Parental Choice is upheld by four important pillars: Selection, Curriculum, Funding, and Parental Authority. We have asked questions pertaining to each pillar:

SELECTION

1a. Do you support the independence of school boards? Answer: "Somewhat"

1b. Are you opposed to the formation of new Charter or Private schools? Answer: "No"

1c. Do you support the right of denominational schools - including private Christian schools as well as Catholic schools - to insist on lesson plans and rules for student clubs that are in harmony with their stated religious beliefs?

1d. Do you agree parents should be permitted to choose the location, type and style of education (i.e. home-based, language, interest, faith-based, etc.) that best suits their child, free of bureaucratic, union or government coercion?

Matthew Powell's added comments:

I answered "somewhat" to a couple of questions here because I believe the answer lies in the middle. For instance every child deserves an educational experience that is differentiated based on the students needs and learning style. A balance of both skills and information would be a prudent approach to ensure well rounded access to education. As for curriculum development I feel that any politicization of curriculum needs to stop! The curriculum should be based on what the students need to prepare them for adulthood, not what a political party or union deem desirable for their ends. A non partisan committee of learned professionals with a variety to expertise should be involved and each iteration of the draft should be published for feedback.
