Parental Choice is upheld by four important pillars: Selection, Curriculum, Funding, and Parental Authority. We have asked questions pertaining to each pillar:

## **SELECTION**

## Ron Voss's added comments:

I recognize that parents are the primary decision-makers for their children and their children's education and support the right of parents to direct the upbringing, education, and care of their children, which includes the right to choose the education their child receives whether it be through public, separate, public charter, private school or homeschooling, and the right to make reasonable choices within public schools for one's child (such as opting their child out of classes the parents find objectionable). I believe skills (critical thinking) and knowledge are both important. Parents - not teachers, schools, bureaucrats or activists - must remain the primary caregivers and decision makers in their children's education. Standing up for parental rights and the ability of parents to choose the type of education for their children which transmits their values and worldview.
