbe Kanyoro and Theo Sowa in July for a week of government and civil society meetings. They discussed using women's funds as an effective and efficient way to provide meaningful funding for women's movements globally.

Women's Voices in the Media

In September we hosted a screening of Skylight Pictures' film, 500 Years: Life in Resistance — the third in the trilogy of films about Guatemala's epic story of resistance.

In October/November Nobel peace laureates Tawakkol Karman, Shirin Ebadi, Jody Williams, and Rigoberta Menchú Tum led our Women, Land & Peace delegation to Honduras and Guatemala to learn from and support the struggles of women land defenders in those countries.

In November we celebrated the 25th anniversary of Rigoberta Menchú Tum's Nobel Peace Prize in Guatemala.

In December the **Nobel Women's Initiative delivered media trainings**in Berlin to women activists from Syria.

Young Women's Power and Leadership

Alia Soliman, Atong Amos Agook Juac, and Yah Parwon joined us in Ottawa for our Sister-to-Sister Mentorship Program, a six-week leadership residency program run by Nobel Women's Initiative.

Nobel Women's Initiative welcomed 6 volunteer activists and interns to help move our work forward this year.


TAWAKKOL KARMAN (Yemen, 2011)

This year we brought three brilliant young women activists to Ottawa for the 2017 Sister-to-Sister Mentorship Program. The women came from Egypt, South Sudan, and Liberia. These young women use creative and innovative approaches to promote peace, justice & equality in their communities.

Alia Soliman, **Egypt**

Alia Soliman is the Head of Marketing and Communications for HarrassMap, an organization that is engaging Egyptian society to create an environment that does not tolerate sexual harassment. Alia is working to create space for women and girls in Egypt to make choices about their lives, bodies and futures.

Atong Amos Agook Juac, **South Sudan**

Atong Amos Agook is the Executive Director of the Aliab Rural Development Agency (ARUDA) in Juba, South Sudan. Atong provides leadership to the organization, and has designed programs to provide training in trauma counselling, entrepreneurial skills, advocacy, and awareness of issues of gender-based violence for women.

Yah Parwon, **Liberia**

Yah Parwon is the Advocacy Officer with medica Liberia (mL), a women's rights organization providing psychosocial, health and legal services for survivors of sexual gender-based violence. Yah uses advocacy as a tool to engage national and local leaders to influence the development and implementation of women's rights laws and policies.
